## Portion of Highway 89 dedicated to slain Burney CHP officer Dunn

Some 85 people turned out Monday morning for a dedication ceremony to honor two California Highway Patrol officers who died in the line of duty.

Arthur E. Dunn was shot and killed July 9, 1977, while transporting a prisoner in his patrol vehicle on Highway 89 near the McArthur Road turnoff.

George W. Redding died one month later from injuries he sustained at a collision scene on Highway 273 near Happy Valley Road.

Both officers were 43 years old. "I'm really touched that after 25 years people are still remembering," said son Rocky Dunn of Redding. "We still miss him."

Rocky's brother Art of Brookings,

Ore., noted the sadness in missing his father.

"It still hurts," Art said, adding that had his father not been killed, "He'd be retired now and we would be going hunting."

CHP Sgt. Doug Pappas of the CHP office in Redding initiated the process of honoring the officers in 2000 by proposing memorials along the two highways.

State Sen. Maurice Johannessen sponsored senate resolutions designating about five-mile stretches of the highways to both men.

Pappas was attending Shasta College in 1977 and now serves with George Redding's son Mark, who joined the CHP in 1985 and is stationed in the Redding area.

The signs honoring Arthur Dunn were installed along Highway 89 about four weeks ago near the McArthur Road turnoff to Dana.

Dunn was killed while on duty one early Saturday morning. Gary Arlon Eades, 36, of Johnson Park was charged and convicted with the murder. Eades died in the mid 1990s after serving a prison term for the crime.

In 1977, rumors of the tragic event spread quickly throughout the Intermountain area where Dunn made his home. The most common reaction was shocked disbelief, as reported in The Intermountain News. "You hear about this sort of

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## Group chooses favorite among 3 park designs

About 40 community members were wowed by the three design options for the Bailey Community Park displayed during a meeting in Burney Oct. 28.

"I think you've captured what we are all looking for," Kari Hovis told Danielle Spirandelli, the Seattle, Wash. landscape architect who is designing the project at no cost other than travel expenses.

"Any community would be lucky to have any of these designs," said Karol Hatcher, when asked, like the others, to vote for her favorite. "I believe that with Danielle's expertise she will give us what we want."

After listening to each person's remarks, Spirandelli said she would do another design that integrated the group's two favorite designs for the four-acre park that will be between the Little League fields and the swimming pool on Bailey

Avenue.

One design was filled with trees and shrubbery and brought the various park users - the toddlers, the walkers, the skateboarders, and the picnickers - close together.

A second design had more open space and the meeting room was almost evenly divided between those who liked the "flow" and closeness of one design and those who wanted "less clutter."

Burney Chamber President Lori Winningham voted for a more "open park. Too much is pushed into one area," she said.

Clayton Vaughn, a student and a skateboarder, agreed.

His father, James Vaughn, favored the design with "everyone being all together," but suggested "rearranging so it's not so compact."

## Cuts to schools before trustees

The reality of living with a \$321,500 cut to the school district's budget began to sink in last week as teachers, administrators and community members grappled with the impacts of proposed losses.

Supt. Eric Newton and the district business office siphoned off dollars here and dollars there creating an amended budget proposal for public review before possible approval at tonight's 7 p.m. board meeting in Burney.

"The reductions are proposed and the school board is considering them as well," said Newton at one of two community meetings held after publicizing the proposed cuts and asking each site to submit an "anticipated" impact report.

About 30 people attended the Oct. 28 meeting in Fall River Mills, while only a handful were at the Oct. 29 meeting in Burney.

Labor contracts are still being "held harmless" from reductions, Newton said, and the board is not yet considering reductions through increased cafeteria and transportation charges to families.

The proposed budget amendments leaves the district with a 3.66 percent reserve.

Newton said if the proposed cuts receive a lot of negative input, the board could revise the proposal. "But time is a problem. We have a time limit," he said. The county wants the revised budget no later than Nov. 13, leaving scant time to consider more creative approaches to budget cuts.

The two elementary schools in the Fall River JUSD and the two high schools are looking at \$15,000 budget cuts at each site, while the Alternative Education Program (four sites) is facing a \$19,050 cut.

The District Office may have to make do without \$48,000, with reductions in money once budgeted for custodial supplies at each site, office supplies, travel and conferences, and mileage.

For the two elementary schools, the cuts mean having more fundraisers to pay for sixth grade camp, fewer or no field trips, and the conservative use of supplies with the hope that they don't run out before year's end.

When asked to assess the impact of \$15,000 cuts at the high schools, Burney Principal Larry Hutchinson said it could mean canceling non-league varsity and junior varsity contests, and self-funding for sports, such as track and wrestling.

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## Willmore appointed to RAC

Skip Willmore of Burney joins two other new members and two returning members to the Bureau of Land Management's Northeast California Resource Advisory Council.

Willmore, a Burney area businessman, will represent commodity interests including timber and energy development.

Eagle Lake resident Martin Balding will represent environmental interests on the 15-member panel.

A member of Eagle Lake Audubon, Balding has long been involved in regional natural resource issues. He has worked on several resource planning groups.

Modoc County resident Terry Williams will represent outdoor recreation interests. The Modoc County Fish, Game and Recreation Commission nominated Williams for the position.

He has long been involved in regional issues and currently serves on the Modoc-Washoe Experimental Stewardship Steering Committee.

Honey Lake valley farmer Tim Garrod was named to a new term in the public-at-large category.

Dr. Henricus Jansen, a rangeland management professor at California State University, Chico, was appointed to a new term representing academic interests.

"I am pleased to announce the appointment of these talented individuals to serve on the Resource Advisory Council," Norton said.

"We are excited because each RAC member brings a local perspective and background that will assist the BLM in our mission of con-

sultation, cooperation and communication — all in the service of conservation."

The Northeast California RAC is one of 24 such BLM advisory councils in the Western United States.

The members advise BLM managers in Alturas, Cedarville and Susanville on natural resource management and issues affecting nearly 3 million acres of public lands in northeast California and extreme northwest Nevada.

Members represent diverse public lands interests including livestock grazing, recreation, timber, historical interests, wild horse and burro interests, environmental concerns, Native American interests, academia, local government and the public at large.

The council meets four times each year and all sessions are open to the public.

Council members are not paid but are compensated for their travel expenses.

also voted for a more open design, and, while Tammy Budesa said she liked having the Toddler Park near trees "for a woodland experience," Porter said that at the Lions Whale Park leaves and other debris got into the equipment and caused problems.

Everyone liked the idea of a grassy knoll overlooking the baseball diamond on one side and the skateboard park on the other.

Sitting on the hillside, park visitors could also look out on the area's mountains.

"There are some really amazing views from that site that I wanted to capitalize on," Spirandelli said.

Andy Urlie said he thought the proposed hill would be a "parent's paradise."

"I like the idea of benches there where you can watch baseball and spin around and watch the skateboarders," said Jim Erickson.

A favorite design plan had the amphitheater in the center of the park with picnic areas surrounding it.

"The sun is a constraint on the amphitheater and has influenced its placement," Spirandelli explained.

Her designs have a paved path for runners and a separate dirt path "for meanderers."

Most wanted to center the skateboard park, rather than build it in on the park edges, so that people could watch the skateboarders.

"It should be in an area that legitimizes their skills and talents," said Connie Sebastian, a former teacher and a trustee for the Fall River JUSD.

Spirandelli suggested integrating uses since the community has a lot of wished-for activity centers crammed on

to four acres.

Instead of duplicating basketball courts, she asked if they could use the courts at Burney Elementary School and, since there have been requests for an ice skating rink, she wondered if a portion of the courts could be flooded in the winter.

"It would give the courts two uses and less impact on the park site," she said.

Erickson, who has had a backyard ice skating rink for 12 years, said the idea was feasible.

The skating season is about six weeks long and he noted that a rink "needs to be groomed and watered" regularly.

Urlie and Janet Chandler wanted to add tennis courts as a third use for an open sport court and another person suggested roller hockey, too.

A pond design was removed due to its high maintenance and concerns about safety, insurance liability, and mosquitoes.

The group decided the school-age obstacle course would fit nicely in the space instead.

Bob Hatcher asked about run-off from the park to the elementary school's playground, but Spirandelli said that "lots of vegetation providing a large swale" would mitigate that problem.

The group discussed various parking options, including the parking lot for the Burney swimming pool, and Jackie Young, president of the Burney Water District's board, said she would bring it up at their next meeting.

Jean Rodgers said if cars parked diagonally, the dirt road past the pool could accommodate 60 vehicles.

Plans are to begin construction of the Toddler Park this spring, as weather per-

mits, and to have the school-age obstacle course in by June.

"I'm really enthusiastic," said Sebastian, who thanked the people "who had the

dream and the courage to follow through with the dream."

After the meeting, Cindy Dodds, executive director of the Tri Counties Com-

munity Network, which has spearheaded the project and gone after the grant funding, said insurance coverage and other costs would probably be the topic for their next

gathering.

There are obstacles ahead, but, said Dodds, "No one needs to wonder for a moment. This park will happen."

the Industrial Arts, Science, Art, and Home Economics budgets for materials and planned projects.

At the community meeting in Burney, art teacher Rick Morris asked if the site budgets could be cut "appropriate to need," rather than the blanket \$15,000 cuts.

Newton said it was a good idea, but that the time factor "is keeping us from taking a more enlightened approach to this."

Fall River High School Principal Liz Kyle said her staff decided to do away with departmental budgets and to instead pool their resources "to make purchases that are necessary to teach the students."

She outlined reductions in purchases of athletic equipment and new band music, in ag education, office supplies, and library supplies not covered by the state library grant.

It may also mean reduced band travel to competitions and fewer instructional supplies that "enhance but are not necessary for education," Kyle said in her impact report.

All sites were told to reduce costs associated with their school-to-home mailings and to cut back on using supplies and school copiers.

The district cut \$3,000 from copier contract maintenance budget and cancelled service agreements.

Budget reductions include a \$15,000 cut of funds allocated to replace the copy machine at Fall River High and \$10,000 for a T-1 line at East Burney Elementary.

Other reductions include \$20,000 budgeted for board/superintendent travel expenses and \$20,000 to replace the superintendent's car.

The transportation department is facing a \$13,200 budget cut that includes

repair parts for the buses and other district vehicles.

"With this cut, we will be unable to repair our buses for this year. We will probably have two or three buses we cannot use by year's end," the district budget report stated. "We will probably be unable to do field trips and some athletic events in the spring."

Some of the teachers at the Burney community meeting voiced their lingering irritation about past spending.

While acknowledging that Newton had not been hired when the decisions were made to buy costly lawn mowers, they wanted to be sure future money was spent where it was most needed.

"There are two electric

gates that cost \$10,000 just sitting out there and not being used," said Morris. "It's not fair to put you on the spot, you weren't here, but we would like (the district) to get more input from people when major purchase are being made."

Morris said he didn't think it was the best time to buy busing safety gates that were not being used.

In the district's defense, Newton explained that there is a state-mandated deferred maintenance budget and "we have enough maintenance needs to spend it."

"Except that the lawn mower came out of the General Fund," said Ellen Sugg-Forbis, a Burney teacher and president of the Fall River

Education Association.

"I suspect the electric fences came out of the General Fund, too," said Morris.

"I think so, too," said Newton, adding that the decision to buy the gates was made in April, before the school knew about the state's budget cuts to schools.

"But your point is well taken," Newton said.

Community members and teachers also discussed other cost saving options.

While acknowledging it wasn't a popular idea, Burney parent Denise Rice asked about making all sports club sports.

"Why is it that art, music and drama take the first hits and sports are divine?" asked Lynn Miller, another Burney parent.

"Has the district considered having one high school," asked Patty Bledsoe.

"Not yet," said Newton. "Not officially. We were just about to start down that road when the state" announced its funding reductions.

In his report about the budget, Newton asked for "positive participation" when restructuring of the district "unfolds in the coming months."

Morris said they might also

look at the financial benefits derived from splitting the district and forming two separate union high school districts and separate elementary schools governed by four separate boards of education.

Forbis suggested looking at the base revenue limits of similar districts in the state.

"There are many that are lower or the same as ours and their salary schedules are higher," she said.

"We could contact them, look at their budgets and see how they manage," she said, and Newton agreed to meet with her and go over comparable budgets.

## Changes to school tests made

The College Board has voted to significantly change the SAT. The revisions will include:

- Adding a writing section with a 25-minute handwritten essay
- Dropping the analogy portion of the verbal section, to be replaced by shorter prose passages that test reading comprehension
- More higher-level math questions, specifically Algebra II

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The new test will be introduced in March 2005.

 thing happening in the big cities but not in Burney," one person said, seemingly echoing the thoughts of many area residents.  
 The incident was initially pieced together by Sgt. Bill Harrington of the Burney Sheriff's Substation for The News.  
 The first official involvement in the case came when the CHP received a complaint that a man had been forced off the road by someone driving a station wagon. This reportedly occurred on Dana Road between Dana and Highway 89 at about 10:15 p.m. on a Friday.  
 CHP Officer Howard Duff responded to this call. He was later joined by fellow officer Dunn who decided to drive north on Highway 89.  
 At 11:55 p.m. Friday the Redding CHP dispatcher received a call from Dunn who indicated that he had found a man who was apparently intoxicated slumped behind the wheel of a car parked on Pondosa Road near Highway 89. He notified the dispatcher that he had the subject in custody and was enroute to the Burney Substation. That was his last radio message.  
 Meantime, Sgt. Harrington

said Officer Duff was awaiting Dunn's arrival at the Burney Substation. When he did not arrive when expected, radio contact was attempted to no avail. Duff then proceeded north on Highway 89 to try to locate him. He was joined by Deputy Sheriff Officers Larry Jarrett and Harry Bishop.  
 At about the same time, the Redding CHP dispatcher received a call from a Yreka citizen who had observed a CHP patrol car over an embankment.  
 At 1:16 a.m. officers arrived at the scene, one-half mile south of the Dana turnoff on Highway 89. The patrol car had been southbound and left the road on the west side, mowing down several small trees before crashing into a large pine tree.  
 Investigators determined that the car was traveling at approximately 70 miles per hour when it left the pavement. There were no skid marks.  
 Shortly after their arrival, the officers determined that Officer Dunn was dead at the scene and that he had been shot in the back of the head. An autopsy later revealed that he died from a bullet wound to the head.  
 The suspect, Eades, who had been in the back seat

of the car was found lying on the shoulder across the road from the crash.  
 Harrington said the suspect indicated that there had been another subject in the back seat by the name of "Dave," whom he said did the shooting. However, investigators said there was little evidence that there was another person involved.  
 An All Points Bulletin was issued to all areas surrounding the scene including Alturas, Susanville, Redding and Mt. Shasta. Shortly after, sheriff's detectives arrived at the scene to begin their investigation.  
 After the crash, Eades apparently broke out a window on the drivers side to get out.  
 Searchers conducted an intensive search for a .22 caliber pistol and found the weapon July 31.  
 Dunn had been a CHP officer for 14 years and had been stationed in Burney since 1967.  
 He was born February 18, 1934 in Star, Idaho. He was a member of the Fort Crook Masonic Lodge in Fall River Mills and the Burney Lions Club and was an Army veteran of the Korean war.

**Color:** orange

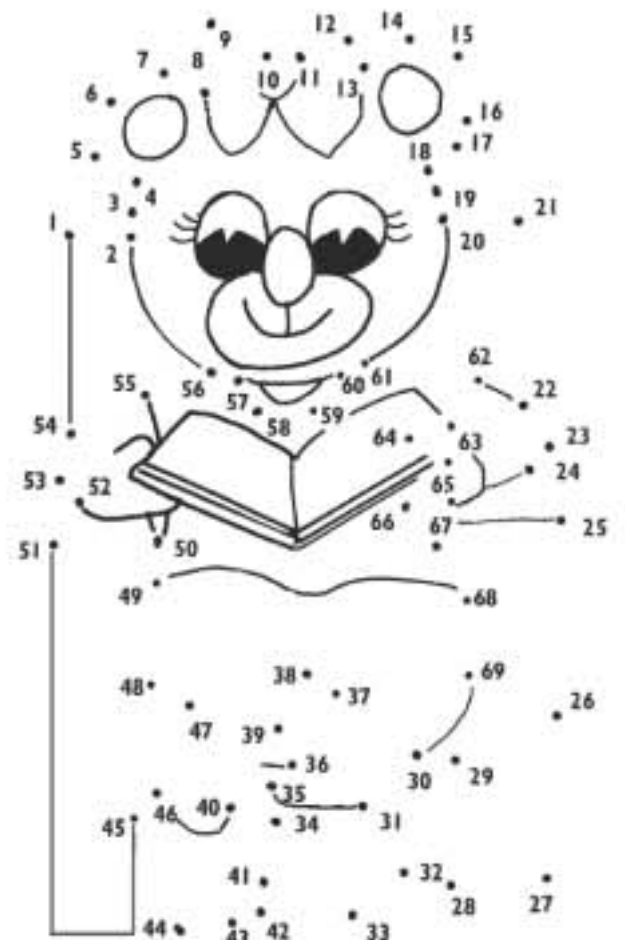

**"Book Time" is the theme of this year's Children's Book Week, celebrated from Nov. 18 to 24. This Mini Page is about the 2002 Caldecott and Newbery Medals and Honor Books.**

**Newbery winners**

The John Newbery Medal is awarded each year to the author of the most outstanding children's book. This year there were also two Honor Book awards.

"A Single Shard" by Linda Sue Park won the Newbery Medal.

It is about an orphan boy in Korea 1,000 years ago who dreams of making beautiful pottery.

**Caldecott winners**

The Caldecott Medal is presented each year to the illustrator of the most distinguished picture book for children. This year there were also three Honor Book awards.

**Caldecott Honor Books**

Marilyn Nelson is an award-winning poet and an English professor at the University of Connecticut.

"Carver, A Life in Poems" tells the story of George Washington Carver. He was born a slave and grew up to become a top scientist. This book also won a Coretta Scott King Honor Award.

"The Dinosaurs of Waterhouse Hawkins" is the true story of the man who built the first life-size models of dinosaurs in the world. It is written by Barbara Kerley.

Bryan Collier volunteers by helping young artists in Harlem. In 2001, he won both the Coretta Scott King Award and an Honor Book award.

"Martin's Big Words" tells of the life of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. It also won a Coretta Scott King Honor Award. It is written by Doreen Rappaport.

Marc Simont has illustrated nearly 100 books. He won the Caldecott Medal in 1957 for "A Tree Is Nice" by Janice May Udry. (No picture of Simont was available.)
