District to chlorinate water in Burney

Burney High 1 of 5 finalists in contest

Burney High School may not have won a visit from singer Michelle Branch, but the contest on the Channel One Network did a lot for school and community spirit and even provided a new educational tool.

"This was the biggest thing to hit Burney in a long time and it hasn't even happened," said Assistant Principal and teacher Cindy Diezsi in the midst of last week's voting frenzy.

On Tuesday, just as classes were ending for the day, the school received word that Burney High was one of five finalists in Channel One's Branching Out contest.

And one of the five finalists could receive a visit - and a complimentary concert - from Michelle Branch.

The fact that 200 schools entered the contest and that Burney made it to the final five "is an amazing accomplishment," said Morgan Wandell, executive vice-president of programming for Channel One.

Education foundation to hold annual auction; has awarded \$118,074 for school projects

The Burney-Fall River Education Foundation is having its annual auction and fundraising dinner on Friday at the Inter-Mountain Fairgrounds in McArthur.

Since the Foundation was established 11 years ago, it has funded \$118,074 for educational projects within the Fall River Joint Unified School District.

None of the grants would have been possible without the support of the community.

The Foundation awarded almost \$21,000 in grants last year for educational projects in local schools.

In recent issues, The Intermountain News has highlighting some of the Foundation's grants and the teachers and students who have benefited.

The following was written by Fall River High School senior Natalie Martin as part of her senior project in journalism.

The Burney-Fall River Education Foundation awarded a \$1,533 grant last year written by Fall River High School resource Specialist Mrs. Kelly Freeland-Sloat for Study Lab Support in the seventh through twelfth grades.

She purchased a computer and printer and five AlphaSmart portable keyboards.

The computer has reading programs that the students can do when they come into her class and don't have any homework.

Mrs. Sloat said the AlphaSmart

keyboards are really nice because a lot of her students don't have computers at home and they were able to take the AlphaSmarts home to do homework.

"The computer has helped a lot, especially with the seniors," she said. It's nice to have a computer other than mine that the kids can use.

"The computer also helps with the remedial reading. This class helps the kids be independent by instilling confidence. These kids may have confidence in other areas, but not in school. I want to see my kids further their education and get a good job," she said.

In her class, Mrs. Sloat re-teaches lessons and reviews con-

cepts in slower ways so that her students understand.

"She is always there for help and she is easy to ask questions without being nervous about it," said Roy Bell, a senior at Fall River.

While in Mrs. Sloat's class, Bell said he does homework and projects, just like in any other classroom.

Though he said he doesn't use the computer that much, there are kids who do use it all the time.

The grant funds given to this classroom have helped students, not only with their lessons, but also by giving them a chance to get typing done that could not have gotten done without the computer and AlphaSmarts.

23,000. "When I saw that I told her the Italian votes were coming in," joked Diezsi.

The school began to think that perhaps the other schools with so many votes had set up an automatic voting system on their computers, and the school's computer class looked into trying that.

And, said Wandell, his company thought that, too.

"One thing we saw on the on-line polls were that people had set up BOTS so they could vote over and over again and we think there were definitely some BOTS in play.

"But that's neither here nor there. The rules stipulated Michelle would make the final choice and in no way were the results tied to the final numbers."

Wandell said the point of the contest "was to showcase what young people all over the country - like those in Burney - are doing."

Plus, there's still going to be "something from Michelle" for all the entrants, he said.

The idea to enter the contest took hold just before spring break when seventh grader Kim Covington took note of the contest while watching the daily classroom news broadcast on Channel One.

She mentioned it to Diezsi who mentioned it to her Leadership Class.

"Her music is cool, let's do it," said senior Michele Lehman.

They would have to write an essay on how Burney students make a difference in their community and produce a two-minute video, both of which were on line for a week for all the world to see.

They also had to provide letters of support from Principal Larry Hutchinson and two adults - Owen Plummer and Cindy Diezsi.

Nicole Carlotto wrote the essay, describing the community and its people, including community projects by the 300 students at Burney High Students - holiday decorating, canned food

drives, blood drives, caroling at the Burney Annex, serving the Lions Club community Thanksgiving feast, helping the Lions Club decorate Easter eggs, painting murals on buildings to spruce up storefronts.

She also noted the shock the town felt when Burney graduate and U.S. Marine Corps Capt. Matt Bancroft was killed during the War on Afghanistan and the community tribute that the student organized for his friends and

family. "These things have been done because we care about our community," Carlotto wrote.

"In return for our efforts, community members are willing to help us in everything we do. They decorate their businesses for homecoming week, sponsored the repainting of our school's gym...we have a wonderful relationship with our town."

She brought a draft of her essay into class for input from

the others. "After she read it there was absolute silence and then spontaneous applause," said Diezsi.

The students who stayed in town over spring break made video, filmed by Kaylie Babajan and narrated by Serene Hutchinson.

"It opened with the Welcome to Burney fish sign that Jessica Stawiarski did and, following a montage of photos, finished with the kids picking up trash in the woods, as we do every spring for Community Clean-Up."

Then, said Diezsi, the stu-

dents climbed on the giant wooden bench in front of the school. Since the contest was called Branching Out, they said they would make like a tree and leaf.

"This has also been a real learning experience," said Diezsi.

As the votes began to add up on line, math teacher Lori Cottengim worked the contest into a linear project for her pre-calculus class.

Students also did Internet research and discovered that Burney - in competition with high schools in San Antonio, Texas, Brookhaven, Missis-

sippi, Sylvania, Ohio, and Tucson, Arizona - was the smallest school.

They looked up the populations of each of the towns.

They also found out that Branch had graduated from a high school in Tucson and had an upcoming concert date in Flagstaff and they began to wonder if all the voting even mattered.

And in the end, Santa Rita High School in Tucson did win.

"But the kids had a lot of fun," said Diezsi. And so did everyone else who got involved.



Hawkins, Cearley place at John Frank Invite

Big Valley's Jamie Hawkins and Fall River's Destiny Cearley were the lone Intermountain high school athletes to place first at Saturday's John Frank Invitational track and field meet.

The event, hosted by Central Valley High School, was held at Shasta High School in Redding.

Hawkins placed first in the varsity girls shot put with a mark of 37 feet, 5 1/4 inches.

Cearley won the 300 hurdles in a time of 47.96 seconds. She also placed second in the 100-meter race in a time of 13.34 seconds. Cearley did not compete in another of her

top events, the 400-meter race, after running in that race at a meet a day earlier.

"She was just at a meet the night before in Davis," Fall River track and field coach Geri Handa said, adding the Woody Wilson Invitational included top athletes from over 30 schools from all over northern California.

"It featured the cream of the crop," Handa said.

At the Davis meet, Cearley placed third in the 300 hurdles and fourth in the 400 meter race.

As for Saturday's John Frank meet, Fall River had the most success of the area

high schools, including Jack Arnold, who took third in the varsity boys 1600M (4:38.66) and fourth in the 800M (2:06.98).

(Arnold also competed at Davis the day before and placed 11th out of 16 runners in the 1600 meter run, finishing in a time of 4:37.8, his best time this year in that event).

Others placing at Saturday's meet at Shasta High School for the Bulldogs were Greg Handa, who took fifth in the varsity boys triple jump (39-9), Vern Brown who placed sixth in the var-

sity boys discus (130-4 3/4) and the varsity boys 4 x 100 relay team which placed fifth (46.68).

Big Valley's varsity boys 4 x 100 relay team finished just behind Fall River in sixth place in a time of 48.91 seconds.

Burney High School had two athletes place at the meet, both in the junior varsity division.

Amanda Wade took third in the girls 100 hurdles (17.72) while teammate Eric Frazier placed fifth in the boys 300 hurdles (44.93).

Fall River Junior High does well in first meet at Siskiyous college

Fall River Junior High track team competed in their first meet of the year at the College of the Siskiyous in Weed on Saturday, April 20th.

Under the guidance of Geri Handa, the team brought home 21 ribbons!

This meet had fifth/sixth competing against each other along with seventh/eighth.

Seventh grader, Casi Carpenter, had a throw of 22, in the shot put, good for third place.

Another seventh grader, John McArthur, competed in the shot put, 100 meters and placed fifth in the 200 in 29.31.

Brent Handa, also in the seventh, did the long jump, high jump in 4,4% for fourth,

1600 in 5:37 for first, and 800 in 2:33.5 for second.

For the eighth grade, Thomas Turner placed fifth with a throw of 30,3% in the shot put.

Christina Sahlin ran the 200 in 29.75, good for second and the 100 in 14.2 for a third place.

Caleb King ran the 100 in 13.9 for second, the 200 in 28.08 for third, and jumped 13,7% in the long jump for a fifth place.

The sixth grade was represented by two female athletes.

Karissa King placed second in the long jump, 10,3 %%, triple jump first, 19,8%, fourth in the 55 meter hurdles and second in the 100, 15.75.

A possible future heptathlete, Caitlin Royse

placed third in the long jump, 10%1%, second in the triple jump, 18,2%, third in the high jump, 3,10%, third in the 55 meter hurdles, third in the 800, 3:23.9, and third in the 100, 15.9.

All in all, these athletes did very well for their first meet.

Their next meet will be in Lakeview on Saturday, April 27th.

Other members of the team include Elizabeth Eye, Brian Kerr, Haley Oilar, Tyler Rajnus, and Kurt and Travis Schneider

The Constitution State

Connecticut From A to Z



Connecticut is the third-smallest state in area, measuring only 90 miles east to west and 55 miles north and south. It is the 29th most-populated state, with about 3,400,000 people.

It is a leader in industries such as insurance and transportation-related manufacturing.

Algonquian Indian tribes such as the Pequot were the first to live in the area. The first European explorer was Adriaen Block, who claimed the area for the Netherlands in 1614.

The Dutch and British both settled there in 1633. England claimed the whole area in 1674.

Connecticut was one of the 13 original colonies, and one of the most important states in the Revolutionary War. Connecticut delegates were leaders in the Constitutional Convention of 1787.

It became the fifth state in the Union in 1788.



Connecticut's many small towns still remind us of the state's Colonial history. This Congregational church in Litchfield is a common Colonial style.

American history owes much to the state. In 1787 the delegates from Connecticut came up with a compromise about how many representatives each state could send to the new Congress. This is one reason it is called the Constitution State.

Bridgeport is the largest city, with about 142,000 people. P.T. Barnum, who founded the Barnum & Bailey Circus, was mayor. He helped turn this port into a top transportation center.

The **Coastline** on the state's southern boundary has many bays and harbors. A busy waterway, Long Island Sound, separates Connecticut from New York's Long Island.

In **Dinosaur State Park** in Rocky Hill, there are about 2,000 fossilized dinosaur tracks from the Jurassic period.

Eli Whitney, from New Haven, invented the cotton gin in 1794. It did the work of about 50 people. The Eli Whitney Museum in Hamden highlights his contributions to mass production.

The **Fundamental Orders** were adopted by early settlers in 1639. Some people think of them as the first written constitution in America. It is another reason Connecticut is known as the Constitution State.

Village Greens, or public areas of natural beauty, were the centers of many Colonial villages.

Go dot to dot and color. Ships from the past remind us of the influence of the sea on Connecticut.

More About Connecticut

Hartford, the state capital, has the oldest statehouse in the U.S. It was built in 1796. Hartford is the second-largest city.

More than 100 Insurance companies have offices in Connecticut. The first U.S. sea shipping insurance was sold there about 200 years ago. The first accident insurance policy in the U.S. was sold in Hartford in 1864.

Jet engine, nuclear submarine and helicopter manufacturing, plastics, metalworking, electronics and medicines are top industries.

Kayaking, canoeing, rafting, fishing, biking, skiing and hiking are popular outdoor activities.

Lake Compounce in Bristol was the first family theme park in America. It was built in 1846.

The **Mountain laurel** is the state flower. There are mountains in the northwest part of the state.

Mystic Seaport is a recreation of a shipbuilding and whaling town of the 1800s. Its museum has the largest collection of boats in the world.

Rebuttal to article in April 2 Mt. Echo

Editor:

The following refers to an article printed in the April 2 issue of the Mountain Echo

Your April 2 article concerning the "recent" (?) questions about the bookkeeping accuracy of the Burney Fire District was interesting.

You asked the department if there was anything wrong with their bookkeeping and they "show nothing is wrong."

What did you think they would say?

I have been asking questions since I started attending (fireboard) meetings in July 2001.

I even gave the board members written lists, twice.

I have heard a lot of excuses and gotten some snappy responses, but not any real answers.

Rick Graham of the Shasta County Auditor's office is correct about the fire department books being just like a business or personal checking account.

And just like any business or individual, the Burney Fire Department should do a monthly reconciliation when they print out the county report.

A reconciliation in November would have found that misposted \$8,908 ambulance revenue, among other things.

In January faxed the fire department a request for a copy of the January balance sheet and the faxed response was "need clarification".

Not knowing what a balance sheet is may explain why the cash in the bank figure reported at the meetings has not been correct once in eight months.

In February, a member of the finance committee explained that it is not necessary to know how much money is in the bank until the end of the year.

How does the board know that the district doesn't have any money if they don't know how much money is or is not in the bank?

On March 2, I read in the newspaper that, according to the fire department, "if they know where the error is and why, it doesn't matter until the end of the fiscal year on June 30 when everyone's books must balance."

That's an interesting philosophy.

As of June 30, 2001 the quarterly payroll reports did not agree with the department books.

So when does this balancing act take place?

This year's payroll doesn't stand a chance of balancing to the books.

If they don't know where the errors are, how do they know that it needs to be fixed at the end of the year?

Isn't the end of the year a little too late? And that audit that is done periodically as mandated by law? The audit for the year ending June 30, 2001 hasn't been done yet and even when it is complete, it won't tell you anything about this year.

In January the finance committee presented a budget analysis that was like nothing I have ever seen.

They took the total of one of the two budgets and divided by 12, then multiplied that figure by six, then added six to six and told everyone they were in good shape.

When I pointed out that some of the figures they used were incorrect, they said that

it was okay as long as the figures were higher.

In February the finance committee presented a salary and benefit worksheet for next year's budget.

The FICA figure was off by \$5,700, the health insurance had a \$6,000 error and another \$3,000-\$5,000 error and (here we go again) the workman's comp was off by about \$5,000 and apparently the method used to figure the step increases was incorrect.

The explanation? It doesn't matter if they don't use the correct percentages and figures because it is only a worksheet.

Of course, if you make enough mistakes in both directions, you just might come out close to right.

Why waste time on worksheets using incorrect figures?

The finance committee keeps boasting that the 2002-2003 budget figures (from the above-mentioned worksheet) are \$17,000 to \$24,000 below this year's salary budget.

Their worksheet shows a salary budget of \$176,404 to \$182,944 depending on the new chief's salary.

The current year salary budget is \$185,58. But, if you subtract the \$30,000 employee they are not replacing, it would appear to me that they have an adjusted budget of \$155,858.

Some members of the board want to know exactly how much the ambulance costs the district when it goes out the door.

They can't even tell how much they have spent on ambulance fuel so far this year, let alone how much per run.

The fire vs. ambulance split of bills is a real mystery.

If the board says there is not money, then how do they justify spending \$224.90 on parking permits?

When was this issue presented to the board?

Perhaps they are planning on using the permits as a fundraiser since neither the employees nor the volunteers park in the parking lot.

If the hiring committee wanted money for advertising, why didn't they do their homework?

Checking out the rates, preparing a worksheet with the correct figures, and putting the worksheet in the board packet, as required by the board policy, would have saved a lot of "discussion" at the board meeting.

The workman's comp issue has been ongoing, this is a fifth grade level math problem but they won't even attempt to figure it out.

They keep asking the insurance company if it is correct.

Isn't that like the Mt. Echo asking the district if there is a problem with their books?

The board didn't care if they were overpaying by \$8,000 because they might get a refund someday considering they are trying to find funds to hire a captain.

Advertise for a new chief, and purchase needed fire equipment that \$8,000 would be nice to have now.

If the board knew what their cash balance was and had a true budget analysis, they would know that there is more than enough money to purchase the turnouts and boots that the volunteers need.

Lt. Rick Moore did a good job on the worksheet, he presented, but it should have included all the jackets, pants and boots needed by the volunteers.

This is safety gear! The fire and EMS volunteers are the most important assets of this department and they should have proper safety equipment.

A Mountain Echo editorial, a few weeks ago, mentioned how fast the EMT's and other emergency personnel appeared on the scene of an accident.

However, it failed to mention the 12 ambulance calls in February that did not have coverage.

The on duty officer handled seven of the calls and

the other five had to wait for an ambulance from Mayers Memorial Hospital.

Our volunteers have full time jobs, go to school, have families, and spend countless hours training.

They cannot make every call.

Perhaps, if the community knew there was a real need for more EMT's, enough people would volunteer to start a new class it's worked in the past.

This community is lucky to have such a dedicated and talented group of volunteers.

Let's not take a chance in losing any of them due to mismanagement or poor leadership.

The new chief is going to have his hands full without having to straighten out the finances.

He (or she) certainly won't have time to lock himself in his office in "solitaire" confinement, contemplating administrative decisions all day.

I keep asking questions because I hold out hope that they will start looking at the books and start treating the district like a business.

It is a business that uses public funds.

Some progress has been made.

After six months, two of the board members agreed there might be a problem with the workman's comp.

Last month was the first month the board had the financial reports in their board packets prior to the meeting.

Maybe, just maybe, the board will actually look at the reports before the meetings and have questions, too.

Prescribed burning to begin at LNF

As soon as the weather permits, the Hat Creek Ranger District of the Lassen National Forest will begin prescribed burning.

Burning will take place on the Hat Creek Rim, in the "Ladder" project area near Ladder Butte, and in the "Rim" project area, on the rim near Hwy 44.

Some burning will also take place in the "Wheel" project area off of Hwy 89/44 southwest of Old Station.

Exact dates for burning will depend on favorable weather and fuel conditions.

Fire managers must wait for vegetation to dry enough, from spring rains, to ignite.

When conditions become favorable for ignitions, the district hopes to complete approximately 1500 acres of underburning.

Underburning is the lighting and managing of low intensity fire, under the forest canopy.

Actual areas completed will depend on the weather.

As soon as fuel and weather conditions become too dry, burning will be suspended for the season.

Every effort will be made to manage the effects of smoke, and keep the smoke to a minimum in our communities.

The smoke will be monitored and burning will be curtailed when conditions become unfavorable for smoke dispersion.

The prescribed fire program is very important to maintaining a healthy ecosystem.

The underburning will reduce the build up of fuels such as: overgrown dead and dry brush, wood slash, and ground litter and twigs.

Reducing the amount fuel built up on the forest floor reduces the risk of a catastrophic wildfire.

In addition to reducing the potential for large wildfires, the low intensity prescribed fires can also make way for new growth, an important food source for wildlife.






