# Not to worry, says hospital CEO about deficit

## Directors are grim face as first 2 months show expenses outpacing revenues by \$216,000

BY MEG FOX

With revenues down at Mayers Memorial Hospital for the second consecutive month - \$181,000 less in August than was expected – and no relief anticipated in September, CEO Jerry Fikes assured his board that business historically gets better in October and to hang tight.

Hospital census numbers are low and will likely stay low through the month, he said at the Sept. 17 meeting in Burney.

"The temptation is to make cuts to get even with that which is lost. But I think we need to be patient and understand that in October and November the trend (reverses) and

we will need our people in place to cope with ill health in the community," Fikes said.

The directors had grim faces as they listened to the various reasons why their year-to-date budget is \$216,000 in the red, including an unanticipated \$10,000 per month increase in Worker's Compensation premiums and late reimbursement from the state for ancillary services.

The hospital currently has 31 open Workers Comp claims, at least 20 of which have a lifetime medical benefit

Fikes said the hospital is look-

employees and performing more discerning pre-employment physicals to be sure that the people hired are physically capable of doing the

"We've also got to be more diligent about the No-Lift policy," Fikes

In her report to the board Skilled Nursing Director Emily Davidson-Taylor said she was coordinating a team to review injury prevention.

If on-the-job injuries are a result of not following policy, the hospital plans to take disciplinary action.

"We're getting serous about this. ing at physical fitness training for We have the (lifting) equipment.

There is no reason to overextend backs or knees," she said.

In other financial discussion, Fikes noted that the physicians' fees went up when the doctors with Intermountain Family Practice signed on with Mountain Valleys Health Center.

As a result of the change they renegotiated a new contract "long after our budget was approved."

Also, the state has lowered its reimbursement rate for skilled nursing by \$1.17 per day and frozen it for two years.

"It doesn't seem possible that they could lower our reimbursement. All our costs are up," said board member Jim Hamlin.

"Where we used to spend one dollar and get \$1.25 back, now we're spending \$1.25 and getting 95 cents back," said Fikes, to illustrate the problem.

In the ongoing effort to cut costs, Mayers is canceling its contract with Lake District Hospital in Lakeview,



The fire company was started in 1973 after several bak sales and other fund raising activities provided funds for a fire truck.

A 1950s vintage Ward-LaFrance fire engine was found to be within their budget and in 1974 a fire hall was built.

The fire hall was enlarged in 1996 to accommodate a water tender purchased with matching funds from Cassel,

ity," said Ellen Sugg-Forbis, president of the Fall River Education Association.

FREA members have been working under a contract negotiated in the spring of 2001. "And in (the contract) is a commitment to get our salaries up to be competitive with other similar districts," Sugg-Forbis said.

The percentage of the unrestricted budget allocated to certificated staff is lower now than it was five years ago, she said.

And while the teachers' percent has gone down, the percentage for the superintendent and the administrators has gone up, she said.

Teachers in this district are at the bottom of the pay scale compared to similar school districts in Shasta, Trinity, Lassen and Tehama counties.

Only eight elementary school teachers in three very small North State school districts are paid less, she said.

Teachers are also irked by the proposed offer because they believe that 40 percent of the JPA money was owed them anyway.

"It was money we overpaid out of our own pockets," Sugg-Forbis said for the

Newton said that the board took a conservative approach "to the distribution of district resources deemed available at this time" because of the state's ongoing budget uncertainties.

He said they also received guidance from the Shasta County Board of Education and the California School Boards Assoc., among other entities, in making their decision.

Based on district figures, classified staff would share \$45,267; confidential staff is eligible for \$4,642; and administrative staff is eligible for \$5,968 of the total allocation.

In the second, Salters scored another goal in the second to bring the Bulldogs to 3-2.





### Freedoms in the First Amendment

# Assembly and Petition

Religious liberty, freedom of speech and press are the best-known freedoms protected by the First Amendment. But there are also two other important freedoms—assembly and petition— that are needed to make sure we don't lose any of our rights.

### History

The right to petition dates back to the Magna Carta in 1215 when noblemen forced King John of England to address their petitions for change. In 1689, the English Bill of Rights gave all Englishmen the right to petition.

The English colonists who settled this country believed that they had the right to petition the government for change. In the 1770s, they petitioned King George III for better treatment. When he ignored them, they wrote the Declaration of Independence and, after the American Revolution, won their freedom.

The First Amendment says, in part:

Congress shall make no law . . . prohibiting . . . or abridging . . . the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the government for a redress of grievances" (a correction of something that someone thinks is unfair).

This says that only Congress shall make no law.

The Supreme Court has ruled that the 14th Amendment (approved in 1868) means that state governments must all protect freedoms guaranteed by the First Amendment.

### Freedom of assembly

Freedom of assembly is the right of people to gather and express their views. The First Amendment protects peaceful, not violent, assembly. The government can restrict an assembly only if there is a real danger that the law will be broken or violence will break out. For example, people may not riot or block the streets.

Because we have freedom of assembly and expression, the U.S. Supreme Court has also recognized that we have freedom of association. In some countries, meetings and groups are controlled by the government. In this country, we have many thousands of groups and organizations that are free to meet.

### One-time meetings

Some groups might meet only once and for a special purpose.



The 1963 March on Washington for equal rights, led by Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., is an example of a one-time gathering

### Organized groups

Some groups, such as the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, meet on a regular basis. They are well organized and many have been around for a long



Scouts are exercising their right to assemble.

### Freedom of petition

Freedom of petition is the right to ask the government to correct a problem or to right a wrong. When many people come together and ask for change, it sends a powerful message to government officials.

Throughout American history, petitions from the people have called attention to problems that need to be considered. For example, before

the Civil War, thousands of citizens petitioned Congress to end slavery in Washington, D.C., and other areas across the country.



### Limits to assembly and petition



There are limits to the freedom of assembly and petition. Notice the word 'peaceably" in the First Amendment.

This means that our meetings and demonstrations should be peaceful. They cannot cause danger to others or to their property. Marching Permit

State, local and national governments have set up certain rules in order to keep the peace. The U.S.

Supreme Court has held that these rules must be reasonable.


People who are planning to march or demonstrate usually must get permits to do so.
