# Nephew said to have stabbed **Hat Creek aunt**

Shasta County sheriff's deputies arrested Joshua Lee Davis, 20, of Hat Creek Sunday night shortly after he allegedly stabbed his aunt behind the ear with a screwdriver.

Sylvia Winn, 50, also of Hat Creek was flown to a Redding Hospital where Monday she was listed in stable but critical condition.

The two had reportedly been arguing at a residence off Wilcox Road. Winn was taken to a nearby residence by relatives.

Davis was arrested by deputies a short time later and booked into county jail for attempted murder and assault with a deadly weapon. He was to be arraigned Tuesday.

# Bailey Park gets OK to research costs for Burney ballot initiative

The Bailey Community Park project received an okay from the water district to take a closer look at what it would cost to activate their dormant Parks and Recreation District.

Cindy Dodds, executive director of the Tri Counties Community Network, and Project Coordinator Lynn Erickson once again described the park plans to three directors of the Burney Water District at their Dec. 18 meeting.

The sticking points were the same as when Dodds brought the project to the board in June.

They still aren't sure they want with it." to take on anything more and they aren't convinced the community would go for a ballot initiative to acquire the necessary property tax dollars to fund the additional

"Our feeling is that getting a Parks and Recreation District will avail this community of dollars it is not getting," Dodds said.

She described the McCloud Community Services District, which has a tax base of \$40,000 a year "and so much Parks and Recreation money they don't know what to do

In 2000, for example, the McConnell Foundation gave the McCloud CSD \$51,500 for playground equipment, park benches, sprinkler system renovations, an outfield fence, and lawn for their community park.

That same year they received \$46,000 from the Ford Family Foundation for park improvements and \$21,500 from the California Integrated Waste Management Board to install recycled tires as playground surface.

# Savings not found in school grouping

Consolidating the school district's two high schools may not be the best cost savings option.

The amount of Necessary Small High School Funding that the district stands to lose through consolidation could squash that unpopular option, one of several the school board will discuss at their Jan. 8 workshop.

"It's looking more like consolidation might not be a possibility," said Nancy Sisk, a trustee for the Fall River JUSD.

'We don't have all the numbers, but from the information I've gotten it may not be a cost savings for the district," she said.

Supt. Eric Newton said the situation and the consolidation option "are more complex than they might

Newton wants to improve the district's curriculum while in the throes of declining enrollment and a tightening

One of the more controversial considerations was to consolidate the 9-12th grade high schools in either Burney or McArthur.

"It would generate some savings such as having fewer principals and office and custodial staff and, instead of having two classes of 10 students (at two sites), we could have one class of 20," Newton said.

"But, on the financial side, we may not gain as much as we think and so the analysis is continuing.

Newton said a "subset of options" surrounding high school consolidation includes the pros and cons of where the district's seventh and eighth grade students would go.

At present, consolidating kindergarten through sixth grade is not a consideration.

"We're trying to look at all the different options and trying to figure out what's the best direction for the next several years," Sisk said.

In Burney, a group of concerned parents has organized a community meeting set for Dec. 30, at 6 p.m., in the Burney High School library.

"We want to hear from people with potential alternatives and suggestions to help with the problems currently facing the Fall River school district," said one parent.

The trustees will discuss their own proposals and ask for public comment at the Jan. 15 school board meeting in Burney.

Sisk said she wants the final decision to be a community decision "so that we've all had input in deciding what is the best we can do for our

# Mayers to vaccinate 10 hospital volunteers for smallpox

Mayers Memorial Hospital plans to give smallpox vaccinations to 10 volunteer employees in mid-January as part of a nationwide program to develop Smallpox Response teams.

On Dec. 13, Pres. Bush announced the plan to protect Americans against the threat of smallpox should there be such an attack by hostile groups or governments, according to the Centers for Disease Control.

The first phase of the plan is to vaccinate emergency and healthcare workers, as they would be the first needed to mobilize in an emergency, according to Mayers CEO Jerry Fikes.

Pres. Bush just had his shot and certain military personnel are also receiv-

ing the smallpox vaccine. "Pre-attack vaccination of Smallpox

Response Teams will allow them, in the event of a smallpox attack, to immediately administer the vaccine to others and care for victims," the CDC said.

In Phase II of the plan, police, fire personnel and first responders would receive vaccinations, probably in June, Fikes said.

According to the CDC, the federal government is not recommending that the general public be vaccinated at this

"Our government has no information that a biological attack is imminent, and there are significant side effects and risks associated with the vaccine," according to the CDC.

Fikes said that about nine of the 10 hospital volunteers would be of an age to have already had the smallpox vac-

"That will be a good indication that they can take it again and are low risk," he said.

The vaccine is a live virus, cowpox. And while it is not smallpox, it does provide immunity to the disease, Fikes

Some people who have the vaccine "can get flu-like symptoms, with muscle aches and pains. Some feel bad enough to be bedridden and some just feel punk," Fikes said.

The CDC said certain people should not get the vaccine, such as anyone who has a weakened immune system or skin conditions such as eczema, burns, chickenpox, shingles, impetigo, herpes, severe acne, or psoriasis until the conditions clear up.

Women who are pregnant or who plan to become pregnant within a month of receiving the vaccine or who are breastfeeding should not have the vaccination either.

The CDC said smallpox is a serious,


contagious, and sometimes fatal infectious disease. "There is no specific treatment for smallpox disease and the only preven-

tion is vaccination.' The smallpox vaccine was routinely

administered to Americans until 1972 and "is a highly effective protection against the disease when given before or shortly after exposure to the virus," according to the CDC.

The last case of smallpox in the United States was in 1949. The last naturally occurring case in the world was in Somalia in 1977.

tial for this community, as well, with possible impacts on everything recreational," Dodds said.

The Bailey Park, which includes an already funded Toddler Park and School Age recreation area and "the energy for an amphitheater", started with a community drive for a skateboard park.

Its future was dimmed recently by the costs quoted for insurance coverage.

Dodds said that bureaucracy is exempt from liability in a skateboard park, but if the Intermountain Community Center has ownership, it's a \$10,000 minimum premium for \$5,000 worth of liability coverage.

"McCloud is not impacted at all by insurance," Dodds said.

Bringing Burney's Parks "We feel there is poten- and Recreation District to life could also be a boon for the water district's swimming pool that operates in the red.

> "We see the pool as a significant community asset and a major community health asset," said Dodds.

Putting the district's pool in a parks and recreation district would help maintain it and perhaps allow for expansion and the purchase of more equipment, such as a muchdesired pool cover.

Dodds said pursuing the ballot initiative would be a relatively easy process.

"People talk about being in favor of something until it's time too pay the piper," said Water District Manager Bill Suppa.

"The big problem will be getting people to vote for it," said board member Aileen

Board President Jackie Young asked Dodds how much she was willing to do.

She said she wanted the board's approval to research the initiative and to bring back facts and figures.

"But you won't be exempt from everything about this," she said.

She suggested that the board could form a Parks and Recreation Citizen's Advisory Board to bring back information and take away some of the burden.

Young hesitated, Suppa said "It makes absolute sense to continue a feasibility study and the water district will have to be the agency to oversee this in the future.'

He advised Dodds to go forward and bring them back the information.

# Sentence of McArthur man set for March 3 on porn plea

A McArthur man pled guilty to charges of possession and distribution of child pornography and will be sentenced March 3, 2003 to 70-87 months in federal prison.

Neil Everett Simmons, 57, of McArthur, turned himself in to authorities Oct. 30 after the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District in Sacramento filed a complaint.

Simmons was held without bail and entered a plea agreement Dec. 17 with the U.S Attorney's office in Sacramento.

As part of the plea agreement, Simmons will be required to register as a sex offender and upon his release from prison to be under supervised parole for three years.

Any deviation from the agreement with the government would result in a stiffer sentence.

The Shasta County Sheriff's Department was contacted after Simmons return address was found on material mailed to an inmate at Ohio State Prison in Mansfield, according to Detective Anthony Bertain of the Burney station.

Deputies executed a search warrant Aug. 5 at Simmons residence on Lee Road. Among the items seized was Simmons computer.

Bertain said a computer forensic examiner found thousands of images of child pornography on the computers hard drive and evidence that Simmons had been actively distributing the images of boys and girls under the age of 14 via the Internet, as well as through the mail, for several years.

The federal plea agreement notes that many images in a "well-organized subdirectory depicted sadistic" and violent content.

Bertain said that in Simmons letter to the Ohio State Prison inmate, he graphically described a 10-year-old boy he had seen at the Fall River

Mills and that this "intensified our investigation and our interest in getting Mr. Simmons off the street."

Simmons was also convicted of transporting child pornography through the mail on June 11, 1985 and served 15 days in jail.

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

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# **Hawkins** leads his **Broncos** into top college 20

When Dan Hawkins became head football coach of Boise State University in 2000 he had the unenviable task of taking over a program that had won back-to-back Big West Conference league titles and two straight victories in the Crucial.com / Humanitarian Bowl.

At that time, Hawkins, a 1978 graduate of Big Valley High School, was the tight ends and special teams coach and assistant head coach to Dirk Koetter. When Koetter accepted the head coaching position at Arizona State that year, he took all of his Boise State assistants with him but one.

The Broncos also moved up a conference that year, going from the Big West Conference to the Western Athletic Conference offering an even greater challenge for Hawkins.

But in those two seasons. Hawkins has taken Boise State from a second place finish last year with a 6-2 WAC record (8-4 overall) to this year's WAC championship and an 8-0 record (11-1 overall).

For his efforts, Hawkins was named WAC Coach of the Year as well as Co-Coach of the Year for Region 4 by the American Football Coaches Association, sharing the title with University of Oklahoma head football coach Bob Stoops.

In addition, for the first time in the school's history, the Broncos are ranked in the top 25 in the nation - make that the top 20.

Boise State is currently No. 15 in the most recent ESPN/USA Today Coaches poll and No. 19 in the Associated Press Top 25 poll. The team may even end the season higher than that after Tuesday's Crucial.com / Humanitarian Bowl game against Iowa State, a team their favored to beat.

In a phone interview late Friday night where Hawkins was watching game film on Iowa State, the 1984 U.C. Davis graduate said it was a bit daunting two years ago when he became head coach.

"It was a little ominous task," Hawkins acknowledged. "Dirk did a good job, the school had back-to-back titles with 20 wins. It's hard to follow that. But it was a good challenge."

This year's performance impressed Hawkins' bosses so much that the Idaho State Board of Education recently approved a contract extension for Hawkins to 2008.

Between a base salary (state funds) of \$141,750 per year for coaching and (nonstate funds) of \$158,250 for media/public appearances, his cumulative salary will be \$300,000, not including numerous incentives that could make the total go even higher.

Just as important, Hawkins said, are the improvements the program is getting, including such things as a better weight room and scholarships offered.

"We can be a consistent top 20 team if we do it right," Hawkins said.

With all of that, you would think Hawkins would feel

pretty secure. Not so. "In this business, if you lose a couple of years (you're out of there)," he said. "But this is a good place and I'm happy to be associated with

the program." On the other hand, if he continues to be successful,

Hawkins admits he would be tempted to make a move to a bigger program.

"My goal from the beginning was to be a coach in the NFL, but that's not necessarily a goal anymore," he said. "I want to make a difference and have a positive influence on kids. Getting better is better, not bigger is better.

"But that being said, never say (never)," he added. "I won't lie. I told the athletic director here that if Notre Dame ever called..."

Hawkins said that would probably be his ultimate college job.

Hawkins came to Boise State in 1998 following a successful stint as head coach at Willamette University in Salem, Ore.

In high school, Hawkins was a fullback and linebacker under Ray Odom and, for one season, under Joe Blevins.

Blevins later coached the New York Giants' Jason Sehorn at Mt. Shasta High School giving Hawkins a connection to the talented player by way of Blevins.

"Yeah, the only difference is Sehorn is a better player," Hawkins said. "That's why I'm coaching."

Hawkins said he'd also like to add an Intermountain area connection to his coaching staff. Robby Snelling, a

Burney High School graduate who played tight end at Boise State under Hawkins and was drafted by the Tennessee Titans, is "definitely" coaching material, Hawkins

"I tried to get him as a grad assistant (on our football staff) and want him to come out this spring," Hawkins said. "But he wants to try and take one more shot at the NFL and I know how that is. It's hard to get (that desire) out of your blood."

Hawkins and his wife Misti, are the parents of four children: Ashley, 18; Brittany 15; Cody, 14; and Drew, 12.

Given the time consuming nature of his job, Hawkins said he doesn't get back to the Intermountain area very often to visit his father, Norman.

"Not as much as I'd like," he said. "I saw my dad one time last year and before that

# **Application deadline extended for NIWF**

The USDA Forest Service, United States Department of Interior, and National Park Service have extended the deadline to Dec. 31 for applications for National Interagency Wildland Fire Fighter Apprenticeship Program.

Any United States citizen 18 years and older may apply. Interested individuals need not have present or previous status as a Federal employee in order to apply.

Applicants covered by the agency Career Transition Assistance Program (CTAP) or Intergovernmental Career Transition Assistance Program (ICTAP) may apply and will be given priority consideration if determined to be well qualified for the position.

These are permanent positions with varying tours of duty and may include weekend work. Some positions may have irregular and protracted hours of work.

Tours of duty include fulltime or less than full-time (guaranteed a minimum of 13 pay periods full-time employment).

Pay for these positions

range from \$8.67 per hour to \$10.89 per hour. Currently the Modoc National Forest has 9 apprenticeship positions available for the 2003 fire season.

Students receive wildland firefighting training through Wildland Firefighting the Program, Apprenticeship which is an accredited pro-

The educational portion of the program is completed in a formal classroom setting. The Apprenticeship Program requires 4,000 hours of work processes to be completed.

Work experience is gained at a variety of duty assignments and locations during the program.

Duties performed while an apprentice will include initial attack, extended attack, large fire incidents, fire rehabilitation projects or restoration assignments as part of a hand crew, engine, or helicopter module.

Identify and mitigate safety hazards in the work environment, review/write Job Hazard Analysis, and conduct safety briefings during

prescribed fire and wildland fire activities.

Conduct fire ground proficiency drills, obtain weather forecasts and fire intelligence, and maintain fire equipment such as tools, pumps, and vehicles.

Serve in various functions during the planning, preparation, implementation and monitoring phases of wildland fire use and/or mechanical or chemical vegetation treatments.

Other duties may include, but are not limited to, dispatch and prevention/ education functions and fire business practices (timekeeping, record keeping, fire reports, medical forms, incident check-in and demobilizations, etc.).

# Holiday fire safety tips Smoke Detectors: Have important steps:

you tested your smoke detector lately?

Smoke detectors save lives and may save yours! Working smoke detectors in the home have slashed the number of fire-deaths by fifty percent since the late 70 s.

Your smoke detector batteries should be checked monthly, and one should be located in every room of the house.

Chimney Cleaning: Chimneys should be checked and cleaned on a regular basis.

Build-up of creosote is natural during fireplace and wood-stove operations. It is important to remove any build-up from your chimney.

Also, don t forget the chimney outlet and stove pipes are required to have a "spark arrester" fitted with mesh, no larger than half inch.

Christmas Trees: Cut trees need water, often! a fresh-cut tree can remain relatively fire resistant if you follow these

-Re-Cut the trunk 1-inch above the original cut as soon as you get it home.

-Keep the trunk in the water; do not allow the water source to run-dry.

-Avoid placing the tree near heat.

-Do not block escape routes.

-Check the water level in the tree stand daily.

-Remove the tree immediately after the holidays.

-Use tree-lights that are in perfect working condition, throw away any old light strands. Check for deterioration before placing lights on the tree.

-Turn-off the lights when leaving the house or retiring for the night. Even standardsize holiday lights generate

-Never, ever burn your tree in your wood stove or fireplace! This causes a serious fire hazard.

# **Lassen National Forest says 2003** firewood permits will soon be available

January 2, Lassen National Forest fuelwood permits will be available for 2003.

Cost of the fuelwood permits will be \$10 per cord with a minimum purchase of two cords per permit.

Permits are also available for fuelwood cutters who wish to cut wood on both the Lassen and Plumas National Forests.

"If fire and dry weather conditions continue, you may experience early firewood cutting closures as happened last year," said Ed Cole, Lassen Forest Supervisor.

"Be especially cautious while cutting, follow the regulations and fire rules to prevent any fires or resource damage. If you are cutting early this year, be careful driving and be conscious of potential damage to wet roads.

Our forests and resources belong to us all. Be considerate, treat the land and roads with respect and with your help and proper care, it will continue to serve us for generations to come.'

Permit tags are sold with a map of the forest and fuelwood cutting regulations. It is important to point out that the Plumas has different restrictions than the Lassen and the Plumas fuelwood map has those restrictions printed

The Lassen would like to remind wood cutters of the following points of impor-

Falling Snags - Falling dead trees within 100 feet of a paved road or within 200 feet of a railroad or power lines is prohibited. Diameter Limits – With the

exception of lodgepole pine, the falling of snags is limited to trees 20 inches in diameter or smaller.

Downed Trees - No restrictions, unless otherwise signed or marked.

Third Party Permits – An individual may be a cutter or transporter for up to 5 third party permits per year.

# CHP advises to celebrate responsibly over holidays

Being responsible is the kev to a safe holiday on Californias highways, the California Highway Patrol (CHP) said today.

"Decide who will be driving before you attend that holiday party. Then see to it that the designated driver abstains from alcohol entirely," said Capt. Dave Hahn commander of the CHPs Redding Area

"Just one or two drinks can put you at risk and impair your ability to drive safely," said Hahn.

"We encourage everyone to plan ahead. If you are going out with a group, make sure you designate a driver. Those who are hosting events in their home should provide their guests with a variety of non-alcoholic beverages."

To combat drunk driving, the CHP had declared the Christmas and New Years holidays maximum enforcement periods.

All available officers will be on the road to prevent deaths and injuries, Hahn said.

The Christmas maximum enforcement period will extend this week from Dec. 24 at 6:01 p.m. to midnight Dec. 25.

The New Year's period will go from Dec. 31 at 6 p.m. to midnight Jan. 1.

The CHP will also be looking for drivers who fail to buckle their safety belts, or do not have their passengers or children properly restrained. "Safety belts are the best protection available should a collision occur, they save lives," Hahn said.
