Forest Service employees spend day clearing trash near Highways 299, 89

On May 7, employees of the Hat Creek Ranger District spent the entire day picking up trash near the junction of Highways 299 and 89. Their concerted efforts resulted in filling four extra-large, metal dumpsters.

This operation was not, nor has been, an annually scheduled event, but rather a lets-do-something reaction to a problem that plagues this and other rural communities throughout the nation.

Specifically, illegal dumping of garbage on forest lands.

Eyewitnesses to such acts may contact the U.S. Forest Service.

A description of the vehicle, occupants, license plate, and, if possible, the load of garbage would be helpful.

Having been apprehended and convicted, past offenders were fined up to \$5,000 and made to clean up and legally dispose of their mess.

The perpetrators probably represent less than 1 percent of the local population, yet their discarded

waste leaves all who normally appreciate the aesthetic beauty of the forest with a feeling of disgust and anger.

The piles of refuse moved off site that day included numerous appliances (washing machines, dryers, freezers, refrigerators, and water heaters - all with and without bullet holes), automobile parts (cabs, fenders, hoods, doors, camper shells, pick-up beds, rims and at least 50 tires), construction material (drywall, composition shingles, electrical wire, bricks, broken concrete slabs, & metal fencing), television sets, mattresses, porcelain toilets, bed springs, sofas, chairs, roles of household carpeting, clothes, magazines, plastic wading pools, oil filters, plastic oil cans, broken garden tools, and hundreds of beer bottles, beer cans, canning jars, and spent shotgun shells.

An informal vote among the 24 Forest Service employees doing the cleanup identified the most disgusting site that they'd discovered.

The winner, without having to

recount the chads, was a hold-your-nose large pile of used plastic diapers (something akin to a 6-month supply).

Our work was limited by the capacity to move the junk at hand, forcing us to leave behind at least 3 abandoned cars & numerous appliances that had been shoved over a steep, rocky cliff.

None of us present that day could begin to understand why anyone would do these things.

Impromptu discussions struggled with possible solutions that ranged from increased law enforcement up to and including a couple days per year of free garbage disposal (no questions asked) at the designated county dump-sites in Burney and Fall River.

Sadly, this was only one of many sites that currently exist around our communities.

As we bagged up the strewn remnants of a pile that contained children's toys, someone asked a question, "Do you think their kids were here to see them do this?"

Audit draws fire with commission

Commissioners for the Burney Fire Department expected to discuss their recent audit report with their accountant at the May 8 board meeting and were disappointed to hear that he is out of the country until October.

"I'm not willing to do business with someone who is not here to answer questions," said Commissioner Lynn Miller during a subsequent discussion about whether the board wanted to sign another service agreement with Burney Certified Public Accountant Charles Pillon.

"I have a lot of questions," Miller said. "I'm not questioning the validity of the audit, but about why categories are the way they are."

Board President Donna Sylvester said they could compile their audit questions and FAX them to Pillon and the board agreed to that.

Miller also objected to Pillon's proposed audit schedule for 2002 that he would start Oct. 31 and complete Dec. 31. "The time frame is deplorable," she said.

Commissioner Ann Walker noted that Pillon has audited the fire department's books during that same time frame since the

Diezsi chosen as top teacher

It's seeing the look of comprehension in his students' faces that has kept Burney High School science teacher John Diezsi interested in his profession for 32 years and last week he was honored for his dedication.

Diezsi has been named teacher of the Year, an award that is presented annually by the Fort Crook Masonic Lodge No. 250.

Diezsi's fellow teachers and Principal Larry Hutchinson selected him for the award that was presented by Buzz Brown, Marshall of Ft. Crook Masonic Lodge, Ken Taylor, Senior Deacon, and Davis Henrichsen, Master, during a ceremony at the school May 3.

Diezsi started his teaching career in Glendora in 1970 and has been at Burney High School since he and his family moved here in 1979.

"I've always taught science," he said, although over the years he has additionally taught social studies, English, physical education and driver training.

Last year Diezsi, a runner, started a cross-country team at Burney High School. "It's a self-funded sport at the school and something they've never had before," he said. He is also helping coach the track team this year.

department first signed a contract with him in 1999. At that time he also did audits for previous years to get the fire department's books up to date. She suggested asking if the audit could be done earlier.

The board decided to go out to bid for a CPA, including Pillon, but to first talk to Shasta County Auditor-Controller Rick Graham about the correct procedure.

Since Graham had also written to remind the department to submit their audit, they agreed to mail it with a cover letter explaining that they were still waiting to talk to Pillon before signing off on it.

In another financial matter, the Budget and Finance Committee presented a \$346,000 preliminary budget with revised account categories and asked that any questions or revisions be submitted in writing to Secretary Lenetta Harris by May 20.

The public hearing for the budget will be at 6 p.m. May 29 in the fire hall. The commissioners plan to approve the final budget at their June 12 board meeting and submit it to the county.

Commissioner and Budget Committee Chair Donna Caldwell said she would be on vacation during this process and asked Miller to take charge for her.

In another matter, the department's computer tech and fire engineer Brian Ludwick asked the commissioners to consider switching from dial-up Internet service to DSL (dedicated service line) for better efficiency for about \$5 more than current service costs.

The only expense, Ludwick said, "is that we would have to purchase a router — unless someone wants to donate one." The board approved the estimated \$200 expenditure, but it wasn't necessary. The following day a router was donated anonymously from Redding.

"It was very challenging to play against them. Whether they were retired or current players, they all had awesome strength and speed and a lot of savvy, even and especially Cliff Branch who is now in his 50s.

"I was guarding him and said something, turned my head for a second and when I turned back he had the ball and was gone. He is still so quick," Corder said.

"I had a nice time visiting with them before, during and after the game. They did an outstanding job here."

The Raiders and 49ers also invited young players from the stands to come onto the court and take their free-throw shots, which most of the kids made, adding points to the board for the pro athletes.

Legendary Raider, No. 21, Cliff Branch played for the Oakland Raiders from 1972 to 1981 and then for the Los Angeles Raiders from 1982 to 1985. He holds the record for the longest pass play in Raider history and was the number three all-time receiver with 501 catches for 8,685 yards and 67 touch-

downs.

Mervyn Fernandez played high school and college football in San Jose before signing on with the LA Raiders for 12 years, playing from 1987 to 1992. He is now a salesman for the 7-Up Bottling Company.

Mike Wilson, a wide receiver for the San Francisco 49ers from 1981 to 1990, played in four winning Super Bowls — Nos. XVI, XIX, XXII and XXIV.

In 1992, Wilson was hired as a college coach for Stanford University. In 1995, he joined the Oakland Raiders as a Pro Coach and in 1997 he was hired by USC as their wide receiver coach. He is now in private business.

Quarterback John Paye was the 1987 draft pick for the 49ers in 1987 and played for them in 1988.

Quarterback Tim Rattay was drafted by the 49ers from Louisiana Tech and has been with the San Francisco team since 2000.

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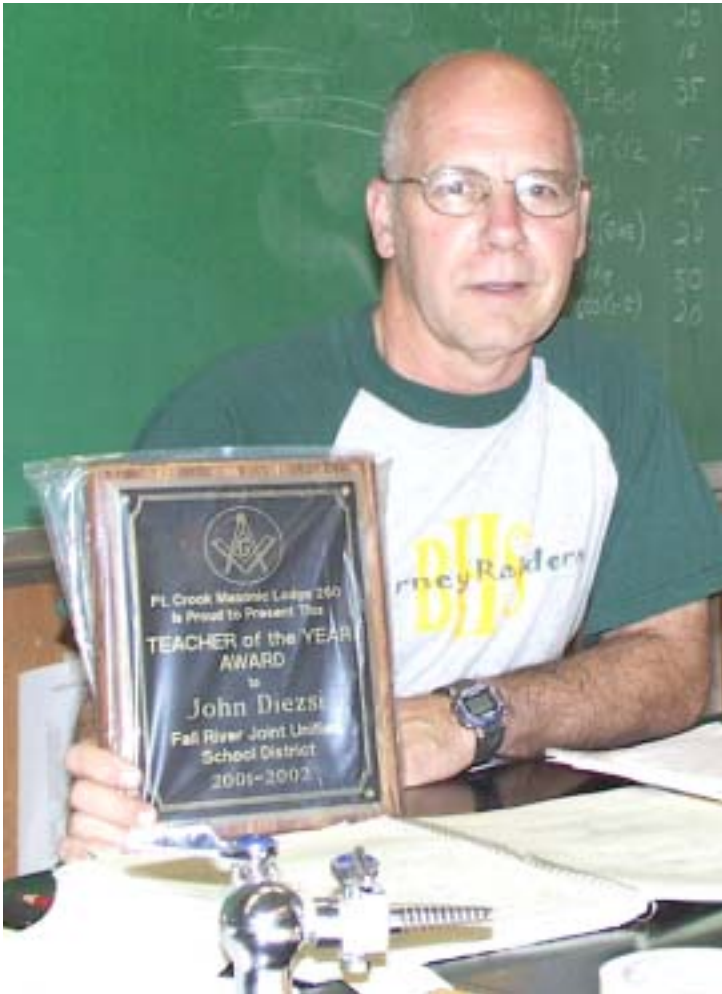

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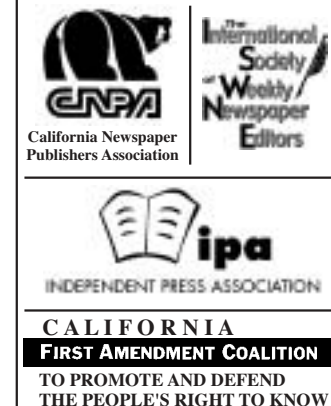

Safety measures could save district as much as \$85,000

If school employees watch their step, they could help save as much as \$85,000 a year in the district's Workers Compensation insurance rate.

DeeWayne Field, safety coordinator for the Fall River Joint Unified School District, says that if employees learn to slow down and pay attention, they will have many fewer accidents.

"I'm trying to get to where people are more safety-minded and are paying more attention to their surroundings," he said.

The number of accidents reported in the district has already gone down since Field was hired last summer.

"As of April 1, 2002, we've had 25 incidences versus 35 for that time period last year," Field said.

Of the 25 accidents, only two were reportable to Workers Comp.

One claim, for an employee who sustained a broken ankle after tripping over a student's backpack, was approved. The other claim is still pending.

"All the other accidents involved first aid and no time was lost," Field said.

"We've had six visits to doctors compared to 13 visits last year," he said.

Chief Business Official Roger Borkey said the district had to do something when it was listed as one of five school districts paying the highest insurance rates due to the severity and quantity of their on site accidents.

The district has group insurance with about 40 other school districts in Shasta, Tehama, Trinity and Siskiyou counties, said Borkey, in a Joint Power Agreement to save on insurance costs.

Being in their Top Five is not an honor, but Borkey

said if the district can get into an average range, it could save between \$80,000 and \$85,000 a year.

"It will probably take two years to bring our rates down, but if we continue as we have been, it will happen," Field said.

Part of Field's job is to chart the accidents, look for trends and take corrective action.

So far, he doesn't see a trend at all.

"Accidents go up every other month, but I don't know why," he said.

There were six accidents in the district in September and one in October; seven in November and one in December, five in January and one in February, and three in March.

The majority of the district's accidents are a result of tripping and slipping and falling over electrical cords, tree limbs and backpacks, Field said.

He is also doing staff training with everyone from maintenance to teachers in compliance with CAL-OSHA, the state's Occupational Safety and Health Administration program.

He has done an 11-point fire extinguisher training, "so everyone understands the proper way to use them" and bought in a qualified for hazardous materials training for the safe handling of weed killers, paint and varnish.

Field works part-time for the school district. He is retired after 39 years with PG&E, where he worked as a lineman and volunteered to run safety programs.

He was so successful as safety chairman in the Oroville, Colusa and Marysville offices, that he was named Safety Chairperson for the entire division when he transferred to Burney.

Ryan J. Cox of Fall River Mills received one of four \$200 scholarships. A member of Pine Grove 4-H Club for nine years, he plans to attend Shasta College and then transfer to Cal Poly to major

in civil engineering.

Christy Ludwigsen of Fall River Mills also received a \$200 scholarship. She has been a member of Evergreen 4-H Club for eight years. She plans to attend Lassen College and then transfer to CSU, Chico to major in equine medicine. She wants a career revolving around equine care and cattle management.

The awards were presented April 22 after the applicants had been interviewed and read their 4-H stories to Marvin Peterson, former Superintendent/Principal of the Igo/Ono Platina School District; Sally Oakes, a business owner and former 4-H member; and Doni Greenberg, columnist for the Record Searchlight.

The Shasta County 4-H Council sponsored the scholarships with a donation from the Wal-Mart Foundation.

Mrs. Gary Hill might be.

The framed and numbered lithographs are described in the letter to the fire department as "part of a special collection based on the fiction works of L. Ron Hubbard."

The letter is from Author Services, Inc., a Hollywood agency that represents Hubbard's works.

Hubbard is the founder of Dianetics and Scientology, which developed into his Church of Scientology.

He also wrote science fiction novels and the lithographs are described as an artist's "visual interpretation of Hubbard's fiction creations" from his book, Battlefield Earth. The artist's name is not mentioned.

For now, the gifts, hanging on the fire department's wall, remain a mystery.

A spokeswoman for Joni Labaqui in public affairs at Author Service's, Inc. said she only answers questions by e-mail and she has not yet replied to calls or e-mail.

"We were 1-1 until the third inning and stayed with them for awhile, but they scored two runs an inning for the next three," Hubauer stated.

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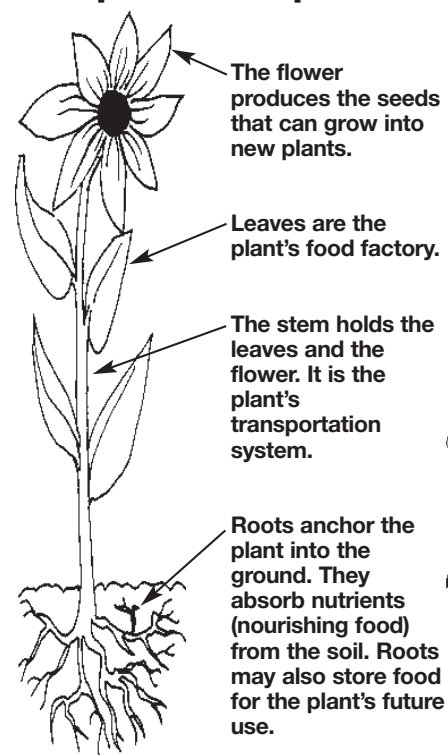

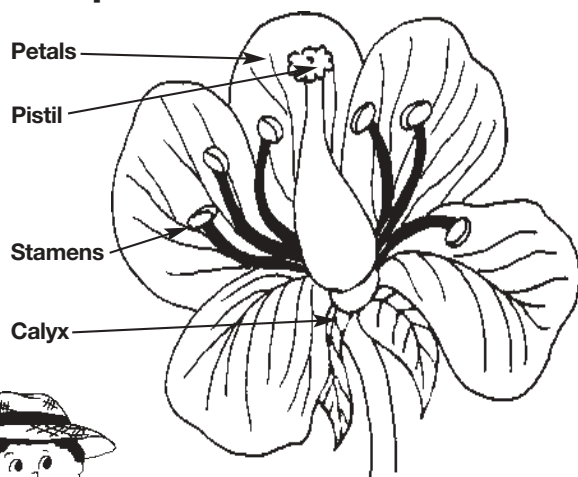

Most flowers have:

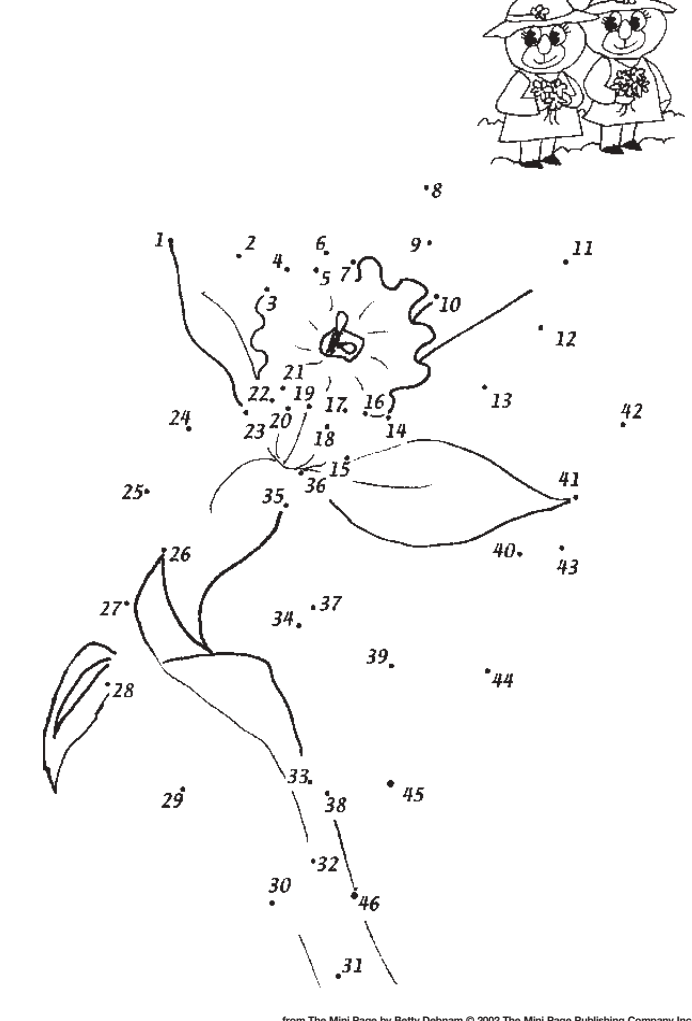
- petals that help attract insects to carry pollen from one plant to another.
- a calyx (ka-licks), or covering, at the bottom of the petals. It protects the flower's inner parts.
- stamens, or the male part of the flower. They make the pollen.
- a pistil, or the female part of the flower. It makes the seeds.

In order for a flower to make seeds, pollen from the male part (the stamens) must reach the female part (the pistil).

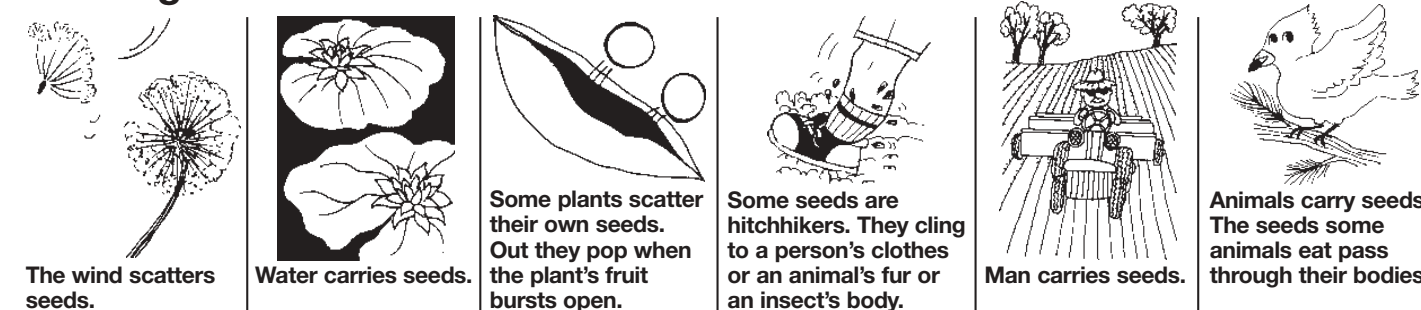
Some flowers have the male and female parts in separate flowers or separate plants. For example, hollies are either male or female. You have to have both to get the beautiful red berries.

Young student brings BB gun on school bus

Editor:

On Tuesday May 7, 2002 a Fall River Elementary student boarded a school bus and entered the school's campus with a gun intending to do harm to the students who had subjected her to relentless teasing.

Fortunately the gun was "only" a BB gun and she thwarted in her attempt to cause harm, but we might not be so lucky the next time this type of thing happens.

And I believe there will be a next time.

I have long felt that this small little community in the mountains is a hot bed for violence.

There are racial tensions between the Native American and white populations that have long been unaddressed and its effects can be felt on the elementary school level.

I feel that some members of the district administration and local law enforcement have been chomping at the bit for some action.

That the district as a whole looks at teasing and bullying as a "kids will be kids" problem and does not take it seriously.

That some members of

the school staff are grossly uneducated and trained in how to deal with this problem effectively, namely the yard duty personnel.

I have suggested that the district adopt a zero tolerance policy against teasing and bullying since I arrived here almost three years ago.

That means that each and every incident of teasing and bullying be taken seriously and that there are grave consequences for those who break the rules.

Our students need a policy like this to empower them against their tormentors.

Currently children who are teased during their recess time are typically shunned by the yard duty personnel when they make attempts to get help.

Their pleas and need for help go unanswered and they are admonished for being a "tattle tale".

This serves to make our students feel helpless in the face of a bully.

Unless there is "bodily" harm done the problem goes unnoticed.

There are those who feel that such a policy would be hard to implement, but my children have attended school in a district with such a policy and I know that it can work effectively.

If each and every incident of teasing is confronted and the students and their parents know that the consequences are going to be severe there might only be the need for a handful of reprimands before the rest of the school population feels the teeth of this policy.

There are programs that help schools implement peer mediation where 6th grade students are taught peace-making and mediation skills and help the yard duty personnel patrol the play area.

There are peaceful solutions to this timeless problem, but to ignore it is an open invitation to more violence.

My heart breaks for the students, for this student, who have felt so powerless that the only solution in their minds to their relentless torment was to point a gun at their classmates and make a decision they will only live to regret.

The victims of this problem are not only those who are on the receiving end of a gun, there is a victim with her finger on the trigger.

Camping tips from Smokey

It's that time of the year again, spring is in the air, camping is on your mind.

Please remember Smokey Bear, and be careful with fire in the woods!

If you plan to camp, and have a campfire outside of the developed campgrounds, campfire permits are required on National Forest Lands.

Campfire permits are free and can be obtained at any Forest Service, California Department of Forestry, or Bureau of Land Management Office.

The purpose of these permits is to allow Forest Rangers to inform campers of current fire danger (weather) conditions and to provide helpful tips for having a safe campfire.

The permit fire safety tips include:

Clearing all flammable material away from the fire for a minimum of five feet in all directions to prevent escape of fire.

Have a shovel available at the campfire site for preparing and extinguishing campfires.

Have a responsible person in attendance at all times.

Extinguish campfire with water, using the drown, stir, and feel method.

In the event fire danger becomes extreme, fire restrictions will be put into effect, and campfires permits will be rendered invalid until further notice.

Fire restrictions will vary on National Forest Lands.

It is best to call the National Forest if you plan to visit for current fire information.

For local information, call the Hat Creek Ranger District of the Lassen National Forest at (530) 336-5521 Monday through Friday.

On weekends call the Old Station Visitor Center at (530) 335-7517.
