Patients award Mayers top honors

Patients gave Mayers Memorial Hospital a three-star "above average" rating in a second statewide survey.

Nearly 35,000 people who had spent at least one night in a participating hospital responded to a

three (above average), two (average), or one (below average) star rating in each dimension of care for each service. Hospitals could also receive no stars.

Mayers received three stars in the categories of Coordination of Care, Information and Education, and Friends, Emotional Support, Respect for Patient Preferences and Would You Recommend the Hospital.

Statewide, 25 percent of hospitals received an above average rating for their overall performance, according to CHCF.

After a tough year with too many financial uncertainties, Mayers Memorial Hospital closed their books for the month of June and for the year 2003 on a positive note.

"I'm happy with this year's financial performance," said Mayers CEO Jerry Fikes at the board meeting in Burney.

"We did a good job of controlling our costs and this reflects on the hard work of our staff."

The hospital's Actual Net Income of \$18,616 was \$6,000 more than anticipated for the year's end and the hospital has lowered its line of credit by \$71,000 since May.

The positive result came even though operating expenses were off by about \$300,000, primarily because purchased services were over budget. Patient revenues were also less than budgeted.

But the directors are still on the edge of their seats waiting to see what cuts Gov. Davis may have in store for hospitals when the state budget is approved.

The biggest fear is whether Medi-Cal reimbursement rates will be cut and by how much - figures range from 5 to 20 percent.

"We just need to buckle up until we get definition and we'll be doing what we can do to horde cash."

Fikes said they would "string ut" the hospital's \$66,000 monthly bond payments until the budget is finalized. Director Gail McClung asked if the proposed recall of Gov. Davis and the delay in passing the state budget "are so intertwined that this could drag on and on." Fikes said he's heard talk of two possibilities. "Some thought it was more likely (Davis) would cave and make concessions to get the budget passed and/or he would tie it up with lawsuits and make it the summer of hell for all by casting aspersions about the veracity of the signature process." All he knows for certain is that "I read the paper every day and the budget hasn't passed." Another funding ax did not fall on Mayers as expected. Medi-Cal funding ran out in June and the state said it would not pay for the last 10 days of the month. For Mayers this meant not receiving about \$148,000 to cover payroll. 'We avoided this piece of terrible news and we will receive the money," he said. In other financial business, Fikes reported that Measure A cost \$16,886. The proposed property tax was turned down by voters, even though a majority, 51 percent voted yes.



Three stars were the most a hospital could receive.

"Our performance was excellent," said Mayers CEO Jerry Fikes. "We had an excellent rating among our small hospital peers and among our large hospital competitor in Redding.

Mercy Medical Center in Redding, the only other hospital in Shasta County that participated, received a two-star "average" rating.

Mercy Medical Mt. Shasta in Siskiyou County also received a three-star rating.

Statewide, only 181 hospitals volunteered to participate.

"Hospitals that volunteered are leaders in publicly reporting performance," according to Dr. Mark D. Smith, president and CEO of the California HealthCare Foundation, one of the sponsors for the project.

"They are willing to take a critical look at themselves and are ahead of the rest of the country in using consumer feedback to measure and improve the quality of hospital care," Smith said.

Over the next two years, the federal government is planning to launch a nationwide patient experience.

The PEP-C II survey asked patients to evaluate their experiences and care.

Questions included:

Were you treated with respect, dignity and as a partner in the health care process?

How well did hospital staff address your fears and anxieties?

Did hospital staff explain test results and treatment options clearly and completely?

Did doctors and nurses explain what to expect after you left the hospital?

Based on patients' evaluations of seven dimensions of care in medical, surgical, and maternity services, participating hospitals were individually compared with California state averages.

Each hospital received either a

In other business, the directors discussed how Mayers would keep up with the latest medical technology and high tech digital radiology equipment.

The \$8,000 monthly lease for the CT scanner is up in nine months; the contract for the MRI ends in August.

The solutions are tied up with funding issues and the state's demand that hospitals meet new earthquake standards.

Mayers plans to build a new facility with grant funding through the Rural Health Design Consortium, said Board President Les Cufaude, who is on the RHDC steering committee.





wearing their helmets

Too few children in Shasta children. County wear a helmet when they ride a bicycle, increasing their risk for serious head and brain injury, or even death. Only 11 percent wear a helmet when skateboarding, roller/in-line skating, or riding a non-motorized scooter, according to a study released today by the Injury Prevention Coalition of Shasta County.

"Only 25 percent of Shasta County children observed riding bicycles wore a helmet correctly," said Amy Pendergast, Bicycle Safety Coordinator at Shasta County Public Health and a member of the Coalition. "The good news is that this is up from 20 percent last year."

Pendergast noted that of those wearing a helmet incorrectly, the most common mistakes were incorrect positioning (bicycle helmets should cover the forehead) and straps being too loose or unbuckled. Alarmingly, 8 percent of bicvclists had a helmet with them but did not wear it. The Childhood Helmet Observational Survey also found that 64% of children observed were not wearing a helmet while riding a bicycle; and 89% were not wearing a helmet while skateboarding, roller/in-line skating or using a scooter. Helmets reduce the risk of head and brain injury, the most serious and deadly of bicycle-related injuries, by about 88 percent. California's Bicycle Helmet Law (Vehicle Code 21212) requires persons under 18 to wear a bicycle helmet while riding a bicycle (including passengers and children in trailers). In January 2003 this law was expanded to include youth riding skateboards, roller/in-line skates, and nonmotorized scooters. Bicyclists of all ages are encouraged to wear a helmet every time they ride, both to protect themselves from injury and to be role models for local



The Bird With the Pink Plumage Fantastic Flamingos

Flamingos are fun to watch. Their bright pink color and long legs make them stand out in the bird world. Their name comes from the Latin word for flame.

They are such popular birds that people put flamingo decorations in their yards.

There are about six types, or species, of flamingos.

The species are different shades of pink and their feathers form different color patterns. One species' legs are yellow; other species have reddish legs

Their height can range from about 21/2 to 4 feet tall. They often stand on only one leg when they are resting.

Flamingos have webbed feet and feathers that shed water, as do many other water birds. Their closest cousins are ducks, geese and swans.



Chicks, as in the front of this picture, have gray or white feathers until they are 1 to 2 years old.



mating season, hundreds of thousands of flamingos may gather at their breeding grounds. The huge numbers help keep predators from their eggs. Flamingos often split into small groups in the winter.

When it is

Color them pink

Flamingo feathers do not start out being pink or red. They turn rosy only when the flamingos eat certain foods.

If they don't eat a diet with enough of a special substance. called a carotenoid (kuh-ROT-n-oyd), their feathers will be white. The substance that turns flamingo feathers pink is

that turns carrots orange or beets red. But it isn't just in red-colored foods. It can even be in green plants such as grass.

When people first brought flamingos to zoos, they were disappointed when the pretty pink colors were not present when the birds molted, or shed their old feathers and grew new ones. They didn't realize flamingos needed to eat certain foods to stay pink.

This substance can also color other animals, including humans. Some people have eaten so many carrots their skin turned orange!

Flamingo food

Some of the food flamingos eat in the wild include:

 insects
 small shellfish small fish • algae, a tiny green water plant . plankton, or tiny microscopic animals and plants, floating in the water.

More About Flamingos

Flamingos feeding

Flamingo bills are specially formed to filter out the tiny plants and animals they eat. Flamingos take a big gulp of water and push it out through grooves, or slots, in their bills. The food is trapped in the grooves,

Flamingos stand in the mud and



rock from foot to foot. This stirs up the mud so their food comes to the top, while stones and other matter fall to the bottom. Sometimes

they turn their

heads upside down to scoop up food from the water. They might also find food on the surface. Or they might feed like ducks sometimes do, and turn their whole bodies upside down in the water.

They can drink salt water, getting rid of the salt through their nostrils.

Where flamingos live

Flamingos can live in many types of water: in shallow lakes and lagoons, marshes, fresh water or salt water.

Although they often live in tropical areas, some can survive in deep cold, as long as the water doesn't freeze and prevent them from getting food.

One rare type lives in the high Andes Mountains in South America. The lake water there is so salty it doesn't freeze, even though the temperature falls below 32 degrees, when water usually turns to ice.

Flamingos may fly from one habitat to another. They can fly hundreds of miles in one night.




Flamingos live in the wild in South America, Africa, the Caribbean islands and parts of Asia. In North America, people can see flamingos in zoos and animal parks.

Dangers to flamingos

Predators that eat flamingos or their eggs include vultures, storks, eagles, leopards, cheetahs and ocelots.

But their worst enemies are humans. People collect hundreds of flamingo eggs to eat and sell. Sometimes they collect all the eggs from one group, and then those flamingos don't reproduce. Pollution can also



destroy flamingo habitat. Agricultural chemicals and raw sewage get in the water and destroy their habitat.

Often humans divert needed water for other purposes and destroy flamingos' habitat.

In the Andes, where the flamingos are already rare, gold mining operations destroy the habitats.

Sometimes so many tourists want to see flamingos that they disturb their living space.


Fortunately, no flamingo species is listed as endangered.

Environmentalists are trying to work with people in

flamingo areas to keep these beautiful birds safe.




