## Tribe says 'pay attention to our concerns' PG&E's Pit 3, 4, 5 hydroelectric facilities up for FERC licensing

The Pit River Tribe asked PG&E and the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) to pay attention to their concerns this time before issuing the utility a new 30- to 50-year license for the continued operation of the Pit 3, 4, and 5 hydroelectric project.

And if it comes down to terminating the license and retiring the

project, an alternative that PG&E is against, the Pit River Tribe wants its land back.

"Our issues are not for economic gain, but for the survival of our culture and tribe," said Gene Preston, chairman of the Pit River Tribe, which includes 11 bands.

"Thirty to 50 years is unthinkable for us. Being locked in for 50 years and putting ourselves at the whims

of an agency interested in sheer profit is unthinkable. It is impossible to see that our well-being will be considered."

Preston was among those who spoke during FERC's public scoping meeting in Burney May 22.

FERC is the independent regulatory agency within the U.S. Department of Energy. Former President Clinton and President George W.

Bush appointed its five commissioners.

With the publication last month of FERC's Scoping Document I (SDI), the Commission set public scoping meetings in Burney, Redding and Big Bend (see separate story).

"We've identified some preliminary issues, but we may have missed some so we want to hear from you folks," said Doug Hjorth,

deputy project manager and senior fisheries biologist with the Louis Berger Group, Inc. in Needham, MA.

He is working with Project Coordinator John Mudre, an ecologist with FERC's Environmental and Engineering Division in Washington, D.C., and John Holeman, senior project manager for PG&E,

### Pool cost passed on to schools

The water in the Burney swimming pool was glistening, the water heater was on, and the lifeguard from Big Bend was on duty. But the expected school group never arrived.

The school district ran into a snag this spring with its annual use of the Burney swimming pool for physical education sessions and other activities in the last weeks of school.

The water district is charging \$12 an hour to cover the cost of lifeguards.

"We're asking all the schools to pay the labor costs because we just can't keep providing all these services at no charge to the schools," said Burney Water District Manager Bill Suppa.

School District Superintendent Earnie Graham said he recognizes that operating costs are going up everywhere, but wishes he'd been told sooner than a few weeks ago.

"We didn't budget for this," he said. "It disappoints me that they have to do this, especially since we are supposed to get the use of the pool at no cost."

When the school district sold its land for one dollar so the pool could be built, they were assured future use of the pool at no cost, said Graham.

### Chamber looks at new location

Burney resident and past chamber president Lynn Miller has purchased the former Annie's Main Street House and Gardens on Burney Creek and is offering use of it to the chamber.

At their next meeting June 3, members will vote on Miller's proposal to lease a room in the house to the chamber for \$100 month, plus an estimated \$50 per month for utilities.

"It's already budgeted and is what we are paying (for the office site) now," said chamber member Barbara Briggs, who did a feasibility study with Vi Nelson. Briggs said there could also be increased insurance costs, as well as costs for moving and signage.

Miller also offered the Burney Chamber the option to sublease the rest of the building and grounds for additional income to the chamber.

"You could rent the grounds for functions such as prom night dinners on the outdoor patio, wedding receptions and meetings," she said.

Other rooms in the house could be sublet for classes, meetings, or temporary offices such as to attorneys who are in town for a day to do depositions. A tearoom and a public business office with answer-

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

Suppa doesn't dispute the agreement, but said, "It doesn't specify who pays for labor."

"I suppose I could have fought it, but it's too late," said Graham. "The school year is over. People have just pared down on their use of the pool. Maybe next year we can get our own lifeguard."

For the past 13 years, Suppa said, the water district has maintained the pool on the two dollars it charges district residents every month.

"It's getting tough to maintain a pool on two dollars a month," he said. "And in the last three and four years, we've made costly

major repairs. We replaced the heater and decks and installed the slide. Now we have to look elsewhere to generate the revenue to keep the pool going."

Pool Manager Cindy White said she hopes something

can be worked out so students can continue to use the pool on a more regular basis. "There is so much they could do. I've got sets for water polo, they could have relay races or learn water rescues," she said.

as well as others from around the U.S. who participated in the Burney meeting.

Hjorth outlined the issues raised on the project so far.

They include water (proposed flow releases, temperature, level fluctuations in reservoirs, erosion), recreational, cultural (archeological and historic sites), land use and aesthetic, aquatic and terrestrial resources, and threatened and endangered species (Bald Eagle, spotted owl, longhorn beetle).

The list is not intended to be exhaustive or final, Hjorth said.

"We have a lot more studies to do," added Holeman.

The deadline for written public comment is June 24. Hjorth suggested sending it by E-mail, since all regular mail to FERC is first screened

for Anthrax.

To send comments electronically, log on to the Commission's Web site at [www.ferc.gov](http://www.ferc.gov) under the "e-filing" link.

FERC plans to publish its Draft Environmental Analysis in January 2003 and, after public comment on it, to publish the Final EA in April 2003.

Hjorth said once the SDI scoping process is finished, FERC would determine how much analysis is needed on each issue.

Justin Bogan, an attorney with California Indian Legal Services in Eureka, spoke about the value of the Pit River and its tributaries to the Pit River Tribe.

"We can not emphasize this enough," he said. "The tribe has relied on it for their day-to-day survival since

time immemorial, predating the U.S. Constitution, easily."

Cecilia Silvas, cultural resources representative for the Ahjumawi band, said preserving cultural resources means, "Balancing the environment. It's the four-legged and the winged and the aquatic, the grasses and the berries."

Bogan talked about public access to the Pit River and its world-class trout fishing.

"Recreation has grown over the years. Vast numbers of recreationists - Jeeps, RVs, and feet - have had unfettered access to hundreds of cultural sites, both documented and undocumented, and these sites have taken a beating."

A recommendation was made in 1985 in the Wirth Report to permit foot and boat access only, he said.

"Obviously that recommendation was not taken."

He asked FERC for a study on the effects of motorized vehicles on the land, and to expand it to include a study of motorized boats on the Pit River and Lake Britton.

"We'd like to close the Jeep trails and make Lake Britton and Hat Creek access by foot only," Bogan said.

The Tribe has also requested an evaluation of the effects of grazing, mining, timber harvesting and insecticide use.

"The Tribe is relieved that FERC is considering the re-introduction of native plant species and the reduction of noxious weeds and is more than enthused to cooperate," he continued.

"The Tribe gathers native plants for medicine, art and food and it affects the tribe's

culture, religion and art."

Their concern about the fisheries includes the depletion of salmon in the Lower Pit

"The Pit River Tribal seal has a salmon on it. The Pit River Tribe has no salmon," he said.

"The salmon is central to the culture of the tribe, their diet, religion and trading and the salmon is gone now."

Kathy Turner, hydroelectric coordinator for the Lassen National Forest in the Hat Creek Ranger District, said her agency is involved because "a large portion of the project is on Forest Service land" and they want to ensure adequate protection and use.

The project includes 746 acres that are administered by the Shasta-Trinity and the Lassen National Forests.

Turner said they would be providing their written comments later and having their own public meetings.

Lifetime resident Angel Winn talked about water quality. "My band is down river below the Chalk River and down to Pit 5 and Pit 7. I think PG&E should expand its studies to what's going on from the headwaters down. The water is crucial."

Winn said when water is stored and then suddenly released on a weekly basis as is done in Lake Britton, "It's not natural, like from snow melt, and it erodes the land. If you're going to release water, release it and let it run free."

He talked about the abundance of unsightly transmission lines. "As soon as you get over Hatchet Mountain, that's all you see in the

woods."

Concerning PG&E's proposed land divestiture, Winn said, "If PG&E is trying to get out, (the land) should go back to the tribe for 47 cents an acre or whatever."

Although Winn said he had been attending Pit River Collaborative Team meetings, he stopped going in frustration when PG&E refused his recommendations and comments.

Michelle Berditschevsky, environmental coordinator for the Pit River Tribe, asked FERC to "take a broad approach" when looking at cultural resources."

Also, she said, the Tribe does not want the ground gone over inch-by-inch, causing ground disturbance and more damage through archeological testing.

Brandi Bradford, Southern California Hydro Coordinator for the National Park Service in Sacramento, asked Berditschevsky if she were seeking to nominate the area to the National Register of Historic Places.

"We have to study the area to see what's warranted," she replied.

The Lake Britton Archeological District in Burney is listed for its prehistoric and historic significance.

Winn and Silvas asked if FERC's cultural resource specialist, who met once with the tribe, had any plans to come back to speak with them about the other issues.

"We're soliciting our input and your issues tonight," said Mudre. "But if you feel the need for FERC to return, let us know and we'll see what we can work out."

## Big Bend FERC meeting on licensing for PG&E focuses on white water rafting

"In the next 15 years over 100 hydroelectric projects are up for relicensing in California. The duration of a license is from 30 to 50 years. When these projects were last licensed little or no consideration was given to the economic, cultural, ecological and recreational losses created by dewatering stretches of rivers and streams. Changes in Federal and State laws now require equal consideration be given to all parties in relicensing a project."

The 65 people who attended the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission's meeting in Big Bend had a completely different set of concerns, namely white water rafting, than those who spoke in Burney the night before.

PG&E has applied to FERC to renew its operating license for the Pit 3, 4 and 5 hydroelectric projects on the Pit River and FERC is now hearing public comments on a variety of issues prior to the June 24 deadline in Washington, D.C. (see separate story on FERC meeting in Burney)

As an organization called American Whitewater sees it, the Pit 3, 4 and 5 hydropower project "offers nearly 20 miles of Class III through IV+ whitewater" and the public has the right to use waterways for recreation.

A majority of Big Bend residents see a lot of headaches.

Their issues ranged from fire hazard from campfires to concerns about emergency response to their isolated area for river accidents.

There is also potential for more traffic accidents as raft-

ing buses and others join the logging trucks that drive on the narrow, winding Big Bend Road. They talked about trash and trespassing issues.

"We are extremely concerned," said Steven Heberet, president of the Big Bend Community Club and Center, where the meeting, with dinner for all, was held.

Heberet said he once worked for a rafting organization at Big Bar. "People do their rafting and go home and leave piles of garbage and half-burned baby diapers and we don't want that to occur here."

An immediate concern is American Whitewater's successful demand to raise the water 1,800 cfs in the Pit in August for a flow and biological impact study.

"They are doing this in the hottest time of the year when our families and children and others come here to swim and fish. It won't be safe for us to use the river."

He said community members are also concerned about the lack of a safety plan for the 60-some study team people who will be rafting and kayaking and hiking around in their remote neighborhood.

In addition to bringing what some fear will be a multitude of inner tubes, kayaks and bright orange rubber rafts to the river, Heberet said the increased flow would scour the river bottom and remove food that the fish feed on and eventually the fish that the Bald Eagles eat.

American Whitewater, headquartered in Silver Spring, Md., is an international organization for whitewater enthusiasts.

Their Web site has detailed information about rivers, including the Pit, safety reports and data, environmental concerns, and legislative updates on efforts to open more water to the public.

"Our mission is to conserve and restore America's resources and enhance opportunities to enjoy them safely," according to their mission statement.

In 1998, American Whitewater asked for a Controlled Whitewater Flow Study on the Pit River "to determine the minimum and optimum flow release levels."

When stakeholders (representatives from PG&E, Pit River Tribe, Shasta Paddlers, Trout Unlimited, Caltrout, and several government agencies, etc.) formed the Pit River Collaborative Team in 1999, they agreed that a study was necessary to make objective decisions.

The study was originally set for August 2000, but was then delayed by concerns related to the Endangered Species Act.

Heberet said now the whitewater study was going to include the Pit 3, 4 and 5 reaches. "Bu the fly fishermen and a good enough lobby to keep them out of the Pit 3 reach."

He said FERC has not clarified if the rafters now want the Pit 4-5 reach or the Pit 5-6.

He believes PG&E is willing to work with those concerned in Big Bend because if this goes through, "they will be forced to divert 10 percent of the power generated to whitewater rafting and they will also have to fund any improvements."

Veterans' groups, often with the help of children, still decorate gravesites in cemeteries around the world.

There are also parades, speeches and church services on Memorial Day. Military men fire 21-gun salutes. Buglers play "Taps."

Memorial Day is special because it is a day for remembering.



The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier is a gravesite at Arlington National Cemetery, outside Washington, D.C. No one knows the identities of the three soldiers buried in the tomb.

As a tribute, this grave is guarded 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. To become a guard there is a great honor.



As a sign of mourning or sympathy, the flag is flown at half-staff until 12 noon on Memorial Day.



To honor the men and women who have served our country, there are special cemeteries in this country and in Europe where veterans may be buried. These cemeteries, like this one in California, are always well cared for by the government.





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
