Business briefs New name for power plant

North American Energy Services Company in Issaquah, Wash., a provider of services to the power generation industry, closed an agreement with Conectiv June 20 for the acquisition of their subsidiary, Conectiv Operating Services Company (COSC).

Based in Carneys Point, N.J.

COSC provides operations and maintenance services to the USbased power generation industry and has operated the Burney plant since its construction in 1989.

In 1998, Delmarva Power & Light and Atlantic Energy merged under a common holding company named Conectiv.

Under the recent acquisition,

Conectiv has been renamed as Centric Operating Services Company.

Centric is also operating again and went back on line about three weeks ago, according to Milt Shultz, general manager for Burney Forest Power. (Plant Manager Don Binger was not available for comment.) —Please See Page 6

New storage OK'd for volatile ash

Burney Forest Power is building an ash containment facility to prevent fire, such as the one pictured in their ash pile June 9, and to stop the wind from kicking up the particles, according to General Manager Milt Schultz. The Shasta County Planning Department approved the revised use permit Aug. 14 for storing the ash on land leased from Fruit Growers Supply Co. The DPW said the University of California, Davis, did a study and found that the wood ash had beneficial uses for agriculture and it is stored at the site for that purpose. BFP's cogeneration plant, Centric Operating Services (formerly Conectiv), produces about 40 tons of ash a day, creating a large and very hot pile that was previously watered down by sprinklers. When the ash was dry and caught in a northeast wind off Hatchet Mountain, it created dust in nearby houses. The storage facility can hold a two-month supply of ash that can be spread out and drained into a lined sediment pond rather than piled into a tall, volatile mound.

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


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



meeting, craft classes, fashion show, drumming, potluck meal, hatchet throwing, bow and arrow shoot, a buffalo tour, Sunday church service, among others.

among others. Traditionally the festival is held where green corn ripened and served many purposes including its association with agriculture growth and fertility.

People ritually prepared to eat the new corn, a new sacred fire was kindled, transgressions committed during the previous year were forgiven and everything was purified and renewed for the year.

Early accounts indicate the Green Corn celebration was held from four to eight days in the town square.

Today it is conducted on the "square ground" or ceremonial center of a tribal community.

Other tribes celebrating a Green Corn festival throughout the U.S. include Cherokee, Creek, Siminole, Yuchi and other southwestern Native Americans.

Plans for expanding F.R. airport moving ahead with land buys

When Centric came off line Feb. 15 for a scheduled inspection, the company found that the windings in the generator were wearing and shut down for repairs.

The repairs by a New Mexico-based industrial service were faulty and were completed by another service.

Plans for expanding the Fall River Mills Airport continue to move forward and on Aug. 12 the Shasta County Department of Public Works presented four right-of-way contracts to the board of supervisors for approval.

The county acquired grant deeds totaling 4.5 acres for \$15,000 from the Northern California Conference Association of the Seventh-day Adventist Church (\$5,200), the Clifford R. and Marcellaine I. Thornhill Trust (\$4,300), James Michael and Eva Lizbeth Poet (\$2,700), and Leonard L. Grove and Cynthia M. Byrne (\$3,000).

DPW Senior Planner Thomas Hays said they are still negotiating to acquire another 20-plus rights-of-way from landowners, including PG&E.

Plans are to extend the 3,300-foot-long existing runway to 5,000 feet, to the south, and to relocate all of the hangars, to the west of their current location. They may one day be a focal point for an airport business park, Hays said.

The DPW has received grant funding from the FAA for the project. The FAA has the Environmental Impact Report, which could take up to a year to be approved.

"They still think it's a good project and we should get the thumbs up," he said.

DPW has applied for an additional \$400,000 grant for the design, Hays said.

Mayers Memorial Hospital CEO Jerry Fikes is one of two administrators of a rural California critical access hospital invited to represent the state at a national rural hospital flexibility (FLEX) conference this week in Washington, D.C. Fikes and Debbie Scaife, the CEO and director of nursing at Jerold Phelps Community Hospital in Garberville, are two of about 100 hospital administrators attending the

Hyatt Grand.

Fikes said the conference is an opportunity for Mayers "to get on the radar screen" in Washington, D.C. and could help the hospital become more competitive when seeking grant funding.

The conference would give him some opportunity to interact with the legislators and rule-makers and to learn more about what the federal government has in store for critical access hospitals (CAH).

CAH is a hospital designation developed under the Medicare Rural Hospital Flexibility Program created by the federal government in the Balanced Budget Act of 1997.

The program allows hospitals to base their Medicare reimbursement on actual costs. The Medicare program currently does not pay hospitals for the actual cost of the services they provide.

Fire Chief Bob May of the Burney Fire Protection District is the new president of the Shasta County Fire Chiefs Association.

He was elected vice-president of the association earlier this year and moved up after Fire Chief Del Waters was transferred to another area.

The association includes the Anderson, Cottonwood, and City of Redding fire departments, as well as the McArthur and Fall River Mills Fire Protection Districts.

The Shasta County Board of Supervisors has approved additional funds - a \$50,000 block grant - for renovations at the Fall River Lions Hall in McArthur. The hall was built in 1913.

The fire also burned a fence and sheds on Stevenson's property.

Fire Captain Sam McMurry of the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection in Bieber said the fire started in vegetation behind the house and was driven, literally into the house, by the wind.

A firefighter at the scene said it first burned a bedroom and then spread quickly into the attic, through the house, and out into the road.

"Basically it burned the top of the house off," McMurray said.

There is no damage report yet, but McMurry made a rough estimate of \$130,000 to \$150,000.





When Shasta College opened a similar outreach center in Weaverville, the enrollment doubled, Beck said





Michigan is the No. 1 state in the country in the manufacturing of cars, trucks and car parts, and No. 1 in cereal production.

Manufacturing, tourism and agriculture are the top industries.

In the 1800s, copper and iron mining were very important, although much of the ore has now been mined.

Native Americans lived in the area for more than 11,000 years. The first European to come to the area was probably the French explorer Etienne Brule.

The British gained the area after the French and Indian War in 1763. The U.S. gained it after the Revolutionary War.

Michigan became a state in 1837. It is the eighth most-populated state, with about 9,900,000 people.

The state is the op U.S. grower of Blueberries, pickle cucumbers, dry beans, Easter lilies and potted

geraniums. It is also a top grower of spearmint, corn, wheat, oats, hay, rye, potatoes, soybeans and sugarbeets, peaches, plums and grapes. Dairy farms are important.

Michigan grows about three-quarters of all tart Cherries, usually made into pies, juices or jellies, and about one-fifth of all sweet cherries, often used to make maraschino cherries.

Michigan is made up of two peninsulas, separated by about five miles of water. (A peninsula is land surrounded by water

on three sides.) Mackinac Bridge connects the two peninsulas. It is one of the biggest

suspension bridges in the world,

weighing more than 2 billion pounds.

Detroit is the Bai largest city, with about 950,000 people, and more than 4 million in the metropolitan area. It was founded by Antoine de la Mothe Cadillac, who set up a trading post there. Because Michigan and Canada both jut into the Great Lakes, Detroit is actually north of a part of Canada.

The flooded area is about 1.6 miles from the Rat Farm, which serves as a public boat launch for fishermen and is the public access to

New Sugarplums' Family Care program in Burney

The Michaels moved to Burney last summer from Sacramento and began remodeling the house they bought sight unseen at the corner of Cedar and Tamarack.

Fortunately, Patrick is a master craftsman with the interest and expertise for fix-er-uppers, because that's what they got.

"We camped for about three weeks and rented a storage shed because the house was a mess," Kathy said.

They brought in a dumpster and began major remodeling.

Today, the flower-filled yard is surrounded by a white picket fence. The entry to Sugarplums' is at 20320 Cedar Street, through the arch from their wedding in September 1999.

There is a play structure

Ahjumawi Lava Spring State Mountain fairgrounds.

"We're continuing to shore up the levee so we can move heavy equipment on it. It's going to take about 17 days to get to where a previous breach occurred and then repair it and bridge across it to the current breach," PG&E spokesperson Lisa Randle said on Friday.

Once crews and equipment reach the 210-foot-long breach, they have to first drain the flooded area on one side, do the repairs, and then pump the water back to the other side.

Randle said it would take about three months to pump the water.

"It's a lengthy process and we'll be working on it until the new rains," Randle said.

Traditional uses of the 7,000-acre McArthur Swamp aren't expected to be back to normal until sometime in 2004.

On Friday, the flooded area was "still growing and sprawling" but was close to reaching equilibrium.

Randle said PG&E does not expect the flooding to reach the Inter-Mountain fairgrounds.

PG&E believes the unusually high water levels caused the breach. There was an inch of rain in late July and the Tule and Fall rivers are higher than normal due to a seasonal increase in aquatic vegetation, Randle said.

PG&E is getting the necessary permits and hiring a contractor to harvest the aquatic vegetation who may begin "weeding" as early as this week.

Some are speculating that the increased vegetation is not only a result of the season's warm water temperatures, but also because it is thriving on additional nutrients in the water, possibly from agricultural run-off.

There is also an increase in vegetation of a different type in Lake Britton this summer.

PG&E employees discovered the breach and rising water level around 10 p.m., Aug. 2.

"We had been doing daily patrols and no leaking was apparent at the breach location until after the rainfall, Randle said. PG&E telephoned McArthur rancher George McArthur, one of the 11 cattlemen who leases the swamp for grazing, and he, Don Martin, and Craig McArthur headed out in the pre-dawn hours with flashlights, life vests and four-wheelers to move more than 1,000 head of cattle to higher ground. A few calves drowned in the flood and last week there was still a cow and heifer stranded on an island in the swamp. It is not yet known who the owners are. Randle said PG&E has no plans to reimburse the ranchers. The Fall River Resource Conservation District in Fall River Mills is "pursuing relief funding for the ranchers," she said. Dale Kroschel, rangeland management specialist for the National resource Conservation Service, said Monday that they are still looking into it. "It's hard to decided what to do when you can't see what the damages are," he said. As for other damage, Randle said there was no real property damage, although there may be fences to repair and canals to flush. In a previous interview, Randle said PG&E could not accurately say and probably would not divulge how much money the utility lost when its Pit One hydroelectric power plant was down for six days as a result of the broken levee. She did say Friday that PG&E spent about \$700,000 to repair a breached levee in 1997.

Cole signed the Decision Notice (DN) and Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI) to implement Alter-native #2 as described in the Cabin Environmental Assessment (EA). Alternative #2 (Modified Proposed Action) fulfills the purpose and need for this project. It accomplishes the requirements of the Herger-Feinstein Quincy Library Group Act (HF-QLG Act) and complies with the changes in management direction as identified in the Record of Decision for the Sierra Nevada Forest Plan Amendment (SNFPA) ROD. This alternative would reduce surface and ladder fuels, thereby decreasing the intensity and spread of wildfires; it would contribute to the economic stability of rural communities via timber sale and service contracts; it would implement a riparian and watershed improvement strategy that contributes to the maintenance and restoration of aquatic and riparian ecosystem health with an emphasis is on restoring native riparian vegetation (aspen) and reducing sources of sediment associated with dispersed recreation and roads.

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
