Candidates vie for seats on hospital board, as county supervisor

BY MEG FOX

When voters in Shasta, Lassen and Modoc counties go to the polls on Nov. 5, they will be selecting two trustees to represent them in the Mayers Memorial Hospital District for the next four years.

Incumbents Les Cufaude and Ruth Knoch, both of the Fall River Valley, and Robert Forman, of Burney, are running for the two board openings.

In Modoc County, District 5 voters will be selecting a new county supervisor, either David Bradshaw of Lookout or David Porter Misso of Tulelake, to look after their inter-

primary and hope to take the seat about 247 people. held by Nancy Huffman, of Tulelake, who is retiring after three terms as supervisor.

In the primary, David Bradshaw received 285 votes and David Misso garnered 128 votes. The other two candidates were also from Tulelake.

RUTH KNOCH

Ruth Knoch of Glenburn has served on the Mayers Memorial Hospital's board of directors for 24 years and said she wants to stay on the board because she knows how important the hospital is to the community.

It's needed because it's the only hospital within more than 50 miles and it provides employment for

"I have great concern about keeping the hospital open," she said. "It would be a real detriment to the community if we didn't have it."

Mayers has managed to keep its head above water while hospitals around the state are closing.

"We need board members who truly want to keep this hospital open," she said.

Knoch was chairperson for two years and has served for seven years on the board of the Association of California Hospital Districts.

"When I was on the board, only one hospital in our association had to close. I heard recently that now about half have had to close."

She said her concern is "to make

the hospital financially viable." Knoch said she also believes

board member continuity is important. She said numerous people have

asked her who she supports and her answer has been "definitely, Les Cufaude.

"He is doing an excellent job and is very knowledgeable and helpful," she said. "He's a young person and he is very interested in the board and in the hospital."

Ruth and her husband Bud are lifetime residents of Dana and Glenburn. They have three grown children and seven grandchildren.

LES CUFĂUDE

Les Cufaude has served on the hospital board since May 1997 and

also believes strongly in the need, both economically and as a medical service, to keep Mayers Memorial Hospital open for the Intermountain

"The Intermountain area needs health care and this hospital and the economic impact the hospital has in the area is great," he said, noting that the schools and nearly every business would feel the effects if the hospital had to close.

Cufaude is currently representing Mayers Memorial as chairman of the California Rural Health Design Consortium, a group of 12 rural hospitals and one hospital district that as one entity are able to research and write grants to large endowments. Their goal is to get the funding to meet the state's seismic safety standards for acute care hospitals as required by SB 1953.

"I feel very strongly about the Consortium," Cufaude said, adding that the members have already received funding to do a community needs assessment for each participating hospital.

"We're going to design a core hospital suitable for all the hospitals that need to be rebuilt," he said.

Another current focus he and the hospital board have is to improve employee morale. Cufaude encourages employees to contact them if their issues aren't resolved through the usual chain of command.

"If they are still not happy, they need to come to us," he said.

The board is also implementing an employee survey "to establish benchmarks for all aspects of employee satisfaction," he said.

Cufaude moved to the Intermountain area seven years ago and is an oil and gas consultant for exploration and production.

His children are grown, but he has also been a volunteer coach for youth baseball in the Fall River Valley.

He has a Bachelors degree in science earned in 1975 from Fresno State and is a 1987 graduate of Lincoln Law School.

Eight years ago, he founded and was on the board of the Independent Natural Gas Producers of the State of California, a cooperative set up to negotiate with and buy PG&E's gathering systems in Northern California.

Cufaude said his business experience and his experience on other boards qualifies him to provide special attention to the hospital board and the community it serves.

"I like serving this community," he

Big rig leaks fuel in Burney, but avoids irrigation creek

a big rig away from the Cornez Greer irrigation ditch Thursday, following the solo crash of the 18wheeler.

Elizabeth Maynard, 40, of Marysville was driving the tractor-trailer owned by S&J Royal of Yuba City through Burney after picking up a load of strawberry plants at Oilars Agriculture in McArthur for shipment to Marysville.

Maynard, upon reaching the Burney area, felt fatigued and noticed fog at the west end of town.

It took nearly eight hours to move She turned around and, traveling east, was looking for a place to park and rest for awhile when she fell asleep and allowed the vehicle to drift from the roadway about 5:

> The big rig launched off the ditch bridge and straddled the ditch without going into the water, the California Highway Patrol reported.

> About 30 gallons of diesel fuel was spilled from the rig's fuel tank, but was immediately dammed with absorbent material, preventing it from entering the creek, the CHP

Maynard was not injured in the crash.

Ben's Trucking & Equipment Company was contracted by S&J Royal to clean up the diesel spill. Keith's Towing was contracted with the assistance of Carlton's crane service of Johnson Park, to remove the vehicle. By 1:30 p.m. the 18wheeler was moved east of the ditch and the plants off-loaded.

The big rig never did come in contact with the creek, the CHP

Control burn of 550 acres planned for Lassen Volcanic park

Rangers at Lassen Volcanic National Park plan to ignite a 550acre prescribed fire sometime in early November, said park Supt. Marilyn H. Parris. Called the Hole Prescribed Fire,

the area to be burned is northeast of Raker Peak in the northwest section of the park.

"This is a significant prescribed fire for the park," Parris said. "The objectives are to provide protection for surrounding property and structures, reduce fuel loading and increase the success of the mixed conifer forests to withstand natural fires.'

The project's northern boundary

lies adjacent to lands administered by the Lassen National Forest.

The project is bordered by three miles of fireline and the Hat Creek/ Nobles Emigrant Trail. That trail will be temporarily closed during the burning operations.

The burn will begin as soon as weather conditions will ensure safe and efficient burning conditions, park rangers wrote in a news release. The fire is expected to actively burn for three to five days and then possibly smolder for several weeks.

Park staff said they would notify the public two days prior to conducting the burn.





Your skeleton is very important. It is the frame that gives your body its shape. It protects body organs such as the lungs and heart. With the aid of muscles, it helps you move about.

To find out more about your skeleton, The Mini Page talked to Dr. Laura Tosi.

Living bones

Your bones are alive. They are made of water, minerals, and living tissue such as cells and blood vessels.



A bone is like a pipe. The thick outer part is called the cortex (A). The inside is loosely packed bone that is called the marrow (B). Blood cells are made in the marrow.

Fun bone facts

 More than half the bones in your body are in your hands and feet.

There are 54 bones in your hands and wrists and 52 in your feet and ankles.

 About five out of 100 people have an extra rib. Seventy-five percent of these are men.

 The smallest bone in your body is the stirrup bone in your ear. The largest is the femur in your leg.

Baby bones

Babies have about 270 bones when they are born. As they get older, their bones grow together. Adults have 206 bones.

Babies' bones are all made of a soft tissue called cartilage. As the baby grows, its cartilage cells start turning to bone.


The bloodstream deposits minerals such as calcium and phosphorus in the older cartilage cells. The minerals make the cartilage harden, and it is remodeled to become bone.

Calcium

Bones are an important savings bank for calcium. Calcium is deposited in bone and saved up until the bloodstream makes a withdrawal. The blood then carries the calcium to help our hearts beat and

our muscles work. The body has a kind of thermostat. Every second 6 the body is testing to see if there is enough calcium in the blood. If there is not

enough, the body orders special cells to dissolve some bone to get more calcium into the blood.



In old age, the cells dissolving bone start moving faster than those

building the bone. Because they are weaker, older bones become brittle and break easily. A strong, well-built skeleton slows down this process.

We have to take in enough of the minerals calcium and phosphorus to keep the bone-building cells working well.

Eat right, Drink milk. Most of us like sodas, but milk is better for growing kids.

The vitamin D that you get in fortified milk and sunlight also helps build bones. (Your skin makes vitamin D when it is exposed to sun.)

A growing child or teenager needs the amount of calcium found in three or four 8-ounce glasses of milk a day. There are many other delicious ways to get enough

calcium. For example, you can have pizza with cheese, frozen yogurt, chocolate milk, pudding, soup made with milk, or ice cream. Many vegetables such as broccoli and kale are also rich in calcium. Some kids have

trouble digesting milk, but even these kids can usually eat cheese or yogurt, or a special milk that is easier to digest.


Protect your bones



I haven't been to Redding for 4 weeks. The last time I was there I paid \$1.61 a gallon for regular gas and \$1.69 for diesel fuel.

I just returned last weekend and gas was \$1.39 for regular and \$1.55 for diesel. What is happening in the Intermountain area.

The price of gas is between \$1.73 and \$1.83 and diesel is \$1.79. Why hasn't the price dropped here? If anything the price of diesel has gone up a dime a

CNN News said the lowest price for gas in the nation was in Atlanta, GA at \$1.26 and the highest was Hawaii at \$1.68. Well it sure is nice knowing we pay a lot more than that!

I'm not in the trucking business, but I know it doesn't cost .25 cents a gallon to get it here from Redding.

I go to Sparks, NV., quite often and gas and fuel is always cheaper in Susanville, Doyle, and so on and they are far more remote than our Intermountain area!

The prices here should have dropped at least .20 to .25 cents a gallon. Would one of the stations respond to this?

Until then I will buy just enough gas and fuel to get me to Redding or Reno where I can fill up and not feel like I'm being taken advantage of!

Memorial Hospital, a lot of which she had planted and tended for seven years as their contract gardener, were in need of some care.

Schneider enlisted the help of Beatrice Tubbs, one of seven local gardeners taking a Master Gardner Class with her in Klamath Falls, and they decided to fulfill their community gardening project at the hospital.

"We had 42 hours of instruction and we were asked to repay with 42 hours of volunteer gardening for a community service project," Schneider explained.

"Rose and I each planned on working four hours a week on the project," said Tubbs.

They soon discovered it was going to take much more

After 276 volunteer hours and the help of many more volunteers - the weeds are gone and the flowers are blooming.

"It's come together pretty well," said Schneider, who volunteered 216 of those hours.

"It's spectacular," said hospital CEO Jerry Fikes. "It's gone from looking like the Gobi Desert to Buchart Gardens."

The Wayside Garden Club donated \$400 that was used to purchase shrubs and irrigation supplies.

Tubbs developed carpal tunnel syndrome and wasn't able to help as much as she had planned, but others, such as Kelly Shuler, Carol Moyer, Fergus Redgrave and the Wayside Garden Club put in many unanticipated volunteer hours.

Cordova Laurel McArthur has voluntarily been doing the "gorgeous": flower beds in the front of the hospital," Schneider said.

A 15-man inmate crew from the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection, Intermountain Conservation Camp in Bieber, put in another 300 hours of labor by clearing brush behind the hospital, weeding and helping Schneider.

The crew also recently cleared brush at the Burney

In addition to her hospital gardening contract of several years ago, Schneider was the contract gardener for the Inter-Mountain Fairgrounds for 19 years.

"Years ago when I was the gardening at the hospital, I installed some drip watering and that needed repair.

"Hospital Maintenance and I spent a lot of time repairing and replacing that. Don Eastman was my lifesaver for helping with watering."

Schneider, Shuler, and Tubbs also donated numerous starts of perennials and annuals.

They worked in the hospital courtyard and its rose garden, which Schneider and Wayside Garden Club designed several years ago.

"It was designed with wide walks to accommodate wheel chairs and has a bird bath and a nice grassy area and a Japanese maple to give shade and a plum tree that doesn't look so good right now," she laughed.

Last week, Schneider was busy renovating what she calls the back triangle.

"This was part of another Wayside Garden Club project. I planted the pin oaks and a red leaf plum tree here years ago and Kelly and I had our lunch beneath those trees today. It's just beautiful under that tree."

Her hope is that more patients will come out and enjoy the beauty of the gardens.

Youngsters learn about butterflies

It's been an annual Burney Elementary School tradition for more than 20 years.

Recently 65 first graders emerged from their classrooms in bright orange and black butterfly wings and migrated around the school as they celebrated the release of their Monarch butterflies.

The project begins at the start of school when first grade teacher Pam Morris and whatever helpers she can enlist search for milkweed plants and the Monarch larvae feeding on the under-

side of a leaf.

Where she finds them is "a deep, dark secret," but it's been a variety of locations.

Since the larvae need to eat fresh milkweed every single day, "we try to get them in a more mature stage," she said.

This year she shared her caterpillars with first grade teachers Melinda Booker, Suzanne Wall, and Judy Derry, who each had butterfly habitats waiting in their class-

When the insect is ready to pupate, it hangs in what

Morris calls a "J" formation and the adult emerges in about 10 to 14 days.

"As the Monarch is developing it's a beautiful lime green and then it blackens and pops out. It happens within a minute or two and often the children get to see it and it's really very special."

The first graders keep the butterflies for about 24 hours. "Then we go outside and get in a circle and sing a butterfly song and let them go to continue south on their migration to Pacific Grove and Mexico."

They cleaned it up on Friday and also came up with a plan to keep it tidy.

The path, which is on Fruit Growers property, is used frequently by Burney High School as a lunch hour short cut to Commerce Way, where students can buy food at the stores and restaurants.

Wall contacted McDonald's Restaurant, Holiday Market, and Burney High School Principal Larry Hutchinson.

"All of us we concerned,"

Wall said.

In addition to monitoring the path more frequently, Hutchinson agreed to Wall's proposal.

If the CDF can justify its labor as community service, Wall said, the Intermountain Conservation Camp could provide additional garbage bins with galvanized metal lids and secure the bins to a concrete base.

"Our in-camp products are

welding and metal fabrication," he said.

"We could even put in a walkway and some benches so that the students could take pride in the area," Wall said.

Hutchinson said he would ask the school's Leadership Class to draft a proposal to request a right-of-way from Fruit Growers and request a letter of support from the local food businesses.




