Some Big Bend residents without power for 10 days

When winter arrived in the Intermountain area Dec. 15, it came full force, bringing along high winds and, for some in the Big Bend area, days of power outages right through Christmas.

PG&E reported that at the height of the storm about 1,000 customers

from Burney to Big Bend were out.

"By Christmas Eve day we had restored all of those who we knew were out, except for a few customers who have their own lines and had to do their own repairs," said Janet Walther, PG&E spokesperson in Chico.

She said that if trees came down on lines on the customer-owned side of the meter, "they had the responsibility to do the repairs prior to PG&E coming in" to restore power.

Walther said PGE "kept moving resources up to Burney and Big

Bend" until at one point about 80 employees were in the area tracking down and repairing the wind damage to the system.

"We were inundated with problems due to the high winds," Walther said.

Donation to Acorn

U.S. Bank Manager Nancy Miller of the Burney branch stopped by the Acorn Café and community center in Montgomery Creek recently to acknowledge the bank's \$10,000 grant for youth-related activities at the center. Lynn Dorroh, director of Acorn Community Enterprises, said the money would be used to expand their services to teenagers. Plans are to stay open later and to provide a tutor to help with homework. The donation will also be used to establish an Individual Development Account (IDA), a federal community reinvestment program. Banks and other corporate sponsors agree to match every dollar that youth put into their IDA accounts. The savings account is specified for education-related expenditures. As co-owners of the account, Acorn would approve the withdrawals.

New laws to affect gun owners, skateboards and more

Ring in with the New Year are new laws affecting everyone from skateboarders and new fathers to landlords and gun owners.

The controversial Handgun Safety Certificate law takes effect Wednesday and replaces the lifetime Basic Firearms Safety Certificate (BFSC).

The new handgun safety license is good for five years, costs \$25, and is required of anyone receiving a handgun.

To get the safety certificate, handgun buyers must first pass a written test on gun laws and gun safety.

They also have to show they can handle the gun safely in a demonstration before a state-certified gun safety instructor.

A thumb print and something other than a driver's license or state ID card to prove state residency is also required.

Before the sale is complete, gun dealers are required to swipe the magnetic stripe on the back of the buyer's driving license to prevent the use of forged licenses.

Scholl said he served for about a year, but quit because he is involved in other activities and also because

Robert Cetta, another board member, resigned about a month before Scholl, due to a back injury.

Cetta served on the cemetery board for about 15 years.

Gandy has been a resident of Fall River Mills since 1972 and is a

retired X-ray technician who worked at Mayers Memorial Hospital for 15 years before becoming a traveling technician.

He also served as a commissioner for the Fall River Mills Fire Department for one year before being voted out by the other commissioners, he said.

"I started doing it when I was a long-term substitute. A lot of the children didn't have hats and it's something I like to do. They all loved them so I kept doing it," she said.

It takes her about two-and-one-half hours per hat so she usually gets started around Oct. 1. With 38 students, this is her biggest year so far, she said.

"It was a disaster," said one organizer, who reported that only 33 kids were able to get through three and half feet of snow for the festivity at the Big Bend Community Center.

Brandi Martin, a Westwood High School freshman who was in town for the Burney Jamboree basketball tournament, put 25 cents in the gumball machine at Round Table and became the restaurant's first winner of the \$50 prize.

Some say they are fed up with power outages

Some Big Bend residents say they are fed up with PG&E's extended power outages, even though most try to stay ready for days without electricity.

"I was somewhat prepared for the recent outage," said Bob Allen, a Big Bend resident and retired PG&E employee.

When the power first went out, Allen said, "I had just said to myself, 'You had better fill up some water jugs.'"

"That I did, 15 of them, and five minutes later the power went out."

Allen was without power from Thursday Dec. 19 to Tuesday, Dec. 24.

"We had a good supply of groceries on hand and we used rainwater that we had gathered to flush the commodes," he said.

"We have propane gas for cooking, heat, heating water and a woodstove, so we have an alternative energy source if our electricity goes out."

"I have a separate electrical circuit to supply a generator, if the need arises."

"This was installed when I had the house built and we have a solar heating source that is also available for use."

Allen said his main problem is keeping supplies of fresh water on hand.

"When the power came back on, I had two one-gallon jugs of water left of the 15 I had originally filled."

He thinks power outages have gotten worse.

"The power has been off more since I retired than while I was working and for longer periods of time. But,

we usually try to be prepared for them."

A 30-year resident of Big Bend, who wished to remain unnamed, said, "After all these years, we are the last to get any type of service."

"We have extended power outages, even after Davey Tree Service has been working for three years trimming and cutting trees that were supposed to be dangerous to the lines."

Another resident said that when she called PG&E's automated system during the outage, the system reported that power would be restored Saturday (Dec. 21) at 6 p.m., then Sunday (Dec. 22) at 6 p.m., and then Monday (Dec. 23) at 6 p.m.

"It wasn't until I called PG&E late Monday evening and talked to a manager that they sent 70 or so PG&E crewmen the next day to take care of the outage."

Julie Ford of Golden Bear Store & Deli in Round Mountain and My-T-Fine Foods in

Bella Vista said outages are hard for business people.

"Power outages make the conducting of business incredibly difficult for several reasons," she said.

"We can't be there for our customers who definitely need us."

"We suffer tremendous losses of products when the power is out for an extended period of time."

"And it reaffirms in our minds that we need to have an alternative power source for emergencies and for normal times because of PG&E's high costs."

Walther said customers who are out need to call and notify PG&E, even if their neighbors have power.

"As far as we know, the problem has been fixed, but there can be individual locations that still have problems that we don't know about," she said.

anyone under the age of 18 is required to wear a safety helmet when they use scooters, skateboards and in-line skates. Violators can be fined \$25.

On Jan. 1, California becomes the first state to provide its workers with paid leave to take care of sick relatives or newborns.

Under the new law, workers pay an average of \$27 each year toward the program, which provides up to 55 percent of salary for as many as six weeks a year.

Californians can receive these benefits starting in July.

Renters will get more protection under a new law that requires landlords to give long-term renters a 60-day eviction notice, instead of the traditional 30-day notice.

However, if a landlord has a court order for an eviction for nonpayment, the notice time remains three days.

Another new law is designed to help tenants reclaim their damage deposits.

After Jan. 1, landlords are required to give their tenants an optional walk-through to inspect the property for damage two weeks prior to the moving out date.

California businesses are now required to give their employees at least 60 days' notice prior to a mass layoff, relocation, or business closure.

Employers are also facing an increase in unemployment insurance taxes of \$14 to \$21 per worker per year.

Other new laws include:

A 3.33 percent increase in real estate taxes for anyone buying property in California. Previously, only nonresident sellers of real estate had to pay the tax.

An increase in state park fees of as much as \$5 for a day pass, \$13 for camping, and the reinstatement of boat launching fees at rates of from \$2 to \$4.

A tuition waiver at state universities and community colleges for children and spouses of those who died in the Sept. 11 attacks.

Also as result of the Sept. 11 tragedy, registered domestic partners will be allowed to inherit each other's property when one dies without a will.

Also starting Wednesday, junk faxes become illegal, the Segway Human Transporter becomes legal to ride on sidewalks, depending on local laws, and retailers are no longer permitted to sell ephedra to minors in California.

Did I hear embarrassment in your statement, or did you feel conviction knowing that maybe you should not have said anything at all because you don't know me, and it was very obvious you don't know our Elders, so you don't have the right to judge who is an elder, or a Pit River.

Now that have said all of this, whom are you to accuse me of ripping off the Tribe, saying that I am going to our Tribal meetings while on the clock, big deal.

Maybe I was just doing my job being at that meeting collecting information for our members, or maybe I put in too many hours, and just happened to clock out and went to the Tribal meeting. You don't know why I was there so don't try to accuse me of ripping off the Tribe.

Daniel did that already. Do you think that I really want to follow in his footsteps? "No, I don't." Do you not understand what Cultural Information Officer stands for?

Just in case if you don't, here is the definition of the meaning of Cultural, adj 1: of or relating to the arts and manners that a group favors, "Cultural events," a person of broad cultural interests, 2: denoting or deriving from or distinctive of the ways of living built up by a group of people, influenced by ethnic and cultural ties. "Information," News, advice, or knowledge communicated by others or obtained by personal study and investigation, intelligence, knowledge derived from reading, observation, or instruction. "Officer," one who holds an office of authority or trust in an organization, such

as a corporation or government.

Why did I address it this way you say? Well, because if anything how did you not know that maybe I was there on business, or maybe I was there because, I clocked out and wanted to go to the meeting.

I believe at the time you seen me at the Tribal meeting was on a Friday, and I informed the Tribal Council I was not on the clock, so there, leave me alone I don't need you to patronize, or scrutinize what I do with my time.

Yes, I am grateful that Daniel advocated for me to receive help for my schooling, and my job position with the Tribe, but that does not lead me to believe, and to abhor to Daniels idea in his fraudulent ways to steal from the Tribe, and you say we are lying, and spreading rumors about Daniels conduct, well the facts will speak for its self coming up on his Judicial meeting before the Tribal Council at this upcoming January 10 meeting.

Now that I have said what I wanted to say, let me educate you on why we are so special. The Pit River Nation were known to be militant, and aggressive in standing up to whom ever, or to the Government in defending our ancestral lands, which we inherited from our Elders, only to have our land to be taken away by the Federal Government, "BIA," and other Federal Agency's.

The Federal government tried to strip our pride, identity, sovereignty, and our land rights out from under us, yes, they might have taken most of our land but we are still retaining 9.000.00, to 10.000.00 acres of Indian Trust Land that belongs to the Tribe, within the 100 square miles from Alturas, all the way down to Burney, Big Bend, Montgomery Creek, and Roaring Creek.

Now I am going to educate you on our wonderful Elders

that fought for our rights, and our land, great people like Raymond Lego, Wilard Rhoades, Rile Webster, Gordon Montgomery, Charles Buckskin, Ross Montgomery Sr., Mike Griffith, Talibert Wilson, Norman Wolfen, Herald Montgomery, the Craig family.

Do you think that they got paid to sit on as a Tribal Council Representative, or that they stole from the Tribe as your husband, and others are doing as of right now?

Do you think that we should just look the other way and act like we don't know what he is doing to the Tribe, when we have people with real legitimate requests of needing help?

Your insinuations about us Pit Rivers picking on your husband, and lying about his conduct as a Tribal Council is a lie.

So, where is the pride in someone that supposed to be Pit River who will not act on behalf, or the betterment of the Tribe.

My two Grandpa's and a uncle fought long and hard for this Tribe and who I personally know that contributed greatly in the Occupation days, of trying to retain our Sovereign Rights of this Great Nation. We are still land rich, and we never gave up our mineral and our water rights, and other inheritant rights.

So, the next time you want to utter out loud about our Members of the Pit River Tribe, remember who's land your standing on, and maybe you will think twice about accusing, and slanderling me or our people.

Statement from another great leader Doc Jenkins, "If I am a defeated people, show me the terms of my surrender." Oh yeah, one more thing, did you really see someone running around here in circles in the EPA office, and making hand gestures, or were you joking? Because, If you were not, you need to seek professional

help and quit stocking me. Please....

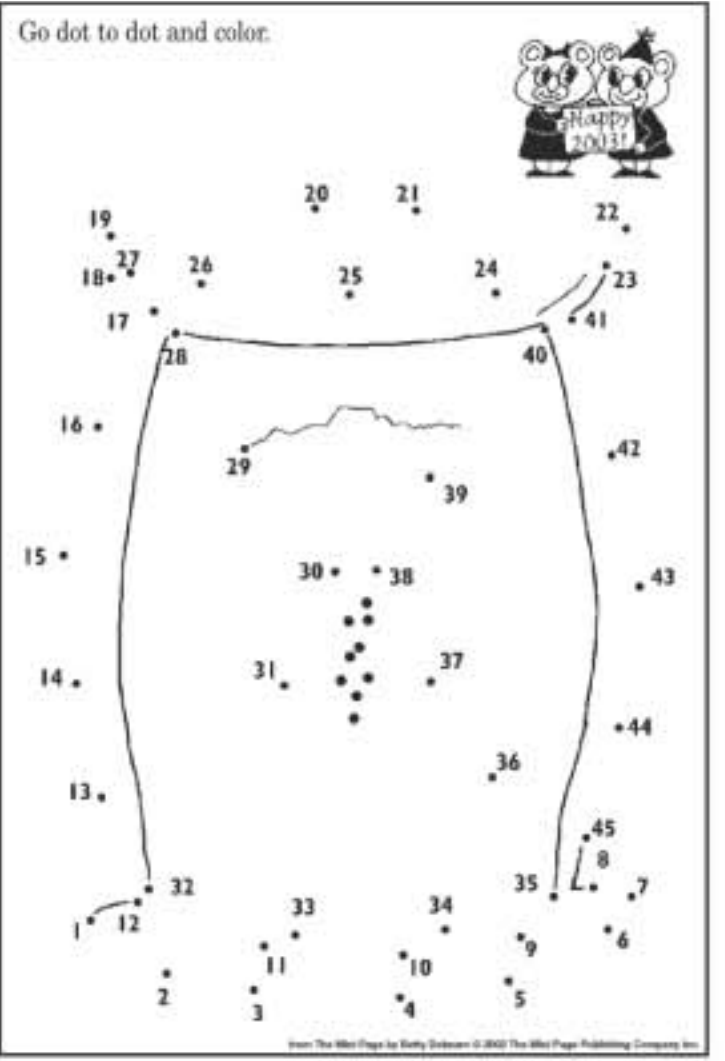

Hello, anybody out there?

The first of, what is hoped, to be 350 dishes of the Allen Telescope Array was installed in July at the Hat Creek Observatory. As part of the SETI (search for extraterrestrial intelligence) science project, full construction still needs state and federal permits for a planned completion date of mid 2005. All SETI science is privately funded. The Hat Creek project is made possible by philanthropists Paul Allen, co-founder of Microsoft, who donated \$11.5 million, and Nathan Myhrvold, who donated \$1 million. Allen has said he will provide additional monies to complete the \$26 million project. A bridge too far?

This conceptual rendition is one Caltrans alternative noted in September to replacing or repairing the Lake Britton Bridge (pictured below the modern span) on Highway 89, a project that's not scheduled until 2009. The existing bridge was built in 1938 and is 580 feet long and has a roadway width of 24 feet. This design calls for a structure that is approximately 1,562 feet long and 234 feet higher than the existing bridge and it would be built above the McCloud River Railroad tracks. With a new 40-foot-wide roadway, the bridge would have two 12-foot lanes and two 8-foot shoulders. In this design, the deck elevation increases from 2,766 feet to 3,000 feet.

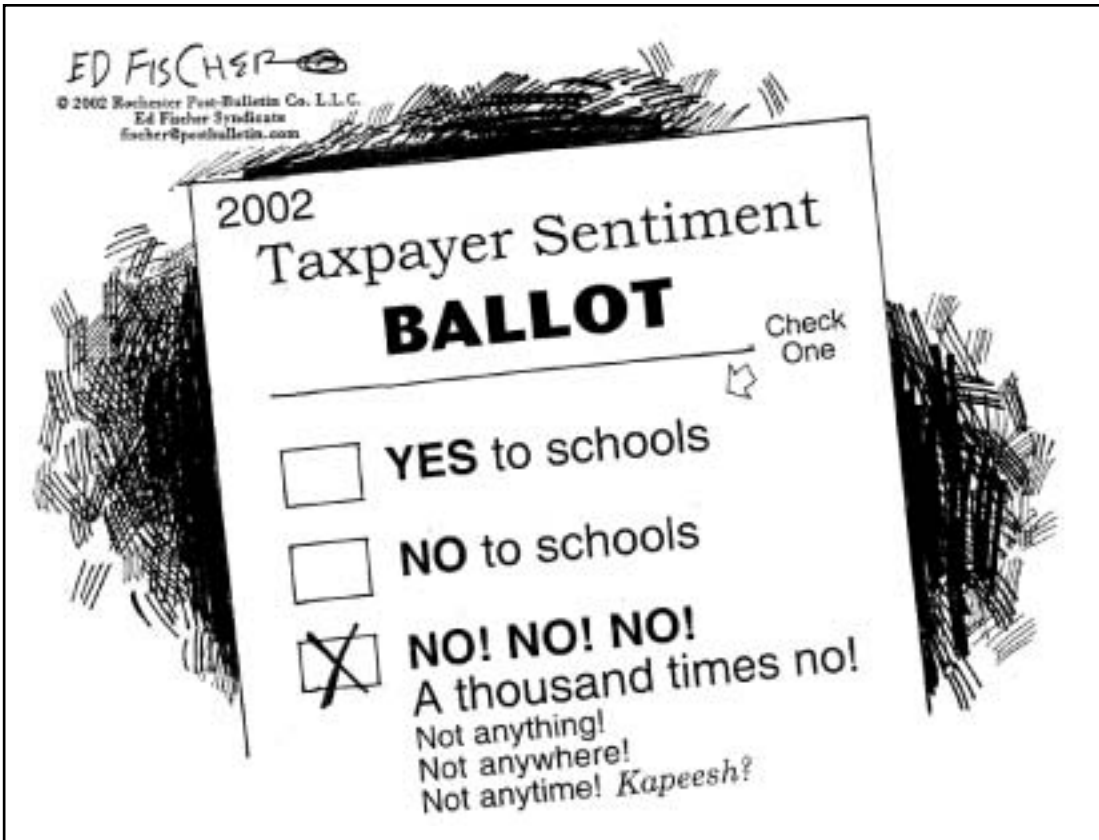
