VFW to rescue Burney celebration Burney Basin Days Committee has trouble obtaining insurance

Burney's summer celebration appears to have been rescued by the Veterans of Foreign Wars after they and other local organizations scrambled to salvage the festivities scheduled for the July 4 weekend.

Bob Maxwell of Burney VFW Post 1021 said all the events previously scheduled as Burney Basin Days are expected to be held, including the parade and fireworks.

A meeting is scheduled tonight, 6 p.m., at Round Table Pizza in Burney to discuss details of the

celebration.

The cancellation of Burney Basin Days was a result of last year's fatal accident, which has made the Burney Basin Days committee uninsurable until the year's statute of limitations for filing a civil action claim related to the death of Neil Purdy ends on July 6.

"This is heartbreaking for me," said Donna Caldwell, Burney Basin Days chairperson, in tears at a special meeting called Friday when it looked as though a summer celebration was doomed.

"We've literally tried everything we can think of."

"We can't find an entity that will cover us and we can't hold these events if we're not covered," said Caldwell's husband, Walt, who has been involved with the town celebration since 1976.

"Although Burney Basin Days was found not to be negligent, the family has a year to file a claim and, sadly, that year ends on Parade Day," Earnie Graham, a Burney Basin Days Committee member, explained to Burney Rotary mem-

bers Thursday.

Purdy, whose wife Jennifer was last year's Parade Chairperson, was marking parade entry spots along Highway 299 at dusk on July 6, when he was struck and killed by an eastbound car.

The BBD Committee said they learned just last week, on June 25, that Intermountain Insurance could not find anyone willing to cover Saturday's Kiddies Parade and the Big Parade.

"Our agent, Mona Carr, has worked her butt off and cried her

heart out over this. She really tried," said Donna.

Everyone has tried, she said, even Zambelli Fireworks Internationale, the New Castle, Pennsylvania company that puts on Burney's annual fireworks display.

"Nobody wants (to sponsor) the fireworks because it's tainted by the word 'fire' and nobody wants the parade because it's tainted by last year's fatality," Walt Caldwell said.

"What about Shasta County?" asked Lola Harris.

"A flat no," said Caldwell. The Pit River Casino looked into it, but their insurance is site specific.

Burney Lions Club representative Jim Chapman said that as a result of last year's fatality, "The Lions are not stepping forward and doing anything, not until after July 6."

The Burney Chamber cannot help either. "The decision was made for us," said President Lori Winningham. "We can't."

However, the Burney Chamber is going to take on the Flea Market, which Marlene Dollarhide, committee chairperson for more than eight years, tearfully handed over.

Another immediate problem, said Caldwell, is that, "We're at the drop dead date. We ain't got time."

"Timing in this is so important," said Vi Nelson, a past BBD Chairperson. "The first check for the fireworks goes out in November. Caltrans parade permits take three weeks. The sign across the highway to advertise the event takes permitting. Even if we backed off and it's just a duplication of permits, you don't push the county."

Problems for this year's event started to emerge in May, right after Donna Caldwell agreed to take on the chairmanship once again.

She was chairman of Burney Basin Days from 1992-1995 and her husband has been chairman two times.

"On May 16, we found out we might have a problem with the school asking for different insurance coverage than in the past," she said.

The fireworks are held on the Burney High School football field. In past years, Zambelli has had \$3 million in coverage for any accidents directly related to the fireworks. "The school wanted \$6 million this year and Zambelli agreed. We also thought Burney Basin Days had coverage for any accidents that might happen on the field."

But, as they discovered last week, they didn't and without it, Caldwell said, each committee member could be personally liable for any accidents. "If someone decided to sue, you folks aren't covered. You could lose your home and your retirement."

It's possible that by dissolving the Burney Basin Days Committee, another organization could get coverage to sponsor the fireworks event and Intermountain News Publisher Craig Harrington wanted to try.

"I think we can get other individuals willing to take a risk. If this committee is the liability, let other organizations take on the responsibility," he said.

"We tried that method," said Caldwell. "We've been working on this almost a year."

Harrington persisted.

"If you've got contacts, fine," said Donna. "Have them contact me by Monday. I'd love to see it go. But we've got to cut our losses someplace. It's not fair to those involved not to end this. I also have to let Zambelli know so we only lose \$4,000 instead of \$10,000."

They gave Harrington until 4:30 p.m. Monday to find a fireworks sponsor.

"If you can pull a rabbit out of the hat, I will give you a hug and a kiss that you won't believe," vowed Donna Caldwell.

Trustees OK \$10 million budget for Fall River Joint Unified Schools

The trustees approved a \$10 million budget for the Fall River Joint Unified School District in 2002-2003 at their June 19 meeting in Burney.

Chief Business Official Roger Borkey said there would be ongoing changes to the budget and dollars aren't certain until the state budget is finalized.

"This is a final budget, but by definition it's only an estimate," said Supt. Earnie Graham.

Trustee Bob Hatcher told Borkey and Budget Analyst Teresea Spooner that this was the best budget presentation he had seen

since serving on the board.

"I thought the same thing," added Board President Nancy Sisk.

The budget's total general fund balance is \$374,999 with \$359,259 set aside, as mandated, for economic uncertainties and a two percent cost of living allowance.

Another \$202,466 is set aside for reserve cash, reserve restricted programs and an unappropriated category.

District expenses are about \$11.6 million with \$4.2 million budgeted for certificated salaries, a figure that includes teacher salaries, extra duty and substitutes.

The district budgeted \$1.9 million for classified salaries, \$652,000 for administrative salaries, and \$1.9 million for benefits for full-time equivalent employees.


The district budgeted \$1 million for books and supplies, \$1.1 million for services and operations, \$116,000 in capital outlay, and \$324,000 for other outgoing expenses.

The district anticipates \$400,586 in federal restricted income and \$925,079 in restricted income from the state.

Also budgeted is \$156,692 in

Hat Creek student makes rodeo cut

Hat Creek resident and Fall River High School sophomore Blaire Bidwell will represent the Intermountain area in pole bending competition at the National High School Rodeo Finals July 22-28 at Farmington, New Mexico.

Throughout the state finals, Blaire noted how she was "scared and nervous" as she made her way through the four rounds of the pole bending competition.

But she credited her horse the past six years, Bo, a 12-year-old quarterhorse, with her success.

Competition among all the athletes was fierce as only one and one-half seconds determined first through 15th place.

"The girls are just so fast," noted her mother Debbie Bidwell.

Blaire will be among the eight students in District 1 headed to the nationals. Nine districts competed at the state level, with all schools sending their top five riders to Quincy.

Blaire ran a clean first go, not knocking over any poles in a time of 23.8. The second go Blaire and Bo ran a 21.8 and the third an even faster 20.9, to win the fast time of

the performance and a victory lap at the state finals.

Entering the final go and her fourth run, Blaire was sitting in 10th place and needed to make a clean run, which she did.

The final run in 21.3 seconds garnered her fourth place overall. Only the top four in each event qualify for nationals.

Other athletes from the Intermountain area qualifying for Quincy were Kallie DeAtley in goat tying, Luena Herbert in breakaway and goat tying, Chad Bidwell in calf roping, Tori deBraga in barrels and pole bending, and Greg Carter in bull riding.

deBraga will continue on to Silver State finals in Fallon, Nev., after placing ninth in the barrel racing at Quincy.

Blaire wanted to thank her family, friends and sponsors McArthur Farm Supply, Fall River Feed, Bidwell Ranch, and Intermountain Jr. Rodeo for their support this past season.

She'll be looking to raise funds before July 17 to defray expenses.

Blaire and another rider, Jenna Ferguson of Cottonwood are planning a car wash as one fundraiser.

The annual celebration in Burney originated in the 1950s as the Golden Spike Celebration. The Junior Chamber of Commerce (JC's) took it over and renamed it Burney Basin Days.

"When they disbanded, Julie Atkins decided Burney couldn't lose this event and she got a bunch of people together and formed the Burney Basin Days Committee," said Caldwell.

As years went by, the committee went from coordinating other organizations to

running the show.

"There are those people willing to go out and do things and this community is very lucky to have them," she said. "We didn't want to see it die and worked hard to keep it going."

This time, though, try as so many did, the celebration known as Burney Basin Days is going on hold, now to be filled by a yet unnamed event.

"It is absolutely criminal that insurance companies can destroy an event in rural America," said Donna.

The home exercise tapes and dusty weight benches can go back into storage with the recent opening of Totally Fit Workout Center on Main Street in Burney.

Owner Meryl Guiles has installed the latest workout equipment to strengthen and tone every part of every body.

"I've had this idea for a long time because I think the town needs a gym," said Guiles.

There are rows of Stairmasters, Elliptical trainers and treadmills.

There is also a \$5 daily rate and \$40 per month use rate for non-members.

Possible new fire chief for Burney

After interviewing five applicants, commissioners for the Burney Fire Department have made an offer to a prospective new fire chief.

"He has not accepted at this time," said President Donna Sylvester at the board's June 12 meeting.

Sylvester said Sunday that their candidate plans to visit the area during Burney Basin Days and would perhaps make a decision then.

"What if he doesn't accept?" an audience member asked at the meeting.

"Then we have Plan B and Plan C," said Commissioner Lynn Miller, who declined to elaborate.

"All five candidates were qualified and it was a difficult decision," Sylvester said.

In other business, the commissioners agreed to operate the fire department using the preliminary budget presented May 29.

"We won't have the final figures from the county (auditor-controller's office) until mid-July," said Com-

missioner Donna Caldwell.

"In the meantime, we'll use this operating budget until then. The Budget and Finance Committee will meet again, plug in the final figures, we'll have another hearing, and ask the board to pass the budget at the August meeting."

In a related discussion, the commissioners unanimously agreed to adopt the preliminary budget so it could be sent to the county auditor, even though it's not the final budget.

"I'm totally confident with these figures until we get a final," said Caldwell. "We worked hours and hours on this. Let's adopt it and send it down to them."

The commissioners also unanimously approved step increases for Administrative Secretary Lenetta Harris and Lt. Rick Moore.

"We've gone 24 months without anything," said Harris, due to a freeze last year over budget concerns.

Miller asked if the increases were tied to performance evaluations. "Is this in the Rules and Regulations? It's automatic? What's the process?"

The increases are based on the chief's recommendations and former Chief Larry Sullivan did staff evaluations every six months that are in the employees' files.

"My evaluation is based on they didn't get an increase last year and they have done their work cheerfully and willingly for the past six months," said Commissioner Ann Walker.

"I'm real comfortable making my recommendation right here and right now."

"I think they should include a performance evaluation, but for now, there's no doubt in my mind that their performance does warrant a step increase," Caldwell added.

In other business, the Commissioners made decisions on uniform styles, costs, and employee uniform reimbursement policy.

Kossol appointed to oversight committee

Burney optometrist Jeff Kossol of Palo Cedro was one of eight citizens appointed by the trustees of the Shasta-Tehama-Trinity Joint Community College District to serve on the Measure A citizens oversight committee.

The \$34 million Measure A, which passed in the March election, will pay for numerous college improvements, including the construction of a downtown Redding Health Science Center, a University Center, and an Interstate 5 Technology Center in Tehama County.

Also appointed at the May 29 board meeting were Rich Mehling of Red Bluff, a member of the Red Bluff Chamber of Commerce and Tehama Bank; Sharon McKenzie of Weaverville and an administrator with the Golden Age Center; Bill Minton of Redding, of the California Taxpayers Association, and Claudia Martin of Corning, who is with Tehama County Economic Development.

Other Redding residents appointed were Walter Hawkins, a student; Randy Denham, president of the Shasta College Foundation; and Gerrine Peckenpaugh, president of the Redding branch of the American Association of University Women.

Burney EMS elects new officers

The Burney Fire Department's EMS Association has elected new officers. Serving will be Courtney Cleckler, president; Larry Armstrong, vice-president; John Shaw, treasurer; and Alyssa Roark, secretary.

Also, on June 1, Lt. Rick Moore appointed Terry King as the new EMS coordinator, a possible temporary assignment until a new fire chief is hired.

unrestricted Forest Reserve income; \$84,842 in unrestricted state dollars for staff development, and \$305,898 in unrestricted state funds paid for each K-3 grade student who is in a class of 20 or fewer students.

The district expects to get \$163,837 in lottery dollars, which is received in quarterly payments and based on annual average daily attendance from the prior year.

For the 2002/2003 school year, the lottery budget is based on \$117.50 per ADA,

according to Spooner.

Another \$23,680 is available through the Agriculture Incentive Grant, available to both high schools, although the district must match the grant money.

In a conversation about submitting a waiver related

to the ag grant, District Supt. Earnie Graham said, "When it all falls out, the district spends about \$60,000 to \$70,000 to match this grant. Ag at Fall River High School alone costs \$300,000 if you include salaries, shop upkeep, electricity and so forth."

As a former ag teacher, Graham said he values the program, but wanted to indicate that while salaries and other costs have increased since the program went into effect in 1983, the grant dollars have remained the same.

Other income in the budget is an estimated \$76,000 in unrestricted local revenue, with another \$626,149 in funds earmarked to run the district's special education program.

Locals stick together to help fellow business woman; donations to gift basket worth \$923

Raelene Metcalf of Burney is the winner of an appreciation basket of gifts and goodies valued at \$923 and donated by local merchants and community members for Mt. Burney Theatre.

Theater owner Donna Sylvester has been robbed twice after pouring dollars into her business to make it a show-place show place.

"We don't want her to be so discouraged that she leaves town," said Taunya Ross, who came up with the basket idea with Judy Dixon.

"Just because there are a few bad apples in this town, doesn't mean everyone is that way."

Ross and Dixon both work at Intermountain Services for the Handicapped and said that Sylvester continually donates her time and her theatre to the community and has even had special shows at the theater for their clients.

"Donna is such a good person and this is the community's way of showing we appreciate her and care," said Ross.

Since purchasing the theater in October 1997, Sylvester has remodeled, repainted and done hundreds of upgrades on the 62-year-old building.

Behind the scenes there's new plumbing, new wiring, a new hot water heater, and new projection equipment.

What's beautifully visible to patrons are the fresh coats of paint on the walls, the sparkling clean bathrooms, and the red fir wood floors discovered under layers of paint.

Year by year, Sylvester has continually made improvements. She has put in new carpeting, aisle lighting, central air conditioning and central heating.

She's taken out the old and put in a new 33-foot "big" screen, new 23-inch wide rocking seats with cup holders and padded armrests. She's even brought back the fashionably old with her latest addition of a pink and green neon sign reminiscent of movie theaters in the 1940s and 50's.

She developed a Web page for her coming attractions and a family movie guide.

Her proudest accomplishment has been the gradual upgrading of the theater's sound system — with the installation of Digital Theater Systems sound with 12 sur-

round speakers.

So it was devastating when Sylvester discovered a burglary to her business April 2. Stolen were two stage speakers — an 18-inch JBL subwoofer and a 15-inch JBL bass speaker — an EV surround speaker, and a QSC 1500 amplifier with an estimated total value of \$3,000.

The side door was broken into and Sylvester is replacing it with a steel door at a cost of \$1,000.

This incident was the third burglary to her business since purchasing it.

The first meeting will be devoted largely to developing procedures and protocols, according to —Tim Burke, field manager for the Bureau of Land Management in Alturas.

BLM and the Klamath National Forest issued decisions in May 2000 to approve the project.

The BLM is responsible for management of the geothermal lease, while the Klamath National Forest is responsible for managing activities on national forest lands, including development of roads, pipelines and electrical transmission lines.





Entering, you step into a vaulted and spacious open area with the dining room up front and the living room at the rear. The back wall is


more windows than walls, here and in the morning room section of the kitchen as well. French doors that flank the fireplace offer patio access, and another French door in the morning room serves the same function.
