Pit River flow study to start

Water rate to increase from 150-1,200 cubic feet per second

Fishing and other recreational activities may be more of a challenge along a 20-mile stretch of the Pit River in Shasta County during a one-week period in early May, but Mother Nature could be the long-term beneficiary, said the Department of Fish and Game.

The DFG's Region 1 office in Redding said river flows between Lake Britton and Pacific Gas and Electric's Pit 5 powerhouse near Big Bend will be stepped up from 150 cubic feet per second to 1,200 CFS from Sunday through May 10,

then back to 150 CFS by May 12.

Purpose of the experimental flows is to map the elevation and character of the river during the various flow levels in preparation for a similar flow boost in August during which a host of scientists and recreationists will evaluate the potential benefits of higher water.

The study project has been developed through a cooperative effort by public and private sector interests, including PG&E, the DFG, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the State Water Resources Control Board, U.S. Forest Service,

Pit River Indian Tribe, Cal Trout, the state Department of Parks and Recreation, the National Parks Service and American Whitewater, a rafting interest.

At the root of the project is the approach of the federal relicensing process for PG&E's three hydroelectric projects along the 20-mile reach of the Pit River.

Water is run through three generators known as Pit 3, Pit 4 and Pit 5, which were licensed by the federal government up to 50 years ago to divert river water out of the river course.

The result, the DFG said, has been a reduction in the natural flow over most of the targeted 20-mile reach of the Pit River from historic average summer volumes of 2,000 cfs to the presently licensed flow of a mere 150 cfs.

With the license renewals set to cover the next 30 to 50 years, Fish and Game and other interests are considering a request that the 150 cfs be boosted to a higher amount that would be healthier for the river ecosystem.

"We will be looking at a wide

Grandparents active in Kinship Care

When Stephen and Roberta Evans brought their 14-year-old grandson into their Clark Creek home last year, they joined the ranks of the 2,350,477 grandparents in the United States responsible for raising one or more of their grandchildren.

Roberta and Stephen had raised their four children, and now, in their late 50s, had been on their own for 11 years doing what they wanted to do when they wanted to do it.

But one daughter, a former drug abuser, had had trouble raising her three children and last February the

Evans's decided it was time to help her youngest.

"He wasn't happy living where he was and we decided now was the time to do something. We gave him several options and he wanted to live with us," said Roberta.

One of his sister's is in college and the other, in her junior year in high school, is earning a 4.2 grade point average and is too involved with friends and activities to leave.

There was a lot of joy in making this decision — and a lot of adjustments that the Evans's are still making.

"He'll be graduating when I'm old

enough to collect social security," said Roberta, 59.

She's not alone. The majority of people providing kinship care are white and between the ages of 55 and 64.

Statistics show they and are raising children again because the child's parents have died, are incarcerated, are unemployed, are substance abusers, had teen pregnancies, or are victims of family violence. Most need financial assistance.

The Evans's have re-entered the active life of high school parents with mixed emotions.

"We live five miles from a bus stop and he has to be there by 7:10 a.m. and gets picked up at four. He's in several sports and sometimes practice was at five in the morning.

"It's just a different lifestyle being back in school activities and volunteering as a parent."

They also had to make room for a new family member. "My husband converted another part of the house for our grandson so he has his own room now."

There are financial adjustments,

range of natural and recreational considerations, from the effects of higher flows on bald eagles that nest and forage for fish to fish habitat to water quality to white-water boating," said Annie Manji, DFG environmental scientist in Redding.

Manji said Fish and Game anticipates that fishing and other recreation along the Pit River, which includes a seven-mile stretch below Lake Britton that is managed as a wild trout area, may be temporarily affected by the staggered flows.

Trout, she said, tend to change their feeding habits when their environment is suddenly altered.

Over the long term, however, a consistently higher flow throughout the 20 miles of river could translate into higher fish populations, better eagle foraging and a generally richer ecosystem for fish, wildlife and vegetation, Manji said.

She said the full scientific evaluation of the river flows will take place during the period Aug. 4 through Sept. 3, when officials will step up the water volume to a high of 1,800 cfs before returning it to 150 cfs.

including the looming need for a car, car insurance and a job to pay for it.

And there are large emotional adjustments that take time.

"I think the hardest has been his trusting us and realizing that this was his home and he wasn't going to be going anywhere else.

"When he moved in, we told him this is it. You're here until you're 18. And if there is a problem, then it's the whole family's problem."

What they are facing now is Stephen Evans's recent cancer diagnosis and treatment. Roberta also needs back surgery.

What's helped throughout these life changes, said Roberta, is the Foster and Kinship Care program offered locally at no charge through Shasta College. The Northern Valley Catholic Social Service administers the program.

Roberta has been attending their monthly workshop and discussion groups and wishes more people in similar situations would join them.

"I feel there are a lot of people who are embarrassed because they are raising their children's family and their children let them down. But, it's a fact of life," said Roberta.

"I was very embarrassed at first by my daughter not being able to raise her children. And though she's doing better, she probably never will be able to. So you just accept it as it is.

"It's really amazing how many others there are and I never knew it until I said I'm raising my grandchild."

Roberta said her grandchildren are fortunate that their mother stopped doing drugs when she was pregnant.

"A lot of the kids are born addicted to drugs and have additional problems as a result of their parents' problems. Kinship Care really helps with that," she said.

Kinship Care workshops have also kept the Evans in tune with the times.

"We've gotten new ideas

about child raising, some of which I don't always agree with, but I voice my opinion and it's okay.

"I've learned about new activities and new problems facing kids today. There's a lot more out there for them to get into and as parents we need to be aware of that."

In addition to the knowledge that they've done what's right and are raising a healthy and stable child, the Evans's have received other rewards that they cherish.

"It's when he says, 'I love you,'" said Roberta.

"Also, last year, we took a vacation last year. It was his first family vacation ever and he asked if we could do it again.

"It was when, in art, had had to make a family setting and it was him with his Grandpa and me."

Shasta College's Foster and Kinship Care Program is about to begin a new five-part workshop for the Intermountain area.

All programs are free.

The pre-service program, Caring for Our Communities'

Children, is on May 4, from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the Intermountain Community Center in Burney. Lunch and coffee service is provided.

This pre-service workshop will focus on: Negotiating the System, The Education System, Child Development, Health Issues, and Positive Discipline/Parenting Techniques.

"The focus is to provide kinship caregivers, foster care providers and any other

interested community members with a connection to professionals in the field of Social Service," said Program Coordinator Phillip Clark.

"The educators are people who work directly with Child Protective Services and the Shasta County Department of Education.

"This program gives people the opportunity to learn important new techniques, refresh old ones, and acquire personal connections

with service providers so they have direct access to the system and information."

The free pre-service program and luncheon is open to anyone but pre-registration is required. Call Clark, toll free, at 1-800-846-1451 or direct at 530-247-3306.

Hubble Space Telescope



By studying Hubble pictures, scientists discovered that some galaxies have smashed into others, tossing stars into space. New star clusters have been born from the collisions. This picture is of the galaxy group called Stephan's Quintet.

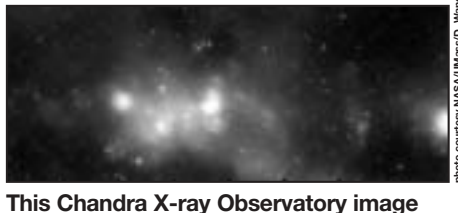
The Hubble Space Telescope continues to change the way astronomers understand the universe. It proved that black holes do exist. It showed that stars were created soon after the universe began, and galaxies soon after.

Chandra X-ray Observatory



The Chandra X-ray Observatory gathers information beyond the range of light people can see.

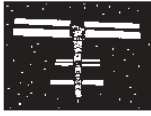

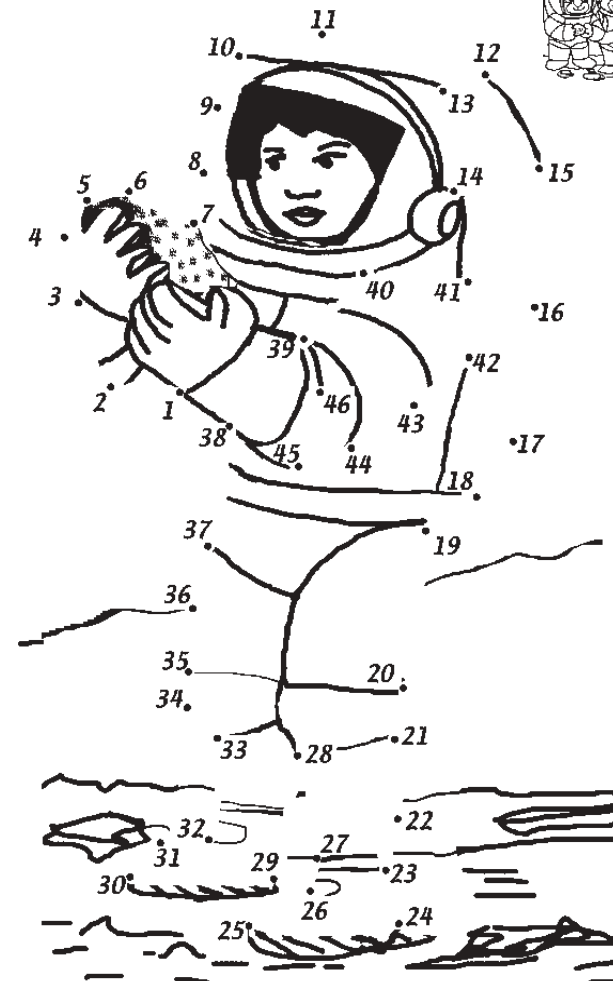
International Space Station

4. Wrap each bun in aluminum foil. Bake in a preheated 350-degree oven for 15 to 20 minutes.

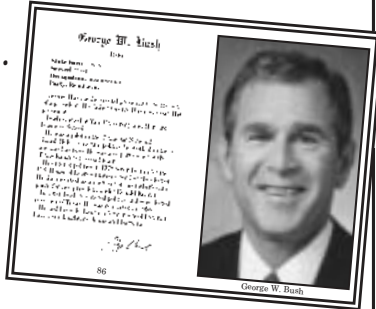

Barry Bonds is the home-run king. Last year he became the all-time single-season home-run hitter. By the end of the season he had hit 567.

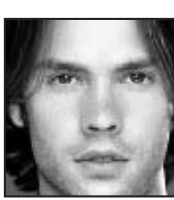
He is in his 10th season playing left field for the San Francisco Giants. Before that, he spent seven seasons with the Pittsburgh Pirates.

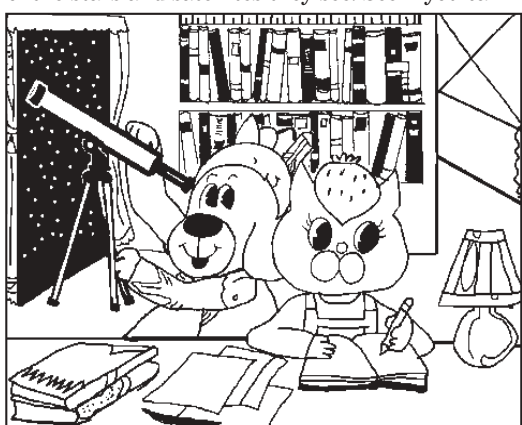

The Odyssey Mission

Now orbiting Mars

The newest mission to Mars, Odyssey, has made exciting discoveries. It has found strong evidence that there is a large quantity of water ice near the surface of Mars.

Scientists are excited because if there is water on that planet, there might also be evidence of life on Mars.

On Earth, experts have found life wherever there is water, even in the harshest environments. Life is everywhere, even inside volcanoes and at the bottom of the ocean.

If life exists anywhere there is water on Earth, maybe it also exists where there is water on other planets.

Missions to Mars

The Odyssey is the latest in a series of missions being launched to Mars every two years, when Mars is closest to Earth.

The mission launched in 1996, Global Surveyor, is still orbiting Mars. It also found evidence there might be liquid water there. Odyssey has found much stronger proof.

Future missions

Next year two robotic rovers will be sent to separate spots on Mars.

They will carry cameras and other instruments to take measurements of the rocks.

They will scratch below the rock surfaces to see what is there.

The Mars Odyssey spacecraft was launched in April 2001. It reached Mars in October and began gathering scientific information in February of this year. It will orbit that planet for at least two more years.

Following the water

All of the Mars missions have one main purpose — to find water or places where water has been.

There is a lot of area to explore. There is as much surface land on Mars as there is on Earth. (Earth is a bigger planet, but about three-fourths of it is covered with water.)

There are also many challenging places. For example, Mars has many deep craters. There is an extinct volcano three times as high as Mount Everest on Earth.

There is a huge canyon that stretches about the distance of San Francisco to Washington, D.C. It may once have been filled by an ocean.

Scientific tests

Gamma rays

The Odyssey found the first strong evidence of water on Mars by studying gamma rays. Gamma rays are energy bursts that develop when matter is hit by cosmic rays.*

*Cosmic rays are waves filled with high-energy particles from the stars.

Each ingredient of matter produces its own kind of gamma ray. The Odyssey found gamma rays from large amounts of hydrogen.

Since water is made up of hydrogen and oxygen, experts believe finding this much hydrogen means water is present.

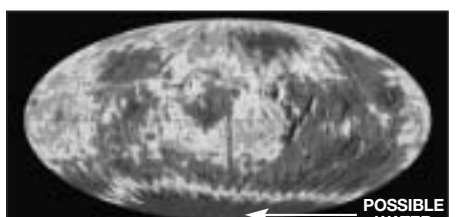
Infrared rays

Infrared rays show up when there is heat. When the sun heats the surface of Mars, each mineral sends heat back to space in special ways that Odyssey can record.

It will also search for hidden hot springs by studying heat patterns.

Radiation

Odyssey will be recording the radiation on Mars and in the Martian orbit. Radiation could be very dangerous to astronauts exploring Mars. Space radiation comes from cosmic rays.



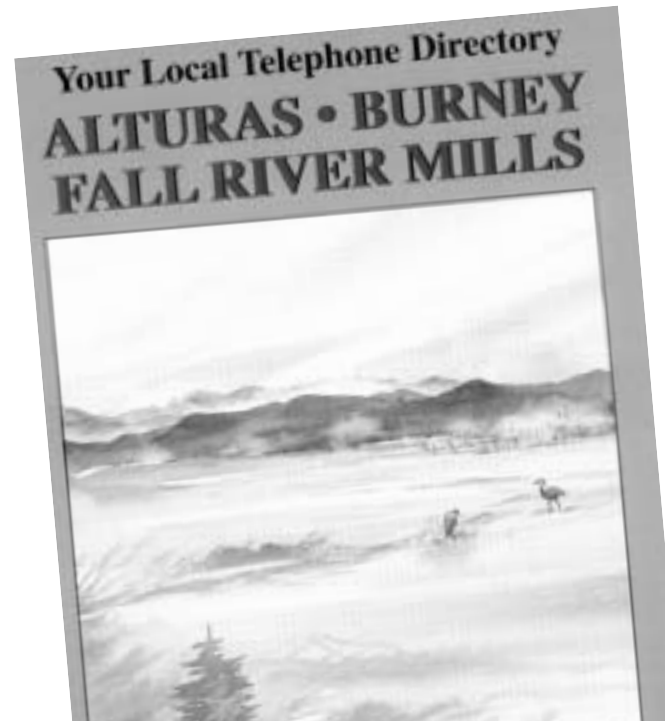
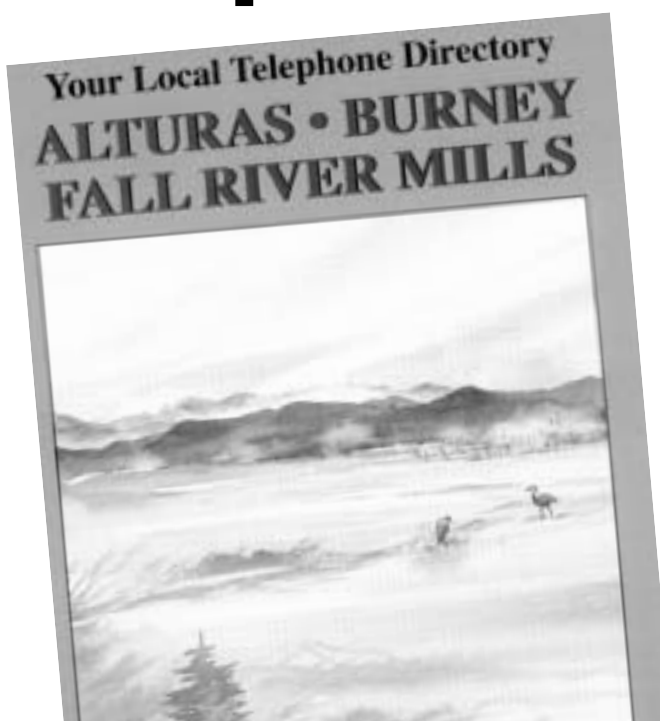
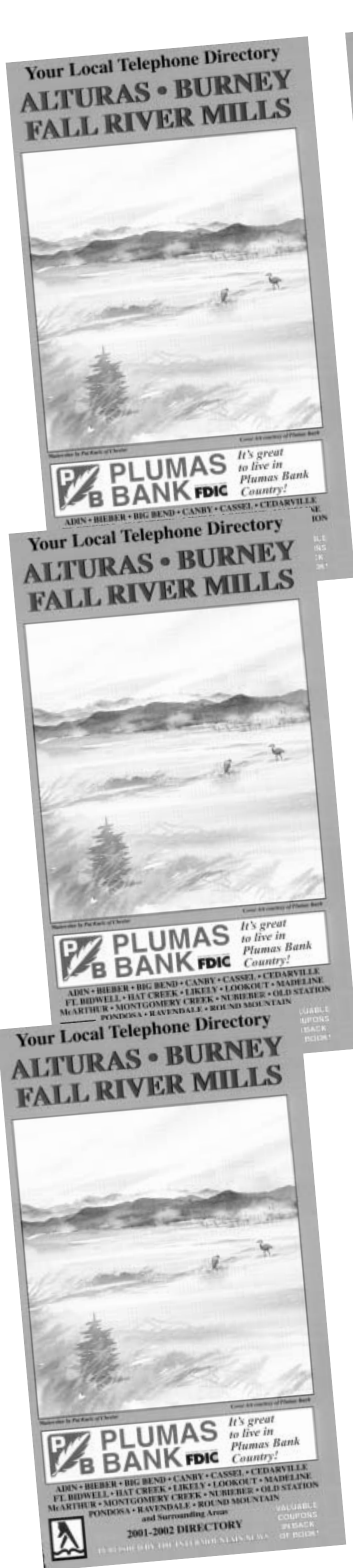
This Odyssey view of Mars shows big areas of hydrogen in the bottom area.
