Fall River ranches to be preserved as agricultural, open space 'forever'

The owners of three ranches on Fall River have agreed to put 2,800 acres into farmland conservation easements managed by the Fall River Resource Conservation District.

"Basically, we're selling the development rights to land that will be used for agricultural pursuits, open space, and wildlife preservation — forever," said Jim Rickert of McArthur.

"It gives us the opportunity to make a long-term commitment to agriculture. And we plan to continue our current pursuits,"

Rickert and his wife Mary are the co-managing partners of River Ranch and River Butte Ranch, two of the privately owned ranches involved.

Ted and Debbie Noel own the third ranch, the 300-acre Noel Ranch.

The Shasta County Board of Supervisors was asked to approve a resolution at press time Tuesday supporting the \$1.4 million grant proposal to the California Farmland Conservancy Program.

The California Farmland Conservancy Program (CFCP) is a voluntary program that encourages the long-term, private stewardship of agricultural lands through the use of agricultural conservation easements.

The CFCP works with the Natural Resources Conservation Service to administer Farmland Protection Program funds in California.

The Farmland Protection Program is administered through the Natural Resources Conservation Service, a division of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The RCD's Fall River Conservation Easement Program will also be funded with matching federal and state dollars, grants and donations.

In November 2000, the Fall River RCD "agreed to support and hold conservation easements as the local agency in Shasta County to maintain the agricultural value of the land, enhance wildlife habitat and improve water quality," said District Manager Tim Weaver.

The RCD then began talking with local landowners.

"Our main focus, in the early stages of this program, is the river and all of these ranch properties are contiguous and adjoin the river," Weaver said.

Allowing the Fall River RCD, with local residents on its board of directors, to hold the conservation easements keeps local interests in the forefront, Rickert said.

"If someone has a question, they can walk into the office in McArthur and ask, rather than go to Washington, D.C."

The land itself continues to be of value to the community.

"It is still on the tax rolls, it still produces goods, we still deal with local businesses, and it provides local employment. With state ownership (of local land), you lose a lot of that," Rickert said.

The Fall River RCD continues to

work with the landowners to help improve the property, through technical and financial assistance, but does not make management decisions on the property, Weaver said.

Making a commitment to conserve land for agriculture is not a small decision with some parcels on Fall River valued at \$150,000 an acre.

"We spent a lot of time looking at this," Rickert said.

Noel, who kept a 10-acre building envelope, said he was interested in the easement plan "because it preserves agriculture and the integrity of the land."

Weaver said some might argue that preserving highly marketable land for agriculture is anti-growth or anti-development.

"I'd say that this helps direct development into more appropriate zones, instead of having house after house on the river."

Property owners can take the easement funds as direct compensation, for tax purposes, or give as a donation, Weaver said.

Rickard said they are donating a portion of their easement payment to the Fall River RCD to set up an endowment for management and to hire a conservationist.

"This would help give the RCD some stability and a permanent baseline for funding," he said.

The 1,900-acre River Ranch, which is on both the east and west sides of Fall River, is also owned by Channing Chrisman of Palo Alto.

Vision for schools explored

Trustees for the Fall River Joint Unified School District met for a special board work session July 16 in McArthur.

Trustee Teri Vigil said they and new Supt. Eric Newton focused on "our vision for the district, our roles as board members, Eric's role as superintendent, and what we expect from each other."

Newton said he and the board also discussed the district and its operations with the state's financial constraints in mind.

"We want to write the future for the district rather than wait and see what happens and have chance determine it for us," he said.

He also wanted clarification from the board "on where my responsibility starts and where (former Supt. Earnie) Graham's ends."

Newton started his new position as head of the school district on July 1.

"He's very positive and has a lot of good ideas," Vigil said. "He's off to a very good start."

In closed session, the administrators discussed litigation concerning personnel and their intended approach to the superintendent's first evaluation, set for December.

Newton said he asked to discuss the evaluation discussion. "I wanted to talk about this at the beginning, not at the end," he said.

even pass an increase.

"I don't think the people in this community will stand for another gouge, even if it is only 75 cents," she said.

"We need to find some mechanism to fund the pool," noted Suppa. "Otherwise it will die."

The board said that a condition of their agreement with the school district, which owns the land where the pool was built, is that if the water district ceases to operate the pool its ownership reverts back to the school district.

The proposed swimming pool budget of \$46,700 in revenue and \$61,150 in operating expenses includes \$11,000 for gas and electric costs.

Suppa said energy costs were actually lower than anticipated this year due to their new water heaters and pool covers.

The proposed water department budget is balanced at \$455,400, a figure that includes \$254,00 in residential revenues and \$158,000 in business revenue.

PG&E is paid the biggest

chunk with an estimated \$122,000 for pumping costs and another \$6,200 for office utilities.

The projected sewer department's budget is also balanced at \$312,900, with \$232,500 in residential revenue and \$66,500 in business revenue.

The water district's total labor costs for salaries, retirement, and insurance for eight employees is \$410,740.

The proposed \$20,300 budgeted for legal and audit expenses is divided between the three departments. Liability insurance of an estimated

\$14,400 is also divided between the three departments.

In another matter, Suppa said he planed to write the county Department of Public Works to complain about their failure to give timely notification on local road projects.

At issue is a county street overlay project between Tamarack Avenue and Tamarack Road that got underway before the water district finished its underground pipe project.

"They come in and pave and then the utilities have to tear it up," said Yates, "And then we're the bad guys," Suppa said.

In addition, it costs more in time, labor and materials.

"They know when these projects are scheduled and they need to let us know far in advance," Suppa said.

The 1,900-acre River Ranch, on the east side of Fall River, is co-owned by a retired Bay Area banker.

A portion of the River Ranch acreage is going into the farmland easement; other portions are wild land and timberland and will eventually be placed in suitable easements.

Currently, both ranches

are raising cattle, alfalfa hay, mint and wild rice, Rickert said. River Ranch also has acreage for certified organic seed production.

Shasta County Supervisor Glenn Hawes said Monday he expects more ranches may follow the lead of the Fall River RCD. "I think we'll see more of this as time goes along. Landowners can get out of debt and still farm the land."

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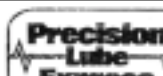

There's a long, long trail a winding . . .

The Appalachian Trail

Up and down mountains from Georgia to Maine winds a 2,169-mile path known as the Appalachian Trail. It is the longest marked hiking-only trail in the world.

- Hikers like it for many reasons:
- to see the view from the top of mountains.
 - to spend the night under the stars.
 - to picnic in the outdoors.
 - to look for animals such as bears, deer and moose.
 - to find plants such as ferns and mushrooms.
 - to get away from city life.
 - to discover more about themselves.

Short hikes

Each year, 3 million or 4 million people hike part of the trail in their home state. They might go on weekend hiking and camping trips.

Long hikes

Hiking the entire trail in one trip with a backpack and camping along the way is called a "thru-hike."

As many as 2,800 people try to do this each year. Only about 250 to 400 make it. This hike can take from five to seven months.

A grandmother, Emma Gatewood of Ohio, hiked the trail in sneakers in 1952.

The youngest person to hike the entire trail was a 6-year-old boy, Michael Cogswell, who hiked with his parents in 1980.

The first man to report a thru-hike was Earl Shaffer in 1948. He walked it again in 1965 and, at the age of 79, again in 1988.

A blind man, Bill Irwin, hiked the trail with his Seeing Eye dog, Orient.

Building the trail

The idea to build a trail began with a man named Benton MacKaye. He was a forester and planner. He dreamed of a trail stretching the entire length of the

Appalachian Mountains. These mountains are the oldest chain in the United States.

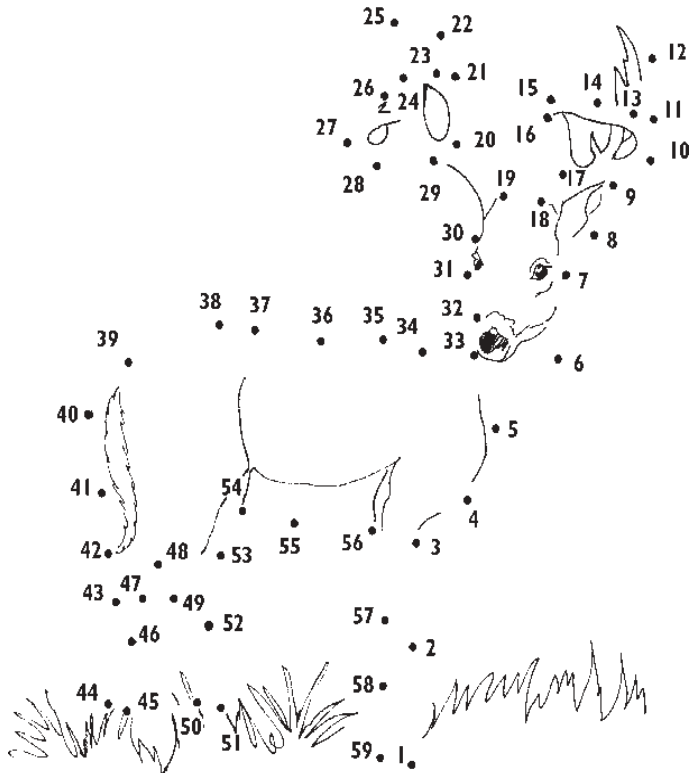
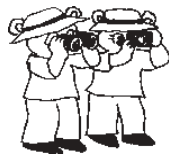
Benton MacKaye hoped people who lived in cities and towns would use the trail to see the forests. It took 15 years to build.

Looking after the trail

A group called the Appalachian Trail Conference, made up of thousands of volunteers, helped plan and build the trail. Today its members protect and take care of it, working closely with local clubs, the National Park Service and the USDA Forest Service.

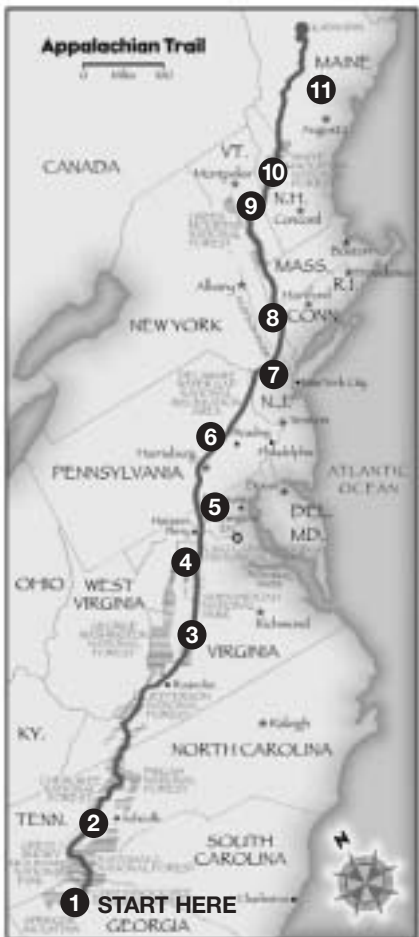

- 6 Pennsylvania**
Along some sections, hikers can find rocks with fossils, or skeletons of plants or animals dead for more than 400 million years.
- 7 New Jersey and New York**
The trail reaches its lowest point (124 feet above sea level) near Bear Mountain. Near Pawling, N.Y., hikers can see a 300-year-old oak tree.



- 8 Connecticut and Massachusetts**
In Connecticut, one section of the trail is for people in wheelchairs. Lots of beaver dams can be found in Massachusetts.
- 9 Vermont**
Benton MacKaye climbed a tree on Stratton Mountain and was so inspired by what he saw that he started the Appalachian Trail.
- 10 New Hampshire**
Snow can fall on Mount Washington any month of the year.
- 11 Maine**
Mount Katahdin, which stretches a mile high, marks the end of the trail.

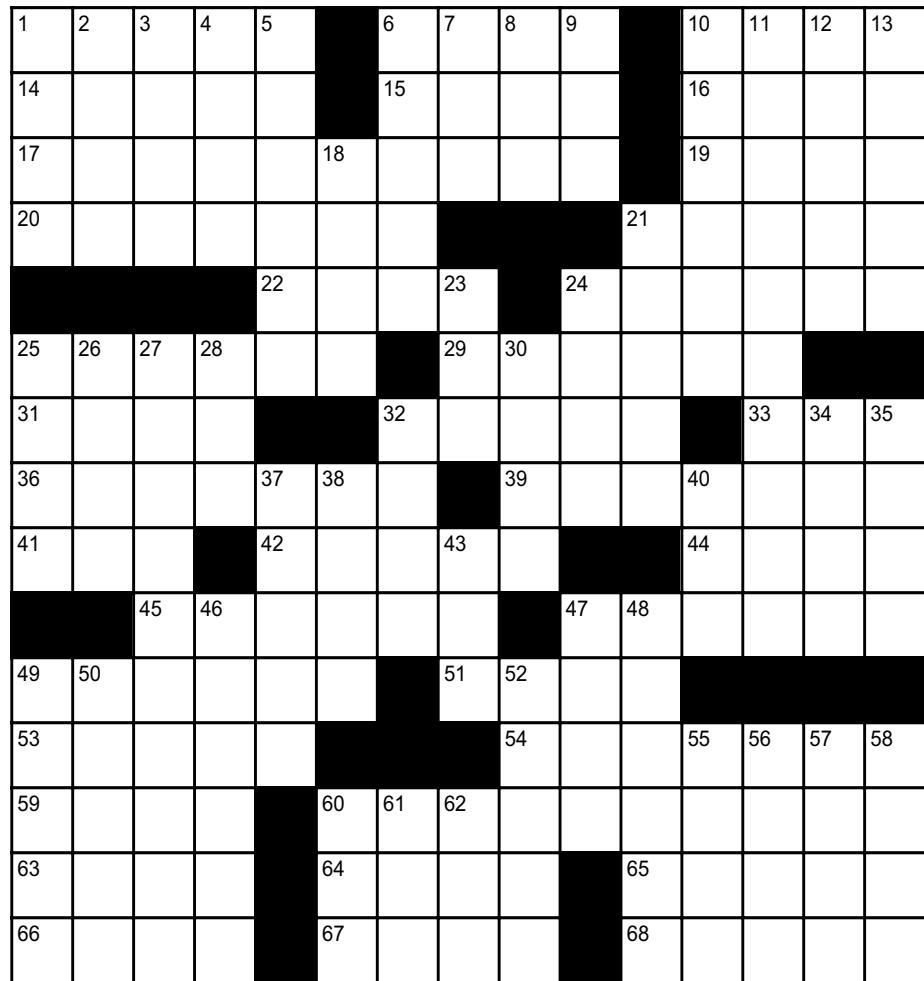

Economical Elwood loaded with charm

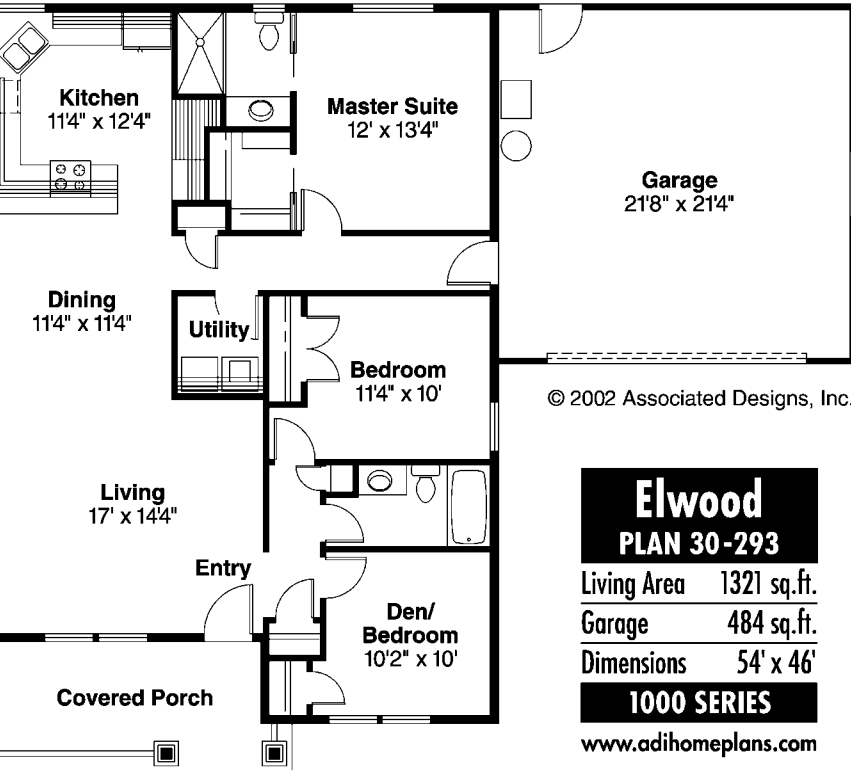

Master suite amenities include a walk-in closet and a private bathroom with a large shower. Direct access to the garage is just down the hall.

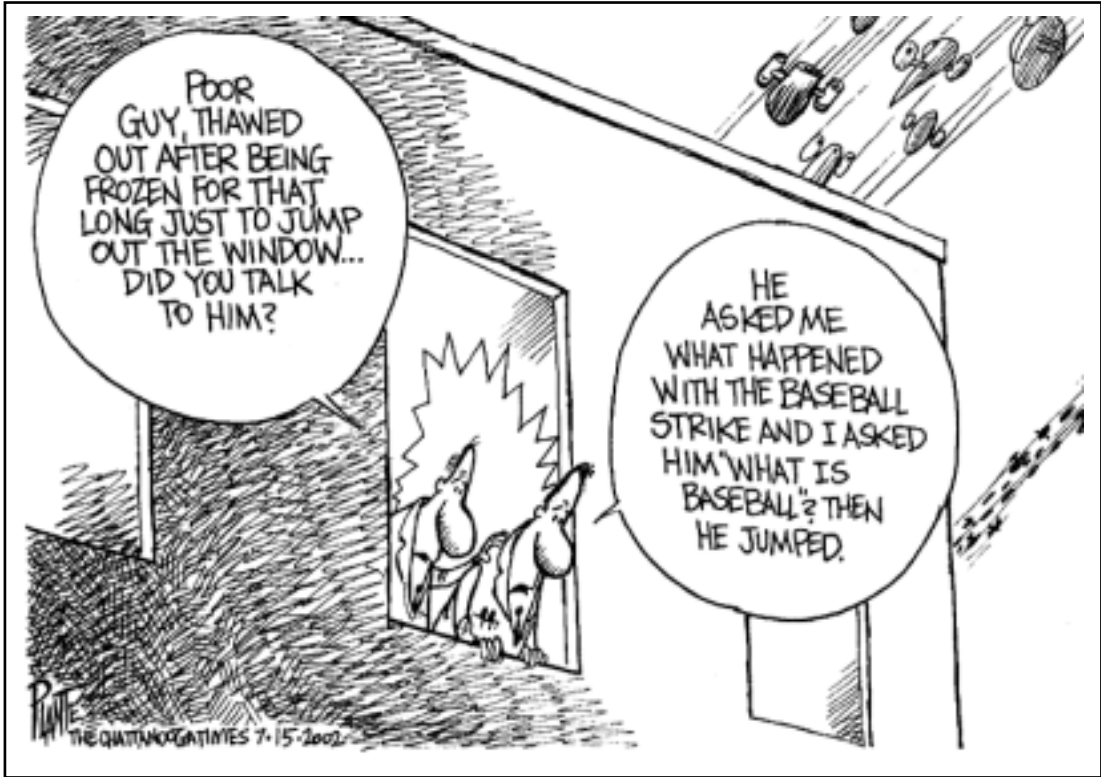
Two more bedrooms are at the front of the Elwood. The front bedroom, or den, is slightly smaller than
