## Alternatives to schools merger eyed by 50 parents, staff, students

About 50 parents, school staff, and even a few students met last week in Burney to find cost-saving alternatives for the school district.

"We want to capture the concerns of the community and forward them to the school board," said Vince Wall, a Burney parent who led the meeting with Jenny Arseneau.

With the exception of one or two people, the group agreed that they were against relocating any students to opposite ends of the district.

While high school consolidation now appears less likely to happen, it is still possible and the group wanted to give the board alternatives to consider.

Wall helped the group define their ideas, find volunteers to do research on suggestions, and write a goal statement for the school board.

In their goal statement, the com-

munity group stated that they want "to enhance the curriculum offered to the students of the district, while allowing students to primarily remain in their respective towns.

"We are committed to actively participating in the decision-making process, exploring alternative methods of instruction, while striving to

address and consider additional funding needs."

Trustees for the Fall River Joint Unified School District are having a workshop at 6 p.m. Thursday at Wild Bill's in McArthur to decide what long-term change to develop in the face of declining enrollment and dwindling dollars.

The public is invited to attend and listen, but not to participate.

The trustees will announce their decisions and take public comment at the Jan. 15 school board meeting at the District Office in Burney.

One of the three initial options the board was set to consider was

## Former bank teller facing theft charge

A 23-year-old Burney woman is facing charges of forgery and grand theft of \$4,600 from Tri Counties Bank in Burney.

The bank reported a possible theft Dec. 31 after a former employee, whose name has not been released, cashed an unauthorized amount of money from a bank till without the required supervision.

The suspect reportedly found another person's mail that contained a Visa credit card convenience check that she forged and cashed at the bank, according to Detective Anthony Bertain of the Shasta County Sheriff's Office in Burney.

Bertain said the suspect admitted that she made the check out to a bank customer, deposited \$20 into that client's account, and then cashed out \$4,580 for herself.

He said the bank, the check owner, and the bank customer whose name was forged on the check are each victims in this case.

The employee had been working at the bank for two months.

The case has been turned over to the District Attorney for review.

## Man in jail following arrest for alleged child molestation

A Little Valley man is in Shasta County Jail following his arrest on six charges of child molestation involving four Burney children.

Moshe Isaac Stern, 54, was arrested at his Lassen County residence on six counts of committing lewd and lascivious acts upon a child and one count of indecent exposure.

Moshe was living in Burney at the time the alleged crimes occurred, according to Det. Anthony Bertain of the Shasta County Sheriff's Office in Burney.

Bertain said they initiated the case June 30 when one of the victims came forward.

"Over a period of two weeks, more victims came forward," he said.

The female victims, ages 11, 8, 6, and 5 years old, are not related to each other, but are juveniles that Stern knew, Bertain said.

The Sheriff's Office is continuing an investigation into possible child pornography related to the seizure of Stern's computer hard drive.

## Mobile home destroyed in fire Sunday

These summertime visitors at Lake Britton could easily avoid the annoying parasites, which can develop into Swimmer's Itch — if only they went swimming in the winter.

## There are some who have an itch to swim at Lake Britton

Cool and refreshing, Lake Britton is one of the area's best places to swim in the summer.

But for some people it is also the itchiest.

Locals refer to the little red bumps that appear on their skin after a day at the lake as the "Lake Britton Crud," but, though not documented, it's most likely a common lake irritation called Swimmer's Itch.

State Park Ranger Andrew Urlic of McArthur-Burney Falls Memorial State Park had never heard of any such rash and said he's never received a complaint.

Shasta County Public Health Nurse Barbara Ingram was also not familiar with any ailments like Swimmer's Itch.

"We've had no calls," she said. "It's obviously something that hasn't been real prevalent."

But those who have come out of the lake scratching, all describe the same condition.

In the Hinton family of Burney, only her oldest daughter had any symptoms after swimming at the lake.

"Whenever she got out of the water, she would develop this rash at the edges of her swimming suit and it itched really bad," her mother, Tracie, said. "It would get worse later in the summer."

The family never sought a remedy. "We would just shower as soon as we got home and learned to live with it."

Susan Ayers of Burney said two of her children break out after swimming at Lake Britton. "We went to the doctor's and got a cream for the itching," she said. "And we always make sure to rinse off with clean water."

She hasn't found anything to make the bumps go away, though. "It lasts for about three or four days

and it's almost like it has to run its course."

A Burney teenager said she also noticed "little red dots that itch really bad" after a day at the lake. Her rash lasts for about a week and, like the Hintons, the bumps only appear at the edges of her swimsuit, "where it's still wet against my skin."

Burney teacher Marcy Schmidt first noticed her rash symptoms in high school, when she and her family spent their summers swimming and boating at the lake.

"We went out to Lake Britton quite a lot and finally started taking a solar camp shower so we could rinse off every time we'd been in the water."

She said her two nieces also have reactions whenever they swim at the lake.

"I also get a rash when I swim at the Pit Arm of Shasta Lake," she said.

Swimmer's Itch (cercarial dermatitis) is a rash caused by an allergic reaction to microscopic parasite from snails that swim in lakes, ponds and oceans, according to the Centers for Disease Control.

The parasite ordinarily infects birds such as ducks, geese, gulls and semi-aquatic mammals such as muskrats and beavers.

The parasitic eggs are passed in the feces of infected birds and mammals and, if the eggs land in the water, the water becomes contaminated, the CDC report states.

When these eggs hatch, free-swimming larvae are released and they head out in search of a certain species of aquatic snail.

The infected snails release a different type of larvae into the water (cercariae), and this then searches for a suitable host, like a bird or muskrat — or person.

Humans are not actually a suitable host and the larvae soon die

after burrowing into the skin of swimmers, the CDC said.

While the idea of a parasite burrowing under your skin may make you want a wetsuit, the resulting rash is quite common and is basically harmless.

Only about a third of those who come in contact with the parasite develop Swimmer's Itch, the CDC said.

The rash reportedly develops when human antibodies destroy the parasites, according to a health agency in British Columbia.

Small reddish pimples appear within one to two hours of exposure and the irritated spot reaches its maximum size within 24 hours. Itching may continue for several days and can last for up to a week or more.

Swimmer's Itch generally occurs only in the summer and is more prevalent in shallow water, which is why children are more often infected. They are also more likely to be running in and out of the water and not toweling dry.

"Floating parasites are sticky and attach to the body as the bather leaves the water and (they) enter the skin as the body air-dries," according to Dr. Joshua R. Meyerson, medical director of a health agency in Northwest Michigan, where lake swimmers are also itching.

"Whenever infested water is allowed to evaporate off the skin, the initial tingling sensation may be associated with the penetration of the parasite into the skin," he said.

Enjoy the water. Rinse off. Towel dry, vigorously. And don't scratch. If you're itching, try some recommended home relief such as corticosteroid cream, cool compresses, bathing with baking soda or making a baking soda paste, or Calamine lotion, he added.

### 2003 PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTION INFORMATION

**HOMEOWNER'S EXEMPTION**

If you have purchased a home in Shasta County as your principal place of residence between January 1, 2002 and January 1, 2003 and have not previously filed for the Homeowner Exemption, you should receive a card in the mail by February 1, 2003. Answer the questions asked on the card and return it to the Assessor no later than February 15, 2003.

If you qualify for the exemption and do not receive a card by February 1st, contact the Assessor's Office before February 15, 2003.

Those who have previously filed for the Homeowner Exemption and are still eligible for the exemption (no change in ownership or residency), **DO NOTHING**. The exemption will remain in effect until terminated by the property owner.

If you have changed your place of residence to another location or transferred ownership of the property to another party, **YOU ARE RESPONSIBLE TO NOTIFY THE ASSESSOR** in writing of these facts on or before **DECEMBER 10, 2003. FAILURE TO DO SO WILL RESULT IN THE ISSUANCE OF AN ESCAPED ASSESSMENT FOR THE AMOUNT OF TAXES THE EXEMPTION REPRESENTS, PLUS APPLICABLE PENALTIES AND INTEREST.**

**VETERANS & DISABLED VETERANS EXEMPTION**

Veterans who have not filed for exemption previously should contact the Assessor's Office before February 15, 2003 for information and documents needed for eligibility. See Assessor's *web site* for information.

**SENIOR CITIZENS, BLIND OR TOTALLY DISABLED PERSONS**

If you were 62 years of age or older or were blind or totally disabled (no age requirement) on December 31, 2002, and your total household income is \$37,119 or less, you may be eligible for additional state assistance on your 2002-3 property tax or rental assistance.

The filing period for the 2003 claim year begins July 1, 2003. If you have filed in previous years, you should receive a claim form from the Franchise Tax Board approximately July 5, 2003. Application must be filed within 3 years of transfer date. Contact the Assessor for further information and application forms.

**REPLACEMENT RESIDENCE EXCLUSION FROM REAPPRAISAL (Proposition 60)**

This law allows qualifying Shasta County residents 55 years of age or older, or any severely and permanently disabled person, to acquire a replacement dwelling and transfer the taxable value of their former home to the replacement. combining 9th through 12th grade students (475) at one site, most likely in McArthur.

One district option called for having one 7th-8th grade site (250 students) and two elementary schools (300 students) or two K-8 sites.

One option was to consolidate the four small sites in the district's Alternative Education program.

Supt. Eric Newton has also mentioned closing East Burney and selling or leasing the property, as part of the consolidation option.

While residents were digesting the mostly unpopular high school consolidation option made public Dec. 10, Newton and Trustee Nancy Fisk subsequently said it looked as though it might not be cost effective after all.

The two high schools receive about \$1.2 million each in Necessary Small High School Funding and if they are consolidated, the district stands to lose as much as \$700,000 or more.

Wall, who met with Newton for several hours before the community meeting, outlined some pros and cons of the district's three current options.

With more students at one site, there is more opportunity to expand curriculum, he said. "Fine arts — music, drama, art — would grow and could be maintained and enhanced."

A huge disadvantage, he said, is the busing issue.

The parents who gathered at the Burney High School library Dec. 30 did not want their children commuting over Pit One grade to McArthur each day - and vice versa - for safety reasons and for the time it takes.

Other negative considerations in consolidation are the decreased opportunities for playing sports.

"It's been proved that kids who are participate in sports do better in their life experiences," said Kelly Shuler, a McArthur parent.

William Rhodes of Burney said that many parents could not afford to drive their children back and forth to practices. "And then kids may start to do other things around here that we don't want them into," he said.

Consolidation also means a need for more classrooms, elongated lunch periods, more office space, and additional staffing, said Wall.

Wall outlined the disadvantages to the "stay put" option.

As teachers retire, often taking their areas of expertise with them, curriculum is expected to become more limited.

The district may not be able to find or afford a suitable multi-faceted replacement.

Also as faculty leave and are not replaced, class size grows.

The district's fine arts program is already limited and most likely would not improve.

"Can we live with that?" Wall asked the group. "How important is this to you?"

Ellen Sugg-Forbis, a teacher, parent, and president of the Fall River Education Association, said she favored moving the 7th and 8th grade students out of the high school. "I feel there should be a different curriculum for them," she said.

The high school curriculum is also limiting, as is the school's lack of college prep teachers, she said.

Forbis wanted any board decisions to be financially based, especially to maintain funding for salaries "so that we can attract teachers," she said.

Curriculum, too, is important, she said. "It's worth looking at changing what we have been doing."

Tara Jones, a parent and coach, said she looked into busing time and costs.

She understands why students living on ranches along

Highway 89 to Old Station preferred the McArthur site for its Ag programs, but questions traveling 21 extra miles to attend Fall River High School — at a cost of more than \$1.36 per mile.

Based on turning right or left at Four Corners, "It costs the district about \$5,100 a year to ship the kids to McArthur versus going five miles into Burney," Jones said.

Jones also suggested that the board consider community economics. If there were only one high school, parents and new home buyers would want to live in that town, she said.

Several parents said they moved to Burney to live and work close to their children's elementary and high schools.

"A draw for us has been having our school in a town small enough that we know the teachers and other parents," said Burney resident and parent Denise Rice.

The group had a variety of suggestions they wanted the board to consider before making a final decision and even agreed to help gather data for them:

- Synchronize the two high school schedules and share

teachers (ag, band, etc.) in morning/afternoon classes and/or have distance learning at both high schools at the same time.

- Instead of moving teachers between sites, the district could also transport a van of interested students to sites for added curriculum;

- Evaluate the benefits and costs of class offerings and electives (crafts, peer counseling) and "clean house;"

- Look again at reducing food service expense, which continues to operate at a loss of more than \$50,000 a year, such as building a more efficient and centrally located kitchen or contracting out for food service if less expensive;

- Consider the impacts and cost savings of closing the "red school." Relocate the District Office, relocate the continuing and community

education classrooms, and sell that land;

- Look for savings in administration, such as eliminating vice-principals;

- Talk to other small districts to see how they handle the same issues of declining enrollment and loss of funding;

- Carefully consider the need before making large expenditures, such as last year's purchases of costly unused fencing and lawn tractors;

- Evaluate need to attend conferences;

- Consider lowering the number of credits needed to graduate since this district requires more than is state mandated and thus reduce some of the non-core electives;


- Lower the temperature at sites to 69 degrees;

- Consider playing team sports with Redding and Mt. Shasta schools to cut transportation costs to Alturas, Lakeview, Ore., Etna, and Weed;

- Ask parents to pick up more of the expenses if their children play sports;

- Look at potential cost benefits to having two separate school districts and a superintendent/principal, in spite of fact that the state reportedly does not encourage that.

# Snowmobilers reminded Lassen roads closed

Now that winter is here, snowmobilers are reminded that Lassen Volcanic National Park, and all wilderness and proposed wilderness areas are closed to motor vehicle use.

"We continue to have snowmobile trespass in these areas, which will end up hurting our entire program," said Forest Supervisor Edward Cole. "In 2000, two snowmobilers entered the Caribou Wilderness, east of Lassen Volcanic National Park.

The offenders were cited and fined \$150 each.

These individuals were from the Almanor area and were fully aware of restricted motorized access in our wilderness.

The Eastern District Court has now raised the minimum fine to \$500," noted Cole.

Repeat offenders or particularly egregious trespass can result in fines up to \$5,000 or six months in jail, so we take illegal motorized access very seriously," Cole said.

There is continued concern expressed by the State Off-highway Vehicle Commissioners about motorized intrusions within closed areas and national parks.

Most violators are not apprehended, but their tracks

are visible evidence of trespassing.

The Commissioners review and approve State grant funds, which allow the Lassen National Forest to maintain the largest groomed snowmobile trail system in California.

"They are becoming more critical of closed area intrusions, which may jeopardize our funding levels in the future," commented Cole. "We don't want that to happen."

The Lassen National Forest has six snowmobile staging areas and over 477 miles of groomed trails. In addition, there are several open areas on the forest where cross-country travel by snowmobile is available.

A map of the forest's snowmobile system and staging areas can be obtained from any Lassen National Forest administrative office located in Susanville, Chester, and Fall River Mills.

The Forest Service posts all wilderness boundaries, and the National Park marks their boundaries.

Continued law enforcement patrols by both agencies will occur to ensure signs are not destroyed or removed.

While on the trail, snowmobilers are urged to abide by the following "Tread Lightly" principles:

\*Ride only on designated snowmobile trails or in areas where snowmobiling is permitted.

\*Respect wildlife and their habitat. Enjoy viewing wildlife from a distance to avoid disturbance.

Excessive noise bothers people and wildlife. Snowmobile exhaust and noise is the single most important issue causing visitor conflict.

\*Respect skiers, snowshoers, and people enjoying a day of tubing or sledding.

\*Ride only when there are more than 12 inches of snow to avoid soil impacts and damage to plants.

"We have started grooming our snowmobile trails on the Eagle Lake Ranger District, and will be grooming soon on our Almanor and Hat Creek Ranger Districts to get ready for the holidays," said Cole.

"The snow is great, the scenery is spectacular, and we invite you to enjoy the Lassen National Forest this winter."

The Lassen National Forest offices will be closed Wednesday, Dec. 25 in observance of the Christmas Holiday.

National Forest offices will also be closed on Wednesday, Jan. 1, in observance of the New Year federal holiday.

The Forest has two designated four-wheel drive areas at the High Lakes and Front Country areas on the Almanor Ranger District. Summer O&M applications will be discussed as well as a Resource Management application to maintain OHV trails in the High Lakes area.

# McConnell Foundation gives \$9,000 grant for Child Safety Seat Project

Shasta County Public Health has received a \$9,000 grant from the McConnell Foundation Fund for a Child Safety Seat Project.

The one-year grant will be used to support the Occupant Safety Program, a collaborative effort to promote child passenger safety in Shasta County.

The Child Safety Seat Project will use the grant funds to purchase child safety seats and distribute them to low-income families in Shasta County.

Public Health, in collaboration with the Injury Prevention Coalition of Shasta County, will distribute the seats through child safety

seat classes, check-ups and fitting stations.

To receive a seat, a parent must attend a child safety seat class where they will receive education on correctly installing their new seat, so they are able to properly secure their child.

Lack of restraint or improper restraint is the most significant factor in motor vehicle injuries among children under the age of 5.

Of all the children in this age group who were killed or injured while riding in a car in Shasta County from 1999-2001, only 74 percent were restrained in a child safety seat.

One reason for the low

usage rates may be due to the high cost of these seats. “It is critical that parents have access to affordable child safety seats and know how to use them properly,” says Jeff Mushkin, Community Education Specialist for Shasta County Public Health.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration’s (NHTSA) research found that child safety seats, when used correctly can prevent injuries and save lives.

# School restructuring proposal workshop

On Monday, December 30, approximately fifty people from the communities of Burney and Fall River Valley met in a workshop atmosphere to discuss the proposed school restructuring plan being developed by the Fall River Joint Unified School District.

Those in attendance included parents, students, employees and teachers. The group reviewed the three options being considered and drafted some specific questions, concerns and suggestions relating to the proposal.

The meeting lasted for two-hours with a commitment by all present to remain informed on the issue while actively participating in an attempt to provide some solutions to the problem of declining budgets and a possible reduction in curriculum. The theme “We want what is best for the students” prevailed throughout the evening.

After a review of the three options, a show of hands was requested to determine the mood of the group. The overwhelming majority of those present were decidedly in favor of Option C.

With some additional discussion it was obvious that even with the disadvantages of Options A & B many on hand desired to maintain, if not expand, the curriculum being offered within the district. Specifically, the group identified the following concerns with Options A/B:

- Serious concern about bussing students over Pit 1 Grade and students driving over the grade late at night and during poor weather.
- Class sizes too large.
- A much different school experience and environment for the students/parents.
- A negative effect on school sports programs for

Some in the group felt that if removing the 7/8th grades from the high school would result in an appreciable increase in the curriculum offered they would/could consider it in more depth. Again, the loss of curriculum and the relocating of the students defined the discussion.

In an effort to articulate why the group came together, and what we hope to accomplish, the following Goals Statement was drafted and unanimously endorsed by those present:

This group wants to enhance the curriculum offered to the students of the district while allowing the students to primarily remain in their respective towns. We are committed to actively participating in the decision making process, exploring alternate methods of instruction, while striving to address and consider additional funding needs required in supporting this goal.

In order to accomplish this, the following objectives were outlined. They are broken into Short-Term (Items that can be addressed prior to 1/9/03) and Long-Term (Items that can be addressed after 1/9/03).

Short-term issues to be discussed/explored:

- An in-depth determination of what administrative and operating costs can be shaved from the district budget including: reduction of administrative staff, closure of district offices, etc.
- Explore coordinating the schedules of both High Schools to allow for the either the transportation of instructors (versus students) from one campus to the other, and/or an increase in the use of Distance Learning classes.
- Explore the same coordination of schedules and transport a smaller number of students to one school, or the other, for certain curriculum (magnet school concept).
- Identify and explore instructor sharing utilizing these or other methods.
- Implement and enforce a utility conservation program.

Long-term issues to be discussed/explored:

- Determine if graduation credits should be lowered from 260 to state required amount.
- Explore private contracting of some services (janitorial, food prep, etc.).
- Permanent reduction in staff positions, or non-credentialed positions.
- Determine if Jr. High School students need to be on a rotating schedule in order to free up staff for other classes.
- Recruit community help for specialized instruction, increase volunteerism.
- Seek additional grants, especially for Distance Learning materials/hardware.
- In addition, the group identified the following activities to be performed b some of those present:
- Research other districts who have struggled through this situation.
- Explore splitting the district.
- Determine impact on local communities.
- Write letters to School Board, District Superintendent, County School Superintendent, County Supervisor, media.
- Address community groups; Rotary, Lions, Kiwanis, Boosters, etc.
- Engage Student Council, Leadership Class, students, P.T.A., F.R.E.A., C.S.E.A., Site F.R.E.A., Community Day Care providers, Chamber of Commerce, local Realtors.

# Mini Grants of \$15,000 awarded to 20 community groups for healthy projects

IMAGE and the Partnership for the Public's Health have awarded more than \$15,000 in community grants for health-related projects.

The grants were awarded to groups who wanted to carry out projects that increase the public's health in one or more of three specific areas: 1) increasing physical activity; 2) improving nutrition; or 3) promoting smoking cessation or prevention.

Each grant applicant had to describe a project that was free and available to the public. They could apply for grants up to \$1,000.

### CONCRETE INSTEAD OF DIRT FOR COMMUNITY BASKETBALL

Roaring Creek Rancheria in Montgomery Creek plans to use its \$1,000 grant to install a concrete slab for a community basketball court.

"Quite a few young people from Big Bend, Burney, Fall River, and Redding come to play on weekends and in the summer," said Corina Lego, who wrote the request.

"They come looking for a good game and great fun in a non-alcoholic, drug-free environment."

They came even though their games were played on an uneven, dusty or muddy dirt and gravel surface.

"The dream of everyone who has played basketball at Roaring Creek is to have a good playing surface," said Lego.

About five adults and 10 children have already committed to building the slab.

### LOCAL 4-H CLUBS FUNDED TO MAKE A HEALTHY MOVIE

Another \$1,000 grant was awarded to the 4-H Clubs of the Intermountain Area to produce a promotional film for the "Eat Right, Grow Right" program.

The film is being made with the University of California Extension Program to teach "sound health and nutritional information," according to Lani Martin, who wrote the grant proposal.

Martin lives in Fall River Mills and is a registered dietitian.

She said the purpose of the program is to educate children and indirectly involve their parents in several effective 4-H projects, such as cooking, nutrition, vegetable gardening, sanitation, health and fitness.

She hopes to interest more children in 4-H and also fight childhood obesity.

A group of Fall River sixth graders have already written a script for the film, which will include award-winning 4-H demonstrations.

### GRASSY PLAYGROUND, GARDEN ADDITION FOR PRESCHOOLERS

Renee Angel of Burney wrote a grant for the Home Away From Home Children's Program in Burney and was awarded \$1,000 to expand the existing playground at the Intermountain Community Center.

"We want to include a 1,750-foot grassy area, with a sprinkler system, and plan to include raised gardening beds where the children can learn the value of good nutrition by growing, preparing, and eating fruits and vegetables," Angel said.

She said they have already raised half of the \$2,092 total cost through wood permit sales.

### MOTHERS, SENIORS STAY IN SHAPE WITH FITNESS GRANT FUNDS

Michelle Dakan of the Family Wellness Program at Pit River Health Services received her grant request of \$945 for "Ship Shape Curves."

Dakan said their current budget has allowed them to enroll 21 mothers and child caregivers in the Curves fitness program in Burney and Fall River Mills and she requested funding to expand and continue.

IMAGE awarded a \$1,000

grant to Mary Rainwater to continue and also upgrade her exercise program for the parents of children attending the McArthur Head Start Preschool.

Rainwater gives aerobics classes at no cost but wants to buy aerobics steps, mats and weights.

"Currently the parents are using wooden blocks for their steps and cans of soup for their weights," she said.

IMAGE also funded the Up Country Seniors, a group of about 50 people from throughout the Intermountain area who over age 50.

Their grant, written by Thomas Smith, provides \$1,000 to buy exercise equipment and videos and also a copy machine to produce exercise booklets to be distributed to all of the area's seniors.

### DANCE GROUP OUTFITTED WITH FUNDS FOR MATERIALS

The Roaring Creek Dancers, a local group of young Native American children, received their \$500 grant request to purchase materials to design and sew new and better fitting powwow outfits.

Some of the materials needed are beads and grant writer Corina Lego noted that one large beaded belt can take 100 hours to complete.

Ramona Rubalcava, one of the group's head dancers, is currently serving in the U.S. Navy and has performed in Korea and Japan.

### TENNIS ANYONE?

Burney High School teacher Joy Ford received \$60 to purchase low-bounce tennis balls for a proposed indoor tennis unit during the winter.

The school has received donated tennis racquets and has adjustable nets.

Ford said she hopes tennis will become part of the school's PE curriculum and, if there is enough interest, she would organize a tennis club.

"All we are lacking is the tennis balls," she said.

### GRANTS FOR FORT, PLAYGROUND, GYM CLASSES, SMOKE DETECTORS AND SWIM LESSONS ALSO FUNDED

Berry also received \$175 to purchase equipment to help track the activity and fitness levels of PE students at the school.

\$1,000, written by Jeanne Utterback, to buy more equipment and expand the "Get Fit-Stay Fit" program at Fall River Elementary School.

\$935, written by Burney Elementary Principal Dianah Fischer, to pay for substitute teachers to lead longer and more active PE sessions

for about 121 1st and 2nd grade students in winter;

\$800, by Denise Spooner, to purchase bikes and helmets and also lumber to build a fort and expand Acorn After School Activities;

\$686, written by Kathleen Klein, for "Getting to Know Your Heart" workshops for elementary and pre-school children;

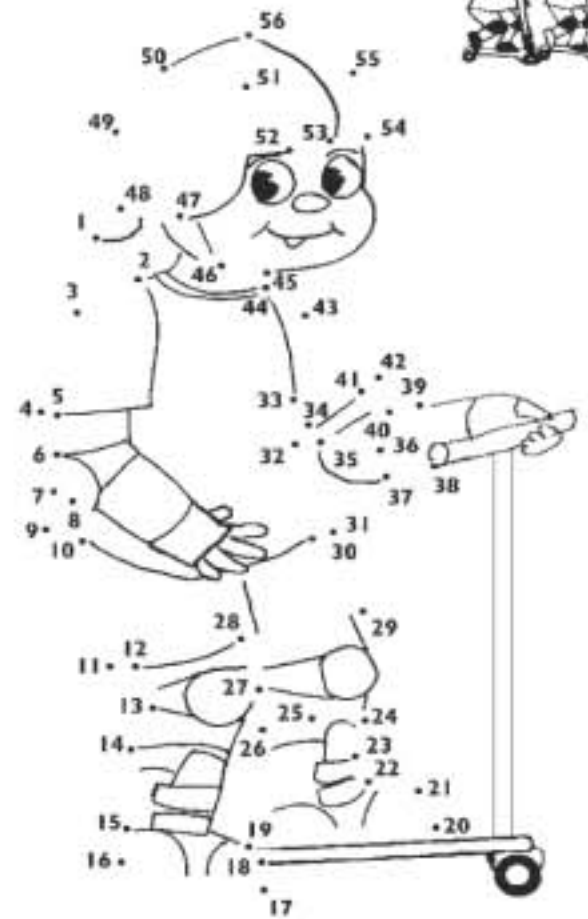

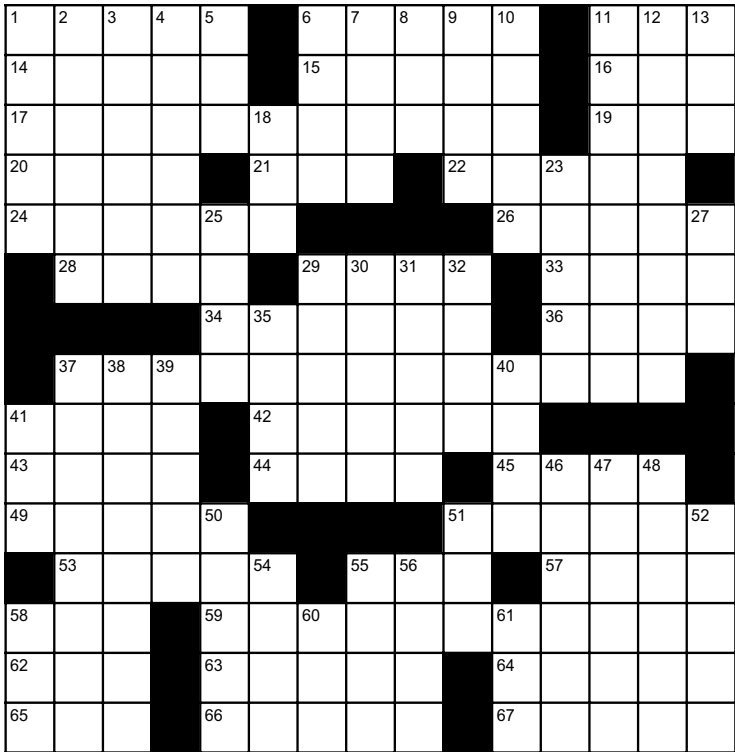

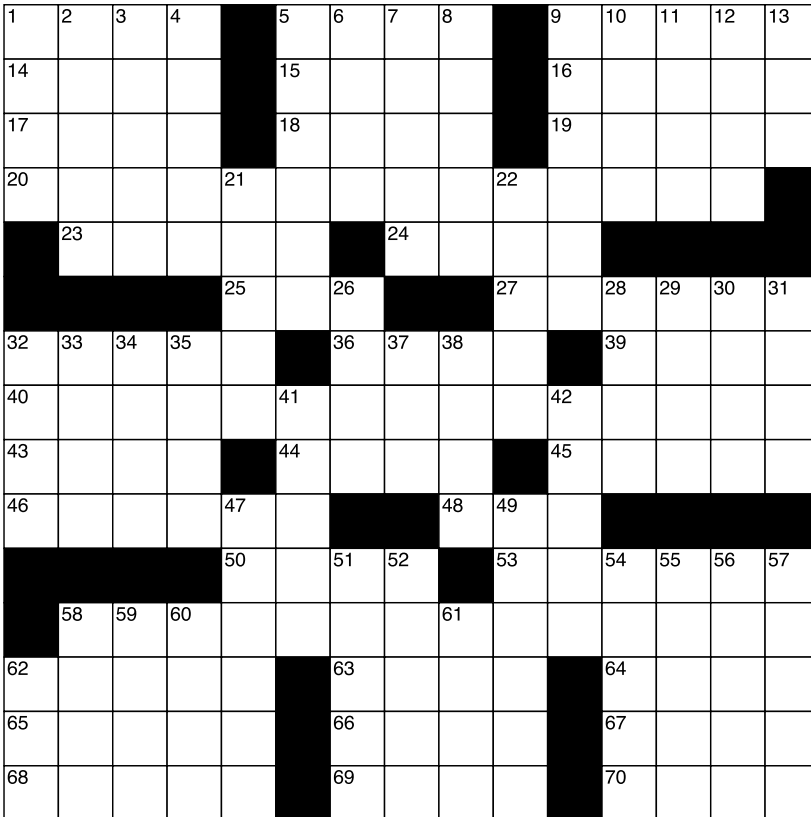

**Cabin Project**  
**Proposed Action/Purpose and Need**  
Hat Creek Ranger District, Lassen National Forest  
Shasta County, California  
January 2, 2003

The Hat Creek Ranger District of the Lassen National Forest is proposing the Cabin Project. The project area is located in the Red Management Area and extends from Highway 44 in the north to Digger Creek in the south and from the western boundary of Lassen Volcanic National Park (LVNP) westward to the Forest boundary. The analysis area is approximately 18,088 acres in size. National Forest System Lands comprise approximately 16,091 acres with the rest in private ownership. Vegetative cover is primarily pine mixed conifer with a high component of white fir, interspersed with red fir, pine plantations, brushfields, riparian areas, and meadows. The topography of the area is dominated by adjacent Lassen Peak (10,457 feet). Principal features include Deep Hole (a collapsed pit crater), and the proposed Heart Lake Wilderness. Elevations range between 4,800 and 8,200 feet above sea level.

This proposed project is designed to implement the resource management activities defined in the Herger-Feinstein Quincy Library Group Forest Recovery Act (HFQLG Act), including construction of defensible fuel profile zones, individual tree selection harvests and riparian restoration projects. The proposed action is also designed to develop the Urban Wildland Threat Zones adjacent to residences as defined in the Sierra Nevada Forest Plan (SNFP) Amendment. In addition, the proposed action implements the components of the long-term strategy for anadromous fish-producing watersheds as contained in the SNFP Amendment, including riparian and aquatic restoration and protection measures.

**PROPOSED ACTION**

1. Develop a Defensible Fuel Profile Zone (DFPZ) along Forest Service Road (FS Road) 17 from Highway 44 south to Digger Creek. This DFPZ segment is approximately 5,116 acres.

Develop the Urban Wildland Threat Zones within 1 \_ miles of the residences at Brokeoff Meadows, the residences east of Bailey Creek Meadows, and the administrative site at Manzanita Lake as defined in the Sierra Nevada Forest Plan (SNFP) Amendment.

The following silvicultural and fuels treatment would be completed within DFPZs and Urban Wildland Threat Zones:

- a. Forest Stands: Thin up to 1,544 acres followed by machine piling and/or underburning.

Thinning from below would primarily consist of removing suppressed and intermediate trees (smaller diameter tree classes). Machine piling would be completed where existing heavy fuels and/or brush cover preclude underburning. Underburning would be completed after machine piling and in areas where existing heavy fuels and/or brush cover are at low levels to allow for the safe use of prescribed fire. Hand thinning and piling would be completed as needed.
- b. Forest Stands: Underburn up to 426 acres (previously thinned stands) where existing heavy fuels and/or brush cover are at low levels to allow for the safe use of prescribed fire.
- c. Plantations: Thin up to 682 acres followed by underburning in plantations where brush was previously masticated.
- d. Plantations: Thin/masticate up to 373 acres in young plantations (chip small trees and brush).
- e. Brush Aggregations: Broadcast burn and machine pile up to 122 acres in brushfields.
- f. Plantations/Brush Aggregations: Handpile and burn and/or masticate/machine pile up to 140 acres of brush and small trees within a 50-300 foot variable width strip adjacent to the 17 Road (both sides) in sections 13, 14, and 23 (T. 31 N., R. 3 E.).

The location of the 17 Road DFPZ segment was first identified in the Technical Fuels Report (Lassen, Plumas, Tahoe National Forests, July 1995) and then the HFQLG Act as described in the HFQLG FEIS and ROD (Lassen, Plumas, Tahoe National Forests, August 1999). The rationale for determining the boundaries of this DFPZ segment and proposed treatments included proximity to private lands, existing vegetation and fuels conditions, accessibility, operability, and slope constraints. Underburning may occur outside of the DFPZ boundary when needed to take advantage of skid trails, roads and natural barriers to minimize ground disturbance and costs associated with fireline construction.

2. Implement a riparian and watershed improvement strategy that contributes to the maintenance and restoration of aquatic and riparian ecosystem health. Emphasis is on restoring native riparian vegetation and reducing sources of sediment associated with dispersed recreation and roads.
  - a. Aspen Release: Restore and improve declining remnant aspen stands in riparian areas (approximately 16 acres) by removing encroaching conifers.
  - b. Dispersed Recreation: Reduce recreation/off-road vehicle impacts at Brokeoff Meadows. Install boulder and log barriers to prevent vehicles from adversely affecting meadow environments. Construct two vault toilet facilities to improve sanitation. Modify vehicle access and designate dispersed campsites via installation of fire rings and signage in the Brokeoff Meadows area away from riparian vegetation. Modify vehicle access to four other dispersed campsites that are located in near stream areas along the North and South Forks of Bailey Creek.
  - c. Roads: Improve riparian and watershed conditions by reducing potential non-point sources of stream sediment associated with roads and landings located in close proximity to stream channels (see proposed Transportation System Improvement Strategy below).
3. Provide for the minimum forest transportation system that best serves current and anticipated management objectives and public uses. Improve the existing transportation system to 1) facilitate proposed fuels treatments and riparian restoration projects, 2) decommission roads not needed for access to reduce maintenance costs, and 3) decrease potential for negative watershed and riparian effects by reducing sources of sediment associated with roads (reference attached map).

- a. Construct roads to improve access for proposed fuels reduction projects and removal of associated saw log and biomass volume. Create new access roads outside of RHCAs and near stream areas. Reconstruct FS Road 31N04 to facilitate removal of conifers in aspen units A8, A9, and A10. Minimal road improvements would include a temporary stream crossing (temporary bridge over the small perennial stream that enters the S.F. Bailey Creek) and application of gravel on the road surface where needed. The temporary bridge would span the stream to avoid altering the channel cross-section and allow for fish passage. A one-time only road use permit may be issued to the adjacent property owners association to remove approximately 70 loads of timber from their lands after the road is reconstructed. When all harvest operations are completed, the bridge would be removed and the road would be permanently decommissioned.
- b. Utilize new construction along with road decommissioning to develop a more efficient transportation system. Unclassified roads would be converted to system roads where needed for fire suppression, recreation, or management access. Unclassified roads not needed for access would be decommissioned.
- c. Road maintenance would include repair of road/stream crossings, insloped roads, and culvert inlets to reduce water diversion potential and allow passage of bedload and debris to improve hillslope hydrology and riparian habitat. Decommission roads within RHCAs and near stream areas. Temporary roads would be decommissioned after use.

The projects listed here would be implemented within the next 5 years.

**PURPOSE AND NEED**

1. Provide areas from which wildfires could be more safely fought. Decrease the intensity of potential wildfires and the likelihood of a surface fire developing into a damaging crown fire. Develop a desired forest structure where periodic low-intensity surface fires can be safely reintroduced.
2. Restore riparian vegetation, and reduce on-going adverse effects to streams and their riparian areas.
3. Determine and provide for the minimum forest transportation system that best serves the current and anticipated management objectives and public uses. Provide for safe public access and travel. Allow for economical and efficient management. Minimize and begin to reverse adverse ecological impacts from roads.

**DECISION TO BE MADE**

The decision to be made is whether to implement this project as proposed, as modified to address any unresolved conflicts, or not at all.

The decision would also determine whether or not to allow a non-significant Forest Plan amendment for a site specific, deviation from the Riparian/Fish prescription standards and guidelines for limited use of designated skid trails within the RHCA, to facilitate removal of conifers in aspen release units (16 acres).

This proposed project would be consistent with the Lassen National Forest Land and Resource Management Plan (LRMP) as amended by the HFQLG Act and ROD and the SNFP Amendment ROD.
