

Big Ben is winner of big fish chamber of commerce contest

The Big Ben Franklin Fish painted by Bob Hoodenpyle is the winner in the Fish Finder Upscale Fish election sponsored by the Burney Chamber of Commerce.

"I knew it was a good one," said Ron Wilburn, manager of the Ben Franklin store in Burney, where "Big

Ben Franklin" is on display.

About 175 votes at \$1 per vote were cast for favorite fish.

Voter Verla Cantu of Cassel was the winner of one-third of the prize money. Ben Franklin wins another third of the election prize money and the Burney and Fall River

Valley chambers of commerce will split the remaining third.

About 35 businesses and residents in Burney, Johnson Park and the Fall River Valley joined in the fun this spring and sponsored a pre-cut fish for \$50 and \$35 depending on their size.

Sponsors could paint their own fish or commission a Burney High School student to paint their fish for them.

The fish were put up for the opening of the Intermountain area fishing season and the Burney Chamber created Fish Finder maps for people

to follow the stream of fish and vote for their favorite.

Woman injured in Highway 89 crash

A 19-year-old Bremerton, Wash., woman sustained major injuries Sunday after her vehicle smashed into a tree near Pondosa.

Jolene Butler was traveling south on the highway about 5:30 a.m. in a small sedan at about the posted 65 miles per hour speed limit when she allowed her vehicle to leave the

roadway, said California Highway Patrol traffic officer John Cannon.

The vehicle traveled for a short distance north of McArthur Road before impacting a tree, he said.

Butler, wearing a seatbelt, was trapped in the vehicle and attended to by fire personnel from the Pondosa CDF station, close to the

scene.

It took about one and one-half hours to free her from the vehicle with assistance from the Burney Fire Department's Jaws of Life extrication tool.

Butler was then flown to Mercy Medical Center in Redding with multiple fractures, the CHP reported.

A soldier's footlocker of mementoes presented to daughter he never knew

Korean military hero killed six months before McArthur woman was born

A few days after her birthday in February, Lynn Van Deventer, of McArthur, received an unforgettable phone call.

A soldier's footlocker had been found in the attic of a Southern California home. It was filled with the soldier's letters and photographs, his pipe and tobacco, his World War II uniform, and his medals, including a Purple Heart.

The caller had found the cherished possessions of Lynn's father, a man she never knew because he was killed in the Korean War six months before she was born.

Her sister, Diana Burns of Pittville, was three when her father died and the trunk also contained a photograph of Diana with her mother and a baby dress she wore on a trip to Japan.

Fifty years ago, William E. Moment's widow left her husband's footlocker with a neighbor for safekeeping and then eventually moved on, leaving the trunk behind.

It was ignored or unnoticed as it sat in the attic through several

homeowners until it was discovered recently by the latest owner, who spent the next 19 months trying to track down 2nd Lt. Moment's heirs.

"He even wrote to President Bush, but no one could help him because of the Right to Privacy Act," Van Deventer said.

But city auditors aren't held to the same privacy laws, she said, and one, a veteran, was interested enough to help.

"He found us through my mother's Oregon death certificate and called me up."

Her reaction was emotional and is still is.

"I've cried a lot. I never knew my father, so having this really means a lot. This was definitely a gift from God.

"We never even knew when he was killed," she said.

And now she and her sister and their children know that and much more about the man who was a military hero.

Lt. Moment was 26 years old when he was killed in action on July 16, 1950 near the Kumsung River.

It was just 12 days after American troops left Japan on July 4 for Korea.

"He brought his men out from behind enemy lines," said Van Deventer, who can now tell the stories of her father's life.

"He was among the first killed and was posthumously awarded the Silver Star for gallantry in action."

Moment didn't even have to be in that battle. He'd already served his country as an Army medic during World War II.

"He served in the European Theater and was awarded the Victory Medal, an American Service Medal, a Good Conduct Medal, and a European-African-Middle Eastern Service Medal," she said, about the medals that have been returned to Moment's family.

"He went to college and then, when the Korean War came about, he re-enlisted in the Army Infantry."

Last week, on the Fourth of July, the American Legion, Willis Hollenbeck Post 369, had a patriotic ceremony at the newly painted VFW Hall in Fall River Mills.

Cable TV continues in spite of Adelphia problems

The financial scandal surrounding the family-owned Adelphia Communications Corp. is as intriguing as a pay-per-view movie.

Adelphia, which provides cable television service locally, filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy June 25.

The downfall came after federal regulators and two grand juries found the Rigas family had borrowed more than \$3 billion dollars off the books and without shareholders knowledge.

John Rigas, 77, who founded the Coudersport, Pa. company in 1952 with a \$300 investment, made a reported \$2 billion in loans to his family.

Part of the money was used to purchase cable systems separate from Adelphia's operation, according to analysts. An estimated \$2.8 billion was for the family's own use.

Until the loans were made public, Rigas's three sons and a son-in-law were top Adelphia executives and on the board of directors.

In response to questions about the future of cable service in the Intermountain area, Adelphia spokesperson Lisa Wolford in Coudersport, Pa. would not answer questions directly, but sent an e-mail promising continued service to their Los Angeles area.

When asked how many subscribers are served locally, Wolford said the company does not disclose that information.

During the ongoing investigation, the company acknowledged that its subscriber totals and cash flow figures were overstated.

The RTPA staff recommendations will include the following actions:

1. Consider action to terminate trial Intermountain, Airport Road Corridor and/or Cottonwood transit services on November 1, 2002.
2. Take action to extend the trial Intermountain, Airport Road Corridor and/or Cottonwood transit services to a date certain beyond November 1, 2002.
3. Consider action to modify Intermountain, Airport Road Corridor and/or Cottonwood transit services routes, times or types of services provided.
4. Consider action to request claimant agencies to increase fares for rural routes.
5. Consider action to modify performance measures established by the RTPA for existing and/or future trial transit services.

DATE, TIME AND PLACE

The Shasta County Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA) will be holding a public hearing to take testimony on Trial Rural Transit Services in the Intermountain, Airport Road Corridor and Cottonwood transit services areas on **Tuesday, July 23, 2002, at 4 p.m. At the John Beaudet Community Senior Center, 1525 Median Avenue, Shasta Lake, California.**

BACKGROUND

The Shasta County Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA) took action in June 2001 to establish three new express transit routes on a trial basis. The routes were the Cottonwood Express, the Intermountain Express (formerly Burney Express) and the Airport Road Corridor Express. Their action included a date certain (one year from start of service) that the various routes would have to meet performance measures dealing with ridership and costs for services. To meet the performance measures the routes would need to average 3.5 riders per hour or recover a 10 to 20 percent farebox ratio. To date the performance measures have not been met.

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

jan, said it was "business as usual" and that she doesn't foresee this area going without cable service. "We also just added 130 channels in May."

On June 28, Adelphia announced that the U.S. Bankruptcy Court for the Southern District of New York had approved the company's request for immediate access to \$500 million of the \$1.5 billion debtor in possession (DIP) credit facility, provided by a consortium of bank lenders, to fund operations during the Chapter 11 process.

"The DIP credit facility will enable Adelphia to continue to operate smoothly," according to a company press release.

Events began to unfold publicly on March 27 when Adelphia disclosed it had guaranteed \$2.3 billion in loans to partnerships controlled by the Rigas family.

On April 1 Adelphia requested a filing extension for its annual report to the Securities and Exchange Commission "to review certain accounting matters related to co-borrowing."

On April 3, the SEC conducted an informal inquiry into the company's previously disclosed co-borrowing agreements and asked Adelphia for clarification and documentation.

On April 17, the SEC upgraded its inquiry to a formal investigation.

On May 2, Adelphia said it would re-issue a re-statement of its previously issued annual financial statements for 1999, 2000 and an interim statement for 2001.

On May 15, founder John Rigas, who also served as company chairman, president, and CEO, stepped down, but continued to serve on the board of directors.

Interim CEO Erland Kailbourne, described as Rigas's boyhood friend, succeeded him.

Also on May 15, Adelphia missed a \$23 million interest payment on notes due in 2009.

Two company subsidiaries missed another \$14.8 million in interest payments.

Grand juries in the Southern District of New York and the Middle District of Pennsylvania began their investigations.

On May 16, Timothy Rigas, the company's executive vice-president, chief financial officer, chief accounting officer, and treasurer resigned. The board said it would conduct a full and thorough investigation "on a number of issues."

On May 19, James R.

Brown, vice-president of finance for 18 years, resigned.

On May 23, a Special Committee of Independent Directors announced the Rigas family had agreed to relinquish control of the company and to transfer to the company assets valued at more than \$1 billion.

As part of the agreement, founder John Rigas and his sons, Timothy, Michael, and James resigned as directors. A son-in-law, Peter Venetis, was also asked to resign his seat on the board, which he did on June 11.

Michael Rigas resigned as executive vice president, operations, and secretary of Adelphia. James Rigas resigned as executive vice president, strategic planning.

John Rigas received a severance agreement of \$1.4 million per year for three years.

All Adelphia stock owned by the Rigas family was placed in a voting trust. Common and preferred stock was pledged to the company as security for the balance of the Rigas family's obligations.

On May 28, Dr. Leonard Tow, Adelphia's second biggest stockholder, said he was entitled to three seats on the board and Adelphia appointed him and Scott Schneider as directors.

Tow, 77, is chairman and CEO of Citizens Communications and owns 12 percent of Adelphia's common stock. Schneider is vice chairman of Citizens Communications.

Tow was also director and CEO of Century Communications Corp., a cable television

company that he sold to Adelphia for \$5.2 billion in 1999.

At the time of the merger, Rigas said he and Tow had been friends for more than two decades.

Tow took 75 percent of his consideration in Adelphia stock as part of the deal.

In July 2001 Citizens acquired Frontier Telephone, which also serves the Intermountain area, for \$3.5 billion along with the rural local exchange carrier's 1.1 million access lines.

Citizens also purchased an additional 325,000 access lines from Verizon and Qwest.

Several years ago, Tow was the target of a lawsuit filed by Citizen shareholders over his \$23 million compensation package.

On May 30, Adelphia's Kailbourne released a copy of his letter to Tow in which he expressed surprise at Tow's objection to the company's proposed asset sales and asked for his alternative and concrete proposals.

He also chided Tow for issuing false statements in a letter Tow wrote that was released to the press.

On June 10, Tow and Schneider resigned.

That same week, Adelphia terminated its long-time independent accountants Deloitte & Touche LLP, whose ongoing audit work was suspended May 14, and selected PricewaterhouseCoopers.

When it was publicized that Adelphia failed to file its financial reports, the company stock dropped from \$20.39 per share in March to 14 cents a share on June 25.

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Scholarships of \$96,000 shared by 15 BHS grads

Family and friends applauded the 48 seniors who were graduated from Burney Junior-Senior High School at the football field June 14.

Valedictorians for the Class of 2002 are Carly Drenon, 18, the daughter of Ron and Linda Drenon, Serene Hutchinson, 18, the daughter of Larry and Sherrie Hutchinson, and Melissa Spencer, 18, the daughter of Dave and Sharon Spencer.

Fifteen of the graduates are heading into their future with more than \$96,000 in scholarships, grants, and awards that were presented at Senior Awards Night June 12.

Many of the awards came from local organizations through community donations including \$8,400 from the Burney Lions Club and \$1000 from the Burney Lions Auxiliary.

The Burney High School Boosters Club gave out six \$600 scholarships to total \$3,600 in awards.

New cafeteria computer to save money

If you've wondered what your child is eating at school, the district has a new cafeteria computer system in place that gathers that information.

The NutriKids Point of Sale Terminal also keeps track of who paid how much for which foods, it creates and costs menus, it tracks the number of meals served and the number that were free and reduced, and is generally more accurate and efficient, according to Donna Paxson, principal account clerk for the Fall River Joint Unified School District.

The \$25,000 networked system was purchased last September and is now running smoothly at each school site with Burney High School to be programmed in this summer.

"I think we've done something really good," Paxson told the school trustees at their June 19 meeting in Burney.

"Does it promise savings?" asked Trustee Connie Sebastian.

"I'd say so. We spend fewer man-hours on reports. The kids punch in their individual code numbers in the meal line, it's easier for the cashier, and the lines move faster. And it keeps better inventory."

The cashier also has instant access to a student's balance and can print out a receipt to be taken home.

The computer system is part of the district's goal to reduce the cafeteria's "major encroachment in the budget," said Chief Business Official Roger Borkey.

"We found quite a few errors had been made in collections and this new system makes it all stand out. We think it's a real improvement."

Borkey said he expects to save as much as \$30,000 in cafeteria costs.

Also, he said, the staff will look at the school menus this summer to make them more cost effective and appealing.

In other business, the trustees:

* Approved the 2002/2003 budget (see separate story);

* Approved early retirement for Burney High School teacher Susan Osborne, who has taught in the district for 33 years;

* Approved the expulsion of two students from Burney High School;

* Heard that Fall River High School is moving its tutorial class period to after lunch so that students on trips will miss less instruction time;

* Requested more details from the Tri-County Community Network on the land lease agreement for the proposed community park on Bailey Avenue.

The next school board meeting is set for Aug. 7 in Fall River.

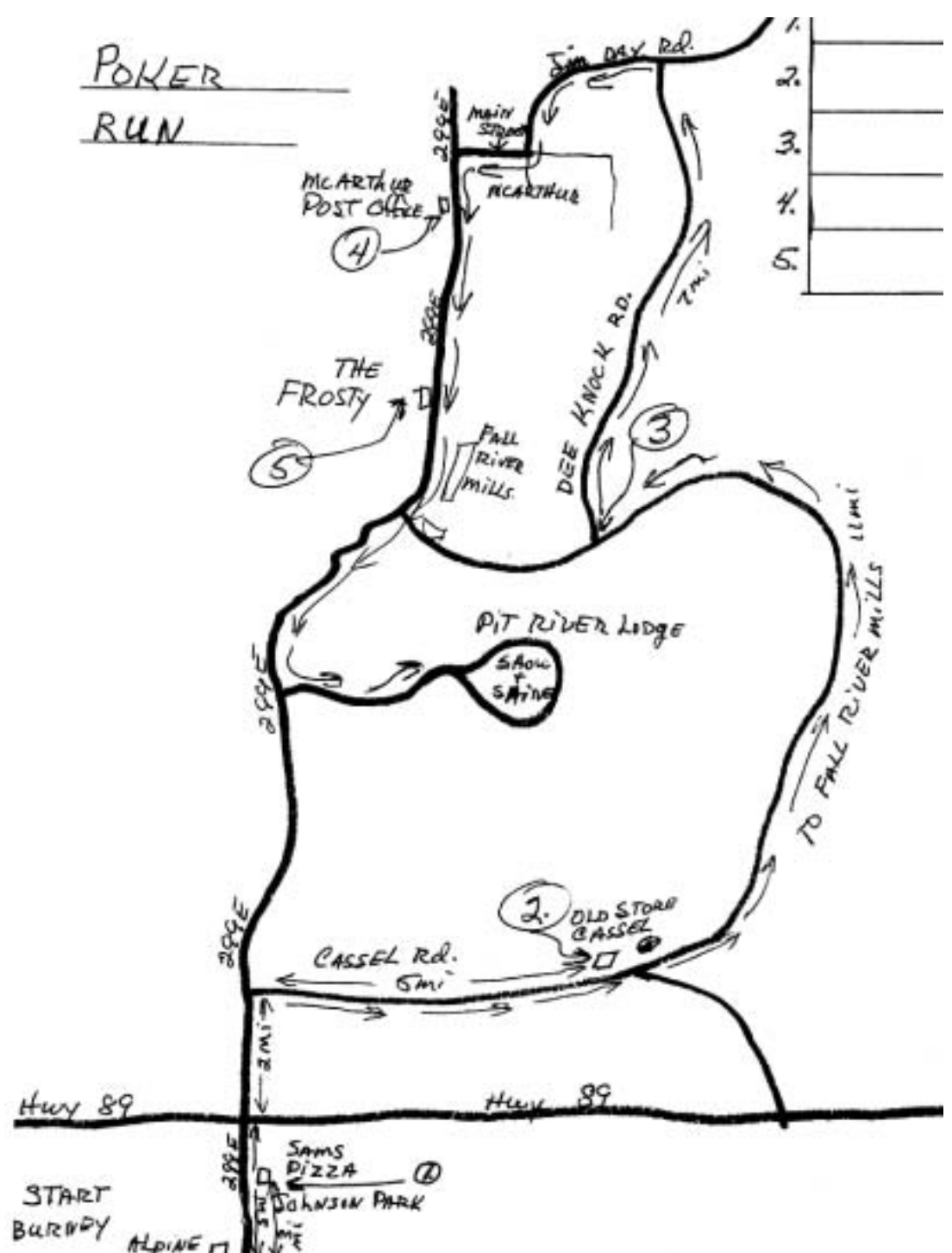

Flying Beauties

Our Fragile Butterflies

Although there are about 15,000 types, or species, of butterflies in the world, many butterflies are in trouble. Several species are on the endangered species list, including many types of blue butterflies, swallowtails and silverspots.



By destroying butterfly habitat and using pesticides, we have put many butterflies in danger. Growing city sprawl and the killing of plants that butterflies need are making it harder for them to survive.

In some parts of the world, so many collectors have gathered the brightly colored insects that those butterflies are now facing extinction.

The monarch

One example of a butterfly in trouble is the monarch. It needs the milkweed to live on, but many people think of this plant as a weed and destroy it. Poisonous chemicals used to kill other plants also kill it. Pollution and destruction of the ozone layer have also killed much milkweed.

In California and Mexico, people are cutting down the forests the monarchs need for their winter homes.



The monarch migrates up to 3,000 miles each year, farther than any other butterfly. In the fall, thousands of monarchs migrate to Mexico and southern California, often going to the same trees as their ancestors. In the spring, their great-grandchildren fly back north.

Butterfly gardens

One way to help butterflies is to grow a butterfly garden, with special plants to attract these beautiful insects. The best butterfly gardens supply the needs of a butterfly throughout its whole life.

They provide places to lay eggs, leaves for the caterpillars to eat and flowers for the butterflies to feed on.

Some of the plants butterflies like include: milkweed, snapdragons, asters, dill, fennel, violets, zinnias, broccoli, cabbage, parsley, wild peas, lilacs, sunflowers, goldenrod, and willow, poplar, birch and elm trees.



Where to find butterflies

Butterflies are on every continent except Antarctica. The best place to look for them is in gardens. They especially like sunny places with low-growing plants.

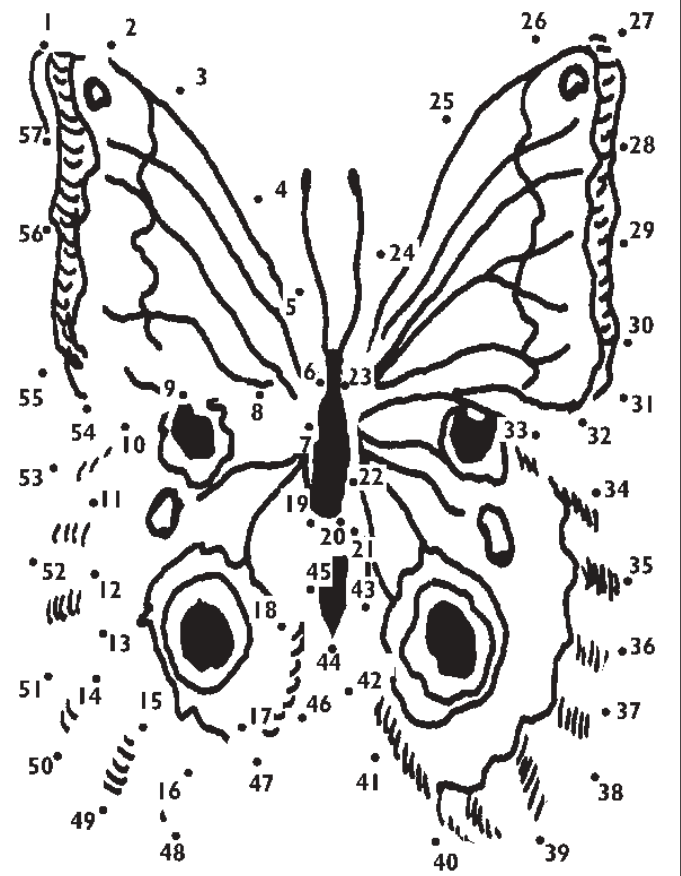
In the United States they can usually be seen from May through September.

Parks and wildlife refuges are good butterfly habitats. Many zoos have butterfly areas.

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The Amazing Butterfly

The wonderful change

Butterflies go through four stages during their life cycle. The insect in one stage may look and act completely different than it does in another stage. This change is called metamorphosis (met-uh-MOR-fuh-ses).

Stages of life

1. The egg

Depending on the species, the adult female butterfly may lay from dozens to hundreds of tiny eggs. She may drop them near plants that will be food for the caterpillar. Or she may lay them on the undersides of leaves that the caterpillars will eat.

Some eggs hatch in a few days, but other types of butterflies lay eggs in the fall. These eggs stay on the plants until the spring.

2. The caterpillar

The caterpillar begins to eat as soon as it hatches. Often it eats its own eggshell, then begins eating parts of the plants surrounding it.

Caterpillars eat so much they may increase their birth weight by 3,000 times before they are full-grown.

As they grow, they shed their skins, sometimes as many as five times.

3. The chrysalis

When the caterpillar has eaten and stored enough food to keep it alive during its next life stage, it begins to change. It usually finds a high, safe place and puts out a sticky liquid.

It hangs from this sticky spot as it forms the next stage, the chrysalis (KRIS-e-lis). It creates the chrysalis, a kind of shell around itself, out of parts of its own body.

Inside the chrysalis the caterpillar's body is being completely remade and rearranged. It is making new eyes, new legs and wings. The digestive tract is about the only thing that stays the same.

Depending on the species, it may be in this form for days or months. Some species stay in the chrysalis form all winter.

4. The butterfly

When it is ready, the chrysalis splits open and a butterfly comes out.

It may hang there for several minutes until its wings dry and harden. It then spreads its wings and flies away. Some butterflies live for only one to two weeks. Others may live more than a year.



Living rainbows

The beautiful colors of butterflies help them in many ways. Experts believe the colors and patterns help them to:

- warn their enemies, such as birds, that they are dangerous or bad-tasting.
- blend in with their environment so they can hide in the wild.
- attract mates.

For example, the monarch caterpillar eats the milkweed, a plant poisonous to birds. These poisons stay in its body when it turns into a butterfly, and birds learn to stay away.

Some butterflies fool predators into thinking they are poisonous or bad-tasting, even if they may be safe to eat. They do this by developing the coloring of butterflies that really are poisonous.

For example, the viceroy butterfly looks like the poisonous monarch, even though it is a perfectly good food.



The pink coloring of this butterfly helps it blend in with the thistle it is resting on.

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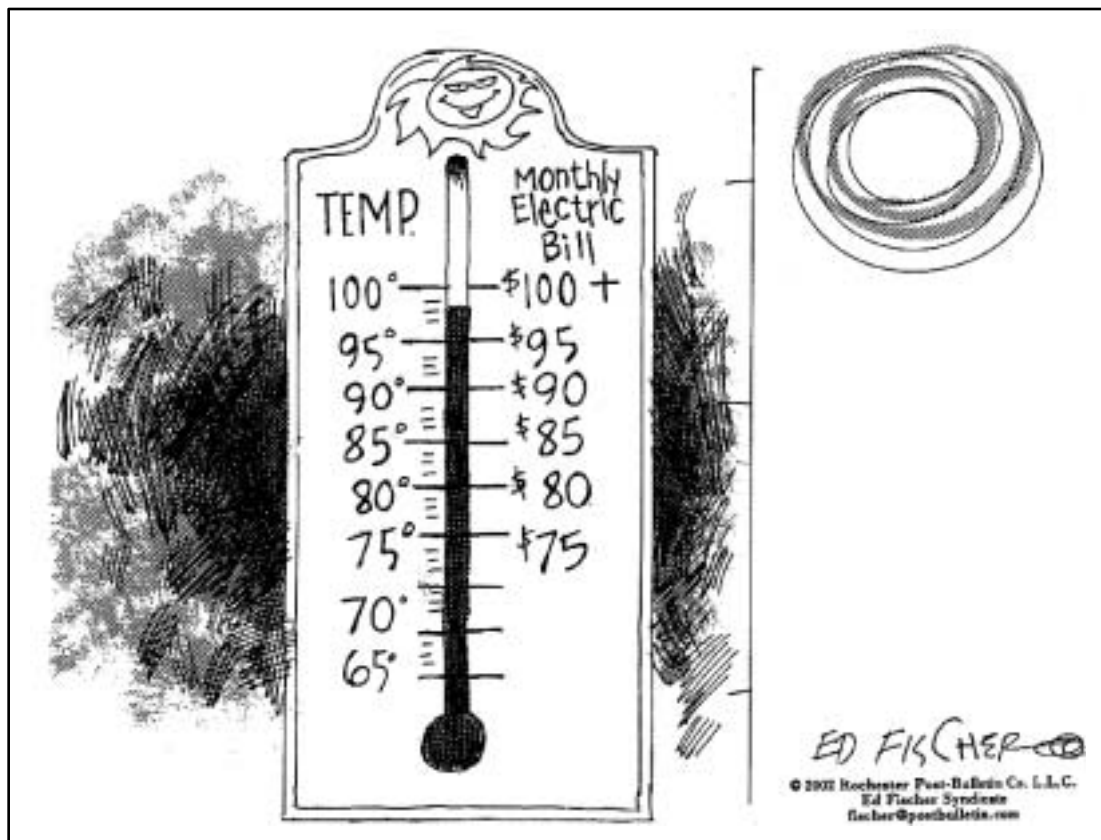

San Pedro features twin bedroom suites

The San Pedro is a contemporary Mediterranean-style vacation home designed for dual ownership. Mirror-image bedroom suites extend from opposite sides of a central hexagonal great room, providing a mix of privacy and shared living space.

Vaulted at the center, the great room is voluminous and bright. High arched windows fill most of three walls, offering a panoramic view of the vista to the rear. A pellet stove backed by a half wall sits on a hexagonal hearth at the center.

Sliding French doors on two sides of the hexagon (and in each of the master suites) open on a long patio that stretches along the entire back side of the home. The hexagonal spa, located at the center of

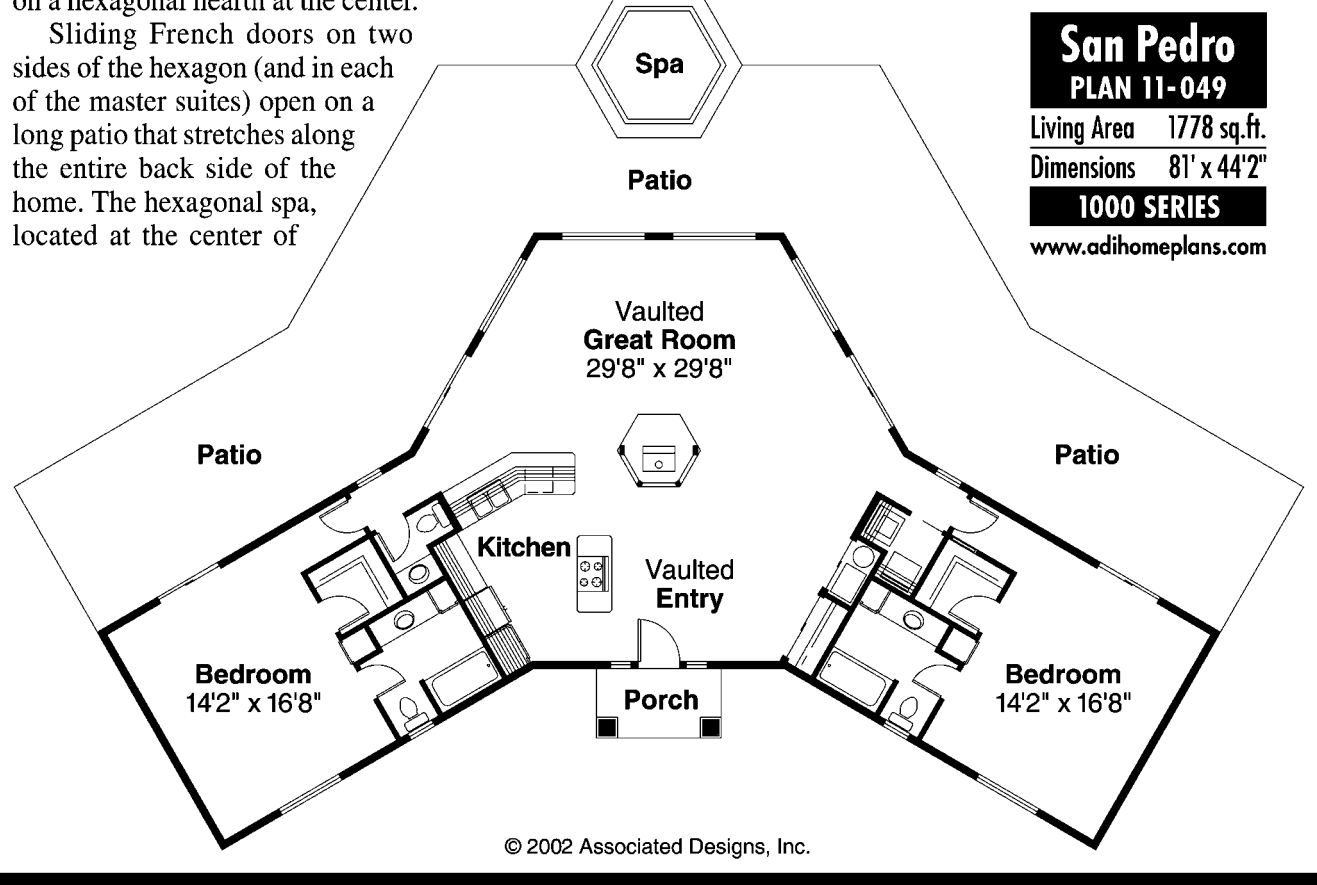
the patio, is roomy enough to relax the owners and a few guests.

The large kitchen has ample counter space for two or more chefs to work at the same time without bumping elbows. Range and oven are in the wide island with work space on either side. The location of the sink and dishwasher, built into a long eating bar, allows the clean-up crew to chat with people sitting on the other side, or gaze out the window while they work.

A small powder room is to the left and an equally compact utility

room is to the right. Each of the San Pedro's bedroom suites has a walk-in closet and a private bathroom with a tub.
