Polling places consolidated in recall election

The Shasta County Election Department is consolidating its polling places for the Oct. 7 special recall election to cut costs and staff training time.

Voters in Burney and Johnson Park will vote at the Grace Community Bible Church on Tamarack.

Precincts in McArthur and Fall River Mills have been consolidated to the Fall River Veterans Hall, according to Shasta County Election Clerk Ann Reed.

The polling places for residents of Cassel, Hat Creek and Old Station are expected to stay the same.

Intermountain area voters who live in Modoc and Lassen counties will receive their ballots in the mail.

The new polling places will be designated on the sample ballots that registered voters receive in the mail.

Election clerks statewide had 77 days notice to prepare for the election to recall Gov. Gray Davis and, said, Reed, "It's just a nightmare."

Precincts are being consolidated statewide.

Los Angeles County has consolidated its usual 4,922 polling places into 1,800 precincts for its nearly 4 million voters, the nation's largest

Although a surveillance camera watches the automatic teller machine, there are no cameras at the rear of the bank where the night deposit drop is located.

Changes coming to BFPD

In a Top Ten List of why they do their job, the Burney Fire Protection District's firefighters and emergency services volunteers put a higher value on being team members who contributed to their community than on pay and benefits, which was at the very bottom of the list.

Risk and excitement on the job came in at Number 7.

The department's Strategic Planning Committee asked the Fire/EMS Association, the staff, and the commissioners to evaluate themselves and the department so they could begin to set goals for the next two to five years.

"We need to update our mission statement so we have a clear idea of why we're here, what we're doing, and what we want to do in the future," said Fire Chief Bob May as he presented the committee's initial recommendations and ideas at the Aug. 13 board meeting.

He said the department had "gone through a lot" since it was established in 1939.

Everyone looked at their strengths, their weaknesses, and the opportunities for growth and reached unanimous agreement: They want to become the best at what they are doing.

"We've got a group of individuals here who want to set a course and get out of the harbor," May said.

"We want to be Number One and to be recognized in Eastern Shasta County as an organization that supports and helps and that others count on 24 hours a day."

Commissioners Lynn Miller and Sally Preheim-Thomsen headed the committee with members Lt. Rick Moore,

volunteer Lt. Courtney Cleckler, Leah Turner, EMT II, and Chief May.

The consensus is that district personnel work well together as a team and that they are a knowledgeable, committed, and enthusiastic group.

But they also recognized that there was a shortage of volunteers and of space at the fire hall and an abundance of outdated and even obsolete equipment.

The volunteers want more training and more opportunities to advance within the department. They also want to promote greater teamwork with other fire departments in the area.

Reviewing what the committee presented as weaknesses, May said the volunteers asked for clarification of the chain of command.

"They want the roles and responsibilities within the organization defined and fairly balanced. This is a group who prefers structure and rules."

Personnel also want a stable board of directors, although May did not elaborate on what that meant.

"The (commissioners) set policy and they also set the tone in the community and we need a stable board," he said.

Employees talked about "unacceptable behaviors" in both the past and present that have not been dealt with.

The influences are both internal and external, May said, describing how even federal and state regulations affect how they do their job.

He said there is a need for more cross training so that both the EMS and fire fighting volunteers are one group, instead of two.

"When someone calls 911, we are the emergency services responders. It's not just fire," May said.

The department also plans to enhance its contributions to the community through more public education and more social activities.

Further into the future are capital improvements and facility needs.

May said he wants to consider whether or not the Black Ranch Road area needs a Station 3.

And, as the Intermountain Area grows, May said they would weigh such options as expanding the district's boundaries, district consolidation, and even contracting for fire service.

"Sometime consolidation works, sometimes it doesn't. If we contract fire service would it give us more or would it give us less. We'll look at that."

The commissioners adopted the work plan so that the committee could draft an organizational chart and consider the internal issues.

They will bring their recommendations to the next board meeting.

"Things will change. Some will be positive and some will be negative. To become Number One in the community will involve all of us," May said.

Abundance of 'pond scum' at lake draws attention of PG&E in report

Late summer is a time to head to Lake Britton and cool off in the water. During recent years, it's also been the time when blue-green algae identified as Gloeotrichia - or pond scum - starts to flourish, making the lake look and smell less than appealing.

The bloom is noticeable in fresh-water lakes, not as tropical, blue-green colored grasses, as the name suggests, but as slightly offensive, reddish brown clumps.

Gloeotrichia (glow-eo-trick-ia) is nothing new to lakes, but is new to Lake Britton and has been remarkably abundant for two summers.

"Although algae blooms

are natural phenomena that occur regularly in aquatic ecosystems, the magnitude and duration of this particular bloom prompted inquiry," according to the recently released Lake Britton Algal Identification Report, prepared by PG&E's Technical and Ecological Services.

PG&E said one possible cause for the new bloom could be agricultural runoff, such as from the nutrient-rich drainage off rice fields upstream of Lake Britton.

"During the approximate time frame of the bloom, the harvest of rice fields occurred up gradient of Lake Britton," according to PG&E's report.

A year ago, PG&E col-

lected surface water samples at Lake Britton - from the marina and Dusty Camp - on Sept. 3 and 4, 2002 to determine the species responsible for the abundance of blooms.

"Our interest developed primarily because the bloom has not been historically observed or recorded as a nuisance bloom at Lake Brit-

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Road projects planned here

The California Dept. of Transportation (Caltrans) will begin several pavement repair projects in and around Redding on Monday, weather permitting.

A contract has been awarded to Western States Surfacing, Inc. of Modesto to apply a protective seal coat to a section of State Route 299 through the Ingot Canyon towards Round Mountain.

The \$646,000 project is designed to extend the life of the existing roadway by preventing the winter rains from seeping into the road base and disrupting the structural section.

The surface treatment will also improve the traction and ride quality of the highway.

Motorists will be subject to one-way traffic controlled by flaggers and pilot cars with delays of up to 16 minutes.

Workers and equipment will be in the area from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m. through Thursday.

A reduced speed zone will be in effect to improve safety conditions through the project.

A second project will begin Monday as construction crews from the Fitch Sand and Gravel Co., of Alturas, will replace deteriorated culverts and apply a new asphalt concrete sur-

face to the bike path along SR 299.

The path runs from Boulder Drive, west of Interstate 5, to College View Drive, east of the freeway.

The bike path will be closed to cyclists and

pedestrians during the project.

Minor delays will be encountered at the ramp crossings near the freeway.

The project is scheduled to be completely by early September.

voting public in one county. Shasta County pared down its usual 199 polling places to 52 precincts.

Even with fewer staff to hire and train, Reed estimates the special election will cost Shasta County about \$241,000.

She said election departments are trying to keep their costs down because there is no guarantee that the state is going to reimburse them.

Voters will be using the new touch-screen system for the first time and Reed said that there would be staff to assist people and a demonstration model at each precinct.

"The touch system is very easy to use, very user-friendly, with a big screen and big print," Reed said.

Voters can also undo a mistake if they happen to make one.

However, with 135 candidates to choose from, voters must scroll through seven pages of names to find the one they want - and they're not in alphabetical order.

Reed suggested that voters study their sample ballots and note where their candidate is before going to the polls.

Sept. 22 is the last day to register to vote in this election.

People who want to vote by absentee ballot can send a letter or postcard to Reed stating their permanent residence address and where they want the absentee ballot mailed. The request must be signed.

"In less than a month we'll be doing this again for the

schools and special districts election," Reed said, referring to the Nov. 4 election. And on Sept. 21, election departments will be preparing the documents for the March 2004 primary set to be mailed to voters on Sept. 28.

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Blue-green algae often gets 'bad rap' as nuisance, noxious

ton," the PG&E report said. Gloeotrichia, a colonial blue-green algae whose name means "gelatinous hair," was observed from the end of July and persisted until mid-September in 2002 - and

it appears to be following the same pattern this season. PG&E said the exact onset in Lake Britton is uncertain; however, the first "significant detection" occurred during late July in the lower basin of the lake above the Pit 3

dam. Generally, bloom development is triggered by light, temperature, pH, and nutrient concentrations, said Jeff Cook, an aquatic ecologist and co-owner of Spring Rivers Ecological Sciences in Cassel.

An oversupply of nutrients, especially phosphorous and nitrogen compounds, will often result in excessive growth of blue-greens," according to the PG&E document.

Cook said extra warm water temperatures contribute to the growth, as well as 'nutrient-loading,' which "sometimes happens naturally and is sometimes human-caused," Cook said.

"There is no smoking gun that we know of," he said. The PG&E document noted that said the methods of harvesting rice "include the purging of nutrient-rich field water into the local water drainage, which may have progressed downstream into Lake Britton.

"Such an influx of nutrient-rich water into the Lake Britton basin, in combination with warm water temperatures" in August may have triggered the uncharacteristic bloom.

But PG&E has not done an in-depth investigation into the causes and said "only speculation may be made as to the cause."

By mid-September, the bloom cycle is ending "accompanied by an unpleasant odor, which is characteristic of blue-green algae bloom die-off," PG&E's scientists said.

"It's not a pleasant smell and people do take notice," Cook said. The odor is a result of "rapid algal cell decomposition."

Cook said the bloom is "nothing to worry about," although an abundance can deplete oxygen in the water.

Severe oxygen depletion could cause fish to die, although Cook stressed that this did not happen last year.

"Severe oxygen depletion is the worst case scenario, but it can occur when there is nutrient loading above and beyond what the system can deal with. However, this is not what is going on in Lake Brit-

ton," Cook said. Although the bloom is not regarded as a health hazard, the World Health Organization in 1989 reported that the die-off could cause poisoning, specifically to animals that might drink the water, or cause skin irritation to humans in the water.

Typical symptoms include redness of the skin and itching, a sore, red throat, headache, diarrhea, vomiting and nausea.

There are poisonous blue-green algae in lakes and ponds throughout the world and there can be both toxic and non-toxic blooms on the same lake, according to the Soil and Water Conservation Society of Halifax, Canada.

An abundance of blue-green algae is in the international news this week and is blamed for depleting fish stocks on the Baltic Sea.

There, too, the natural algae phenomenon is becoming a bigger problem due to nutritional overloads of nitrogen and phosphorus from farms and wastewater.

But the Canadian scientists said that the blue-green algae often get a bad rap.

"They have an undeserved reputation as a nuisance or as noxious," they said.

Blue-greens "are valuable sources of food and some blue-green species provide major contributions to the world food supply by naturally fertilizing soils and rice," the Society said.

In India, blue-greens were added to barren soil so that crops could be grown.

In experiments done at the University of Kansas, scientists found that a coating of blue-greens on prairie soil "binds the particles of the soil to their mucilage coating, maintains a high water content, and reduces erosion."

On Klamath Lake, near Klamath Falls, Ore., blue-green algae is harvested for various health food and medicinal products and is

touted by some as an antioxidant that delays aging, a therapy for mood improvement, and a source for weight management.

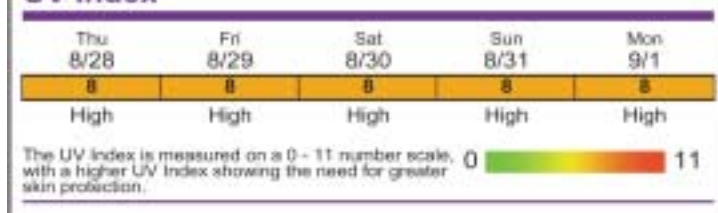

They Are Back on Display

See the Charters of Freedom

This year, on Constitution Day on Sept. 17, the original Charters of Freedom will be back on display at a special ceremony at the National Archives building in Washington, D.C. Beginning on Sept. 18, the public is invited to go and see them.

What are the charters? They are our nation's most treasured documents. They are on parchment, which is a thin piece of animal skin.

More than 200 years ago, clerks used feather pens and ink to write the words of each document in large letters. This is called "engrossing." The documents were then signed by our founding fathers.

Declaration of Independence

With this one-page document, written in 1776, we declared our freedom from England and the right of people to govern themselves.

U.S. Constitution

With these four pages, written in 1787, we created the type of government our nation has and described the basic rights we enjoy as a people.

The Bill of Rights

On this one-page document, written in 1789, are amendments to the Constitution. Together, the amendments list the basic rights and freedom that each American has.

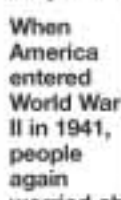
Protecting words of freedom



The Charters of Freedom and other important papers are stored inside the National Archives Building.

For more than 200 years, we have protected our Charters of Freedom. Sometimes they were moved to safer places.

When British soldiers attacked the U.S. capital in 1814, the Declaration and Constitution were put in a linen bag and moved to safety. They were first hidden in an unused mill near the Potomac River, and then taken farther away and hidden in a vault beneath the steps of a house. When it was safe again, they were returned to Washington.



When America entered World War II in 1941, people again worried about the safety of the charters. The Declaration and Constitution were shipped by a special train to one of our safest places, Fort Knox, Ky. They were kept there until 1944. During the Korean War, the Bill of Rights was hidden at Hyde Park, N.Y.

Putting charters on display



Sometimes a Charter of Freedom has been displayed in an unusual way. The Bill of Rights traveled on a special "Freedom Train" to 322 cities from 1947 through 1949.

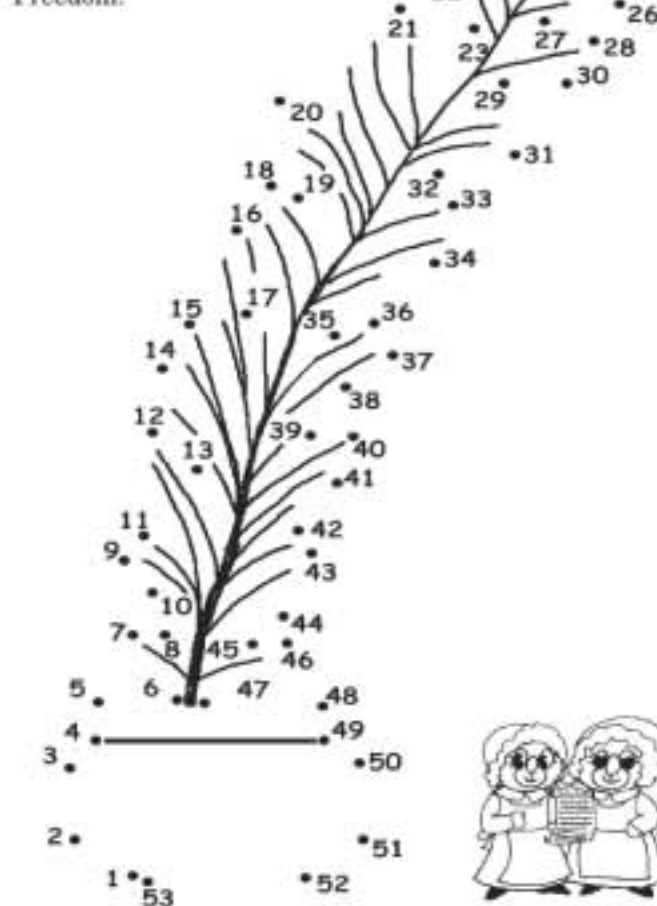
As the charters traveled, they were damaged by all the handling and displaying. The Declaration is the oldest, so it has been displayed most often. It has not been treated as well as the other documents. All the rolling up and unrolling damaged the document. When the Declaration was displayed on the nation's 100th birthday in 1876, people became worried about how bad it looked.

The Constitution has four pages, so it was not displayed as often. It did not go on display full time until 1924 at the Library of Congress, a building in Washington, D.C.

President Harry Truman is credited with the idea of keeping all the charters on display in the same place. They all got a new home at the National Archives Building in 1952.

Where Words of Freedom Stay

Since the birth of our nation, we've worked hard for hundreds of years to preserve our first written words of freedom.

What do you do with your most valuable things? Some people hide things in a closet. Some put valuables in a vault. Some use safe-deposit boxes in a bank. Important books and papers are kept in libraries.

Our nation keeps some of its most valuable records at the National Archives building, located on Constitution Avenue in our capital.

Preserving the charters

Over time, the biggest dangers to the charters have proved to be moisture, heat, sunlight, and dust and dirt.

The documents became more fragile as they aged. The Declaration was in such bad shape that it was put away in a vault in total darkness in 1894. The plans were that the public would never see it again.

The Declaration was brought out of the vault and re-examined in 1921. Experts decided that it would be safe if it were put in a special airtight case and placed back on display.

Improving charters' home

Seeing the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution and the Bill of Rights with our own eyes helps us to appreciate our freedom and the meaning of democracy. The documents are a popular attraction. In the past, more than a million people have visited the National Archives building each year to see them.

The documents are displayed in the Rotunda, a large, round part of the building with a dome. For more than two years, the documents have not been on display. They have been restored, and their home, the Rotunda, improved.

This fall, Americans can again see the charters when the Rotunda reopens.

For the first time in the Rotunda, all four pages of the Constitution will be displayed, along with the Declaration and the Bill of Rights. Before, only the first and last pages of the Constitution were displayed.

Special cases for charters

We're much more careful with the charters today than we have sometimes been in the past. For example, at one time the Declaration was displayed opposite a window so that sunlight shone directly on it. Once it was hung in a cabinet near a smoking fireplace.

For the past 50 years, the documents were in special cases designed by scientists. They were in cases of metal and glass. A gas, helium, filled the case, called an encasement. The gas helped to protect the documents from insects and damage from oxygen.

But checks revealed the encasements were going bad. So scientists were asked to find a better way to protect the charters.

The new cases will be of stronger metal and glass. This time, the glass will not touch the parchments, and a different gas, argon, will fill the case. Argon has larger molecules than helium, so it is less likely to leak.

The new cases will also be put in positions where all visitors, including children and people in wheelchairs, can easily see them.
