Board bans docs prescribing OxyContin Narcotic for chronic pain blamed for 4 deaths in Intermountain area

The physicians with Mountain Valleys Health Center are no longer permitted to prescribe the pain medication OxyContin for their patients.

Mountain Valleys Executive Director Dave Jones said the health center's board of directors made the decision in response to the nationwide abuse of the drug, particularly

by young people.

"Our board decided it does not want OxyContin to be a part of its corporate prescribing policy," Jones said.

The decision affects the physicians, formerly with Intermountain Family Practice in Burney, Fall River Mills and Bieber, who are now employed by Mountain Valleys.

Jones said he did not know how many patients had been taking OxyContin for relief from chronic pain, but that those who were would be "transitioned to another type of pain medication."

OxyContin is the brand name for oxycodone hydrochloride, a Schedule II controlled narcotic available only by prescription for the management of chronic pain.

When used illegally, either taken orally or injected in powder form, OxyContin's time-release structure is by-passed and the user experiences a rush similar to heroin, according to Spencer Recovery Centers, Inc. and the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA).

It's often a deadly game and in August 2002 four deaths in the

Intermountain Area were blamed on recreational and lethal overdoses of OxyContin.

At that time, one local physician said he was concerned that high school students had easy and illegal access to the drug. There was also concern that some people who had prescriptions were selling their medication for profit.

Vehicles caught with tax-free fuel on highways costly to owners

Inspectors from the state Air Resources Board were in Burney in April for a periodic check of the diesel-fueled vehicles traveling on Highway 299 and reportedly found at least three local equipment operators to be in violation of red-dye fuel regulations.

While the inspectors are stopping vehicles to check for emissions violations and to measure a vehicle's exhaust, they also take a moment to dip into gas tanks to look for fuel containing red dye.

The fuel is colored to indicate that it was sold tax-free, specifically for off-road vehicle use, such as on farms and ranches, at construction sites, or on logging operations.

If the marked fuel is found in "over-the-road" vehicles, it's bad news for the driver, who faces both state and federal penalties.

"If you're caught on the road with red-dye fuel, you will be cited because it's illegal," said Rich Varenchik, deputy communications director for the state Air Resources Board.

Varenchik said he was not aware of any Burney inspections, but did say that they have contracts with

the state Board of Equalization and the federal Internal Revenue Service because both agencies want the regulation enforced.

"We find frequent violations in ranching and agricultural areas and they lose money by virtue of people using (red-dye) diesel in on-road vehicles," he said.

Off-road users don't pay state tax, now at 18-cents per gallon, or federal tax, now at 24.4 cents per gallon, on red-dye fuel.

It adds up to what is sometimes irresistible savings of almost 43-cents per gallon.

Lou Feletto, principal auditor with the state Board of Equalization in Sacramento, did confirm that inspectors were in Burney in April and that there were "a number of potential violators."

Feletto said he could not discuss "any tax-payer sensitive information," but that he did want to get the word out that using red dye fuel on the highway is illegal - and can be costly.

The state fine is \$1,000 for a first offense.

Feletto said the highway inspection "is usually the end of it," unless there is reason to suspect that

someone has a bulk supply on his property.

Someone found to have a fuel tank filled with red-dye diesel with "no apparent use for off-highway is looking at a \$10 per gallon penalty," he said.

In most cases, the Air Resources inspector notifies the tax board of the violation and they send a letter of notification and the option for comment on the situation.

"We would make a determination on whether or not to issue a billing," Feletto said.

One local service station owner, who asked not to be named, said that a Sacramento-area rancher who had been cited for using red-dye diesel pulled into his station last year to buy gas.

"I went to fill up the tank and an envelope flopped out with a message that said not to fuel the vehicle without asking the driver for paperwork."

"The driver had two postcards with the date and time of fueling that we both had to sign and mail in."

The station owner said the rancher was fined \$10,000 and had been ordered to record every fuel purchase for five years.

Some 50 witnesses in Brunner civil trial

Some 50 witnesses are expected to be called in the civil case of the Committee to Preserve Fall River Mills (CPR) versus Bill Brunner, a Fall River Mills landlord, now underway in Shasta County Superior Court in Redding.

The court calendar coordinator said she expects the jury trial to go on until mid-June as Judge James Ruggiero's court is in session just three days each week.

CPR and its attorneys, Jim Reed and Paul Neibergs, filed the original complaint against Brunner and his wife Sally Voorheis, of Glenburn, on March 1, 2001.

CPR alleges that the couple have "unlawfully allowed their commercial properties in Fall River Mills to fall into a dilapidated, unsightly and dangerous state of disrepair" not out of neglect, but in a personal vendetta against a town "heavily dependent on tourism."

In Brunner's lengthy cross-complaint filed Oct. 5, 2001, he stated that CPR, a charitable trust, and the plaintiffs (Fall River Mills business owners Scott and Sandy Jensen, Terry Briggs, William Johnson and Todd Brown) "have harassed us for the sole purpose of gaining possession of our property" and they sought compensation for their expenses, stress and defamation.

Wood stove replacement project ends

Residents in Burney were warmed this winter by the more than 400 new, certified and "environmentally friendly" wood and gas stoves purchased at a discount through the Three Mountain Power Wood Stove Replacement program.

Last week the company said they've met their stove replacement requirement and the program is completed.

With 450 stoves installed and three more in progress, "We actually surpassed the project requirement for the use of Westinghouse turbines," said Danielle (Tinman) Cagan, spokesperson for Covanta Energy's Three Mountain Power project.

Covanta Energy, which declared Chapter 11 bankruptcy on April 1, 2002, said it still plans to build a 500-megawatt natural gas-fired power plant in Johnson Park when the economy improves.

The California Energy Commission approved Covanta's Application for Certification to build the \$300 million project on May 16, 2001 and Three Mountain was scheduled to be on line by late 2002.



The company went ahead with its plans to replace wood stoves to anyone living or working within a six-mile radius of the proposed project.

Cagan said that Three Mountain is required to replace at least 399 stoves if Covanta Energy purchases a Westinghouse brand turbine for their proposed project or 475 stoves if they go with General Electric.

Once the smaller goal was met, the company decided to

conclude the program until they decide which turbine to purchase.

Cagan said they were originally "leaning towards" General Electric. "Now it's highly possible we might use Westinghouse."

Firefighter, 46


Tony Don Wood, of McArthur died May 14, 2003 at Mayers Memorial Hospital in Fall River Mills.

sponsoring the team and providing the insurance.

The team is in a league that includes teams from Susanville, Eureka, Redding, Shasta Lake, Corning and Siskiyou County.

Mary Senko said numerous community members made donations and players had to pay a fee to help cover the cost of the new green and gray Channel Cats uniforms.

"It takes a lot of volunteerism and a lot of phone calls" to put together a team, she said.

"The kids want to play baseball and if they want to continue (in the sport) they need this," she said.

"We wanted to develop a team and get them all playing better."

The Channel Cats have a mandatory five-member board of directors with Robert Senko as president, Martin Sisk as vice-president, Patty Williams as treasurer, Pam Holscher as secretary and Carolyn Barnett as a board member.

They then persuaded Cufaude to coach the Channel Cats.

Playing for the Channel Cats will be Rob Adams, Chris Angel, Brian Barnett, Larry Holscher, Mitch Holscher, Russell Holscher, Carson Hubauer, Luke Magnuson, Blake Oney, Dieter Salters, Robert Senko, Colter Sisk, Carson Vanover, Patrick Williams and Kevin Wrigley.

Cufaude has coached Little League locally and he's also played a lot of baseball himself.

He played in high school - Fall River Coach Dom Traverso was his coach - and he played at Fresno State, from 1971 to 1975, when the school's team was in the top 10 in the nation for two years. He also played in the minors.

He reluctantly mentioned his background only to give credence to his saying that there's no error a player could make that he hasn't already done on a ball field somewhere.

So he understands what it feels like when a player

makes a mistake, sometimes even a stupid mistake.

"One of the worst things you can do is to get angry at a player," he said. "When they do something, they know it and they're already feeling low."

He said he'll talk to that player, but in private, after the game. He's also willing to talk to parents, but, again, after a game.

He's had the coaches who yell - and those who had other techniques and said he wants to "put the good all together for the kids."

Cufaude wants his players be thinking during a game.

Physical errors happen, but mental errors shouldn't, he said.

"These guys always need to be thinking forward. In every inning, there are eight guys out there who should be thinking and doing something after every pitch.

"If (a player) has to hesitate to think, the other guy's going to score or something is going to happen that's not good."

Another of his goals is to have each of his 16 players ready at the end of the season so they could go in as third base coaches and call the game.

"I want them thinking like coaches," he said.

He also wants them thinking like winners. "Winning is taught and learned. It's not a given thing."

More than winning games, Cufaude hopes each player ends the season with a winning attitude. "Carry that out into the real world and you're a winner in life."

THE FINANCING COMPANY

Standard real estate purchase agreements usually contain language that releases the purchaser from an agreement if they are unable to get financing within a specified period of time, with a full return of their earnest money deposit. If you are buying a home, you should read the financing cause carefully and be sure that you fully understand the terms of the agreement.

You are usually required to apply for your loan promptly and to comply with requests from the lender for any documentation needed to complete the loan application. The contract will also set a time limit by which you must have loan approval. If your lender cannot meet the financing deadline and needs additional time to complete the loan, you must ask the sellers for a written extension.

Meet a Remarkable Mother and Wife

Martha Washington

The Mini Page celebrates Mother's Day with a story about the busy life of a mother and wife, Martha Washington.



Martha was born in 1731. This is a painting of her in 1757 when she was 26 years old. This was three years before she married her second husband, George Washington.

Her background

Growing up, Martha Dandridge was taught the skills that it would take to be a good wife. These included housekeeping, religion, music and dancing.

Her father was a planter and county official. She was the oldest of eight children.

When she was 18, she married the richest man in the colony of Virginia, Daniel Custis. He was 20 years older than she. They were married seven years before he died. They had four children, but two of them died. Her husband's death left her a very rich woman.



This is a painting about the courtship of George Washington and Martha Custis. Notice the children, Jacky and Patsy.

Martha Custis met George Washington after her husband died. Washington was already famous as a hero in the French and Indian War. They were married on Jan. 6, 1759, at Martha's plantation, White House.

The children

While she and George never had children of their own, they did raise the two surviving children she had before she married him.



John Parke (Jacky) Custis was only 4 and Martha Parke (Patsy) Custis was only 2 when their mother remarried. They moved to Mount Vernon.


Her family was the most important part of Martha's life. She was always very protective of her children. She spoiled them greatly.

Jacky Custis (1754-1781) later married and had four children. He died at the age of 27 when he was serving with Washington in the Revolutionary Army.



Patsy Custis (1756-1773) died at an early age. The Washingtons were always concerned about her health. Martha was very sad when Patsy died of epilepsy at the age of 17.

Rookie Cookie's Recipe
Washington's Favorite Breakfast



You'll need:

- 8 3/4 cups white cornmeal
- 1 1/4 teaspoons dry yeast
- 1 egg
- warm water
- salt (optional to add to batter)
- shortening or cooking oil
- honey (buckwheat honey is really good with hoecakes)
- butter

What to do:

1. In a large container, mix together 4 cups white cornmeal, 1 1/4 teaspoons dry yeast, and enough warm water to give the mixture the consistency of pancake batter (about 3 to 4 cups). Cover and set on the stove or counter overnight.
2. In the morning, gradually add remaining cornmeal, egg, and enough warm water to give the mixture the consistency of pancake batter (about 3 to 4 cups). Cover and set aside for 15 to 20 minutes.
3. Add cooking grease to a griddle or skillet and heat until water sprinkled into it will bead up.
4. Pour batter, by the spoonful, onto the hot griddle. (Note: Since the batter has a tendency to separate, you will need to stir it well before pouring each batch.) When the hoecake is brown on one side, turn it over and brown the other side. Serve warm with butter and honey.

Yields enough to easily feed a classroom of students!

Note: This recipe is based on one from Nelly Custis, who could have learned it from her grandmother, Martha Washington.

Martha as Mother and Wife

As grandparents

Both of the Washingtons liked having young children around. They also raised two of their grandchildren. Their father was Martha's son, Jacky, who died. George Washington (Washy) Parke Custis was only 8 and Eleanor (Nelly) Parke Custis was only 10 when George Washington was sworn in as president.

Washy (1781-1857) became a planter, writer and painter. He often spoke and wrote about his step-grandfather. He built Arlington House, a mansion overlooking Washington, D.C. It still stands today. His daughter married Robert E. Lee, the famous Confederate general.

Nelly (1779-1852) married Washington's nephew, Lawrence Lewis. They had several children. Nelly enjoyed music, poetry and needlework.

Slaves worked around the house and in the fields. George Washington's slaves were freed at his death. Some of the slaves were Martha's from her first husband's estate. They were not able to be freed by George.

In this painting we see George and Martha Washington walking on the bowling green in front of Mount Vernon. While George ran the farm, Martha's job was to run the house.

As a housewife

Martha Washington was very friendly and loved meeting new people. This was important because so many people came to visit, and George was not as outgoing as she. In one year, in 1798, they had more than 600 guests. Some people stayed for weeks.

Martha had a very busy day. While there were slaves to help, she had to supervise them. She was up at 4:30 or 5:00 in the morning and in bed by 9:00 or 10:00 at night. She had lots to do. For example, the meal schedule was:

Breakfast: 7:00 a.m.
 Dinner: 3:00 p.m.
 Tea: 6:00 or 7:00 p.m.
 Light supper: perhaps at 9:00 p.m.

As the general's wife

Martha did not like to travel, but for eight years she went to visit and give support to her husband at his winter quarters during the Revolutionary War. She also raised money for the cause.

The Washingtons held receptions where people could get to know the president.

As the first lady

While Martha did not like public life, she was warm and gracious and a great help to the president.

Martha died at Mount Vernon in 1802, more than two years after her husband.

Lava Beds entrance station at Gillem's Camp opens Friday

Lava Beds National Monument Superintendent Craig W. Dorman announced that the entrance station at Gillem's Camp will be open seven days a week beginning May 23 through the end of the 2003 visitor season.

Park information, entrance permits, Lava Beds Annual Park passes, National Park passes and Golden Age passports will be available at both Gillem's Camp and the Visitor Center.

Superintendent Dorman states "in an effort to be comparable with other Fee Demonstration parks in the region the following fee changes will go into place beginning June 14."

The cost of a seven-day entry permit will be \$10 and the Lava Beds Annual Park Pass will be \$20.

All Lava Beds annual passes purchased before June 14th at the current rate will be honored for one year from month of purchase.

Dorman states that annual passes purchased before the June 14th date should be considered an exceptional value.

Lava Beds National monument and Crater Lake National Park will continue to honor each other's annual park passes giving pass holders unlimited year round recreation opportunities in two distinctly different and unique National Parks.

Eighty percent of the monies collected from passes and entrance fees go directly to improving Lava Beds National Monument with projects funded through the Fee Demonstration program.

Some of the projects completed using these funds have been the information stations located throughout

the Monument, new restroom facilities at Petroglyph Point, Captain Jack's Stronghold, Gillem's Camp and Fleener Chimneys, the new campground amphitheater and

rehabilitation of Mushpot Cave exhibits.

These funds have also helped us to expand Educational Outreach programs to local schools.

New pier at Lake Britton

The pier is accessible to persons with disabilities and is anticipated to become a very popular fishing location for Blue Gill, Crappie, Small Mouth Bass, and Trout.

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

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Big Valley wins league, on to Div. 4 championship with coach of year, 14 first-place wins for track

Big Valley High School's track team won the Evergreen League championship at Tulelake's new six-lane, all-weather, state-of-the-art facility, finishing first in 14 events.

Their coach, Dr. Dan Dahle, was named Coach of the Year.

And sophomore Dieter Salters, a fast athlete, was named Most Outstanding Male Athlete at the meet.

The team competes at the

North State CIF Division 4 small schools championship Friday and they have a good chance of moving on to the section contest the following Friday in West Valley.

But first things first. Big Valley's Boys Team won their meet with a total of 67 points.

Salters won the 400 with a time of 54.74, with Big Valley's Blake Oney close on his heels, finishing second with a time of 55.75. Tel Fulfer finished fourth in 57.57.

Also in the 200 meter, Juan Escalante finished fifth with a time of 25.57 and fifth in the 100 with a time of 11.88

Blake Oney finished first in the 1,600 with a time of 5:11.27, Mike Higgins was second with 5:16.60, and John Legerton was fourth with 5:27.61.

Oney was first in the 800 with a time of 2:15.78. He had a third place finish in the long jump with 18-10.75.

"Oney is very versatile," said Dahle. "He could run in every flat race and get a first or second."

Mike Higgins won the 3,200 in 12:15.87, while

Legerton took second place in 12:48.78.

Legerton finished first in the triple jump with 37-2.25 and J.C. Hunsaker was second with 36-9.25.

Hunsaker was second in the long jump with 19-5 and third in discus with 117-3.

Dahle said Hunsaker is showing a lot of promise.

"He had done the long jump three times in his life when he went out and got that second place for 19-feet, five inches. He was ranked no higher than eighth coming into the meet and wound up coming in third."

Fulfer was second in the 110 high hurdles, with 19.50 and third in the 300 intermediate hurdles with 45.80. Legerton took fourth place with 47.53.

In the high jump, Josh Lavan took fourth with 5-2.

Big Valley had a third place finish in the 4x100 relay with

47.13 and a third in the 4x400 with a time of 4:25.48.

In the Girls' events, the Big Valley team also won overall with 45 points.

Stacy Jurantis finished first in the 1,600 (6:17.28) and first in the 3,200 (16:01.41).

Missy Ackley finished second (7:35.06) in the 1,600 and second in the 3,200 (16:16.97).

Stacy finished second in the 800 (2:53.72).

Cyndi Jurantis finished first in 100-meter (13.63), second in the 400 (71.84), and second in the 200 (28.97).

Rachel Oney finished first in shot put (35-6.25) and first in discus (102-2).

"Rachel also has a lot of talent," said Dahle. "She could be a 40-foot thrower (in college) and she's good in discus."

The Big Valley girls also won the 4x100 relay in 59.19.


