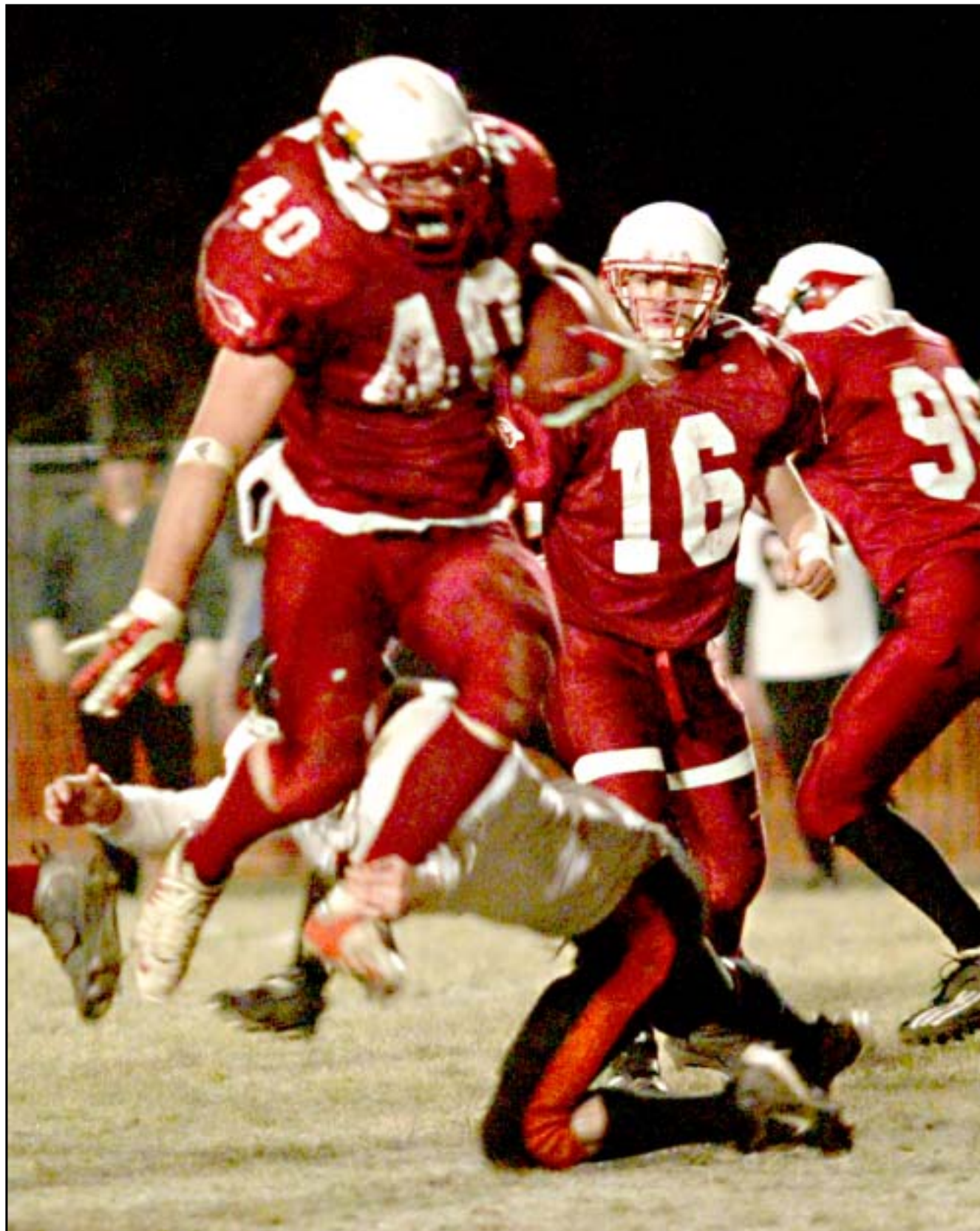

Hospital health is better, but still deficits

When it rains it pours, though in the case of Mayers Memorial Hospital, last month's increase in patients and promises of government dollars headed their way are drops in the bucket.

Still, it was a change for the hospital board to hear mostly good news at their meeting Nov. 19.

The hospital's gross and net revenues for October were over budget and net income was less in the red than usual.

"Our gross revenue (of \$1.8 million) was impressive," said CEO Jerry Fikes.

And, though the hospital's net income was about a \$40,000 deficit for October and almost \$333,000 in the red year-to-date, Fikes said, "I still feel we're headed in the right direction. I'm just disappointed that I can't show you numbers that reflect that."

Fikes said that the hospital is due to receive a \$140,000 share of the \$150 million in federal matching funds owed California from the Medi-Cal patient lawsuit.

He said that, in his opinion, the fact that hospitals don't already have the funds is a result of politics.

"As long as Davis was in Sacramento, G.W. (Bush) could not find the paperwork. With a Republican in office, he may find it," Fikes said.

Mayers is also expecting an estimated \$200,000 in a Medicare a supplement for outpatient services.

Based on preliminary Medicare/Medi-Cal reports, Fikes is also projecting that the hospital will receive about \$450,000 late in the third quarter.

"We have 450,000 reasons to look forward to spring," Fikes told his board. "It's money we've earned, but the perversity of the government is to wait to give us (this year) what

Water district budget of \$759,000 OK'd

Directors for the Burney Water District approved the proposed 2003/2004 budgets for the water and sewer departments when they met Nov. 19.

The water district has a proposed \$429,500 budget for the water department and a separate \$329,300 budget for the sewer department.

The water budget does not include the recent sale of the district's six remaining lots in the Burney Heights subdivision on Hudson Street as the properties are still in escrow, District Manager Bill Suppa said.

In 2002/2003, revenues were \$64,000 less than anticipated as a result of increased insurance costs and because the district's biggest customer, Burney Forest Power, was down for several weeks this year, Suppa said.

The water department's actual revenues were \$392,434 instead of the \$455,400 budgeted.

Hospital marks improve says employee survey

is owed us from last year.”

In another matter, Fikes reported that the hospital's marks had improved, between one and 10 percent, in 16 areas, as recorded on a second Employee Satisfaction Survey

Among the areas where employees saw improvement were job training, benefits, working relationships, communications, management style, and productivity.

No change was noted in the areas of job satisfaction, creativity, career development, and compensation, although Fikes said employ-

ees received a 2 percent raise after the surveys were completed.

“We deferred (the raises) until I could see if there was enough money coming it to justify and pay for it,” Fikes said.

The performance evaluation category declined by seven percent. Fikes said this could have been because at the time of the survey, the hospital was late in finishing evaluations.

A total of 194 employees did the survey in October, compared to 187 who responded to the first survey taken in November 2002.

SUPERIOR COURT ACTION

In Burney Superior Court Nov. 14, Judge Andy Anderson fined Colt James Graham, 20, of Burney, \$1,431 after he pled guilty to driving without evidence of insurance and an amended complaint of reckless driving.

He was sentenced to one day in county jail, with credit for time served, and was ordered to submit to the warrantless search for controlled substances or alcohol.

The Judge dismissed charges of driving under the influence of drugs and/or alcohol, possession of marijuana while driving, driving without registration, and speeding.

Mota admitted prior convictions in court and charges of DUI and the seatbelt violation were dismissed.

Mota was sentenced to 185 days in county jail with release for work on Nov. 19.

Two cases, charging misdemeanor public intoxication while under the influence of toluene, on Aug. 18 and on Sept. 8, were dismissed.

Mota's probation was revoked and reinstated after admitting violation of his probation on four other cases: corporal injury to his spouse on March 1; public intoxication while under the influence of toluene on Feb. 19, 2001; driving with a license suspended for a prior DUI conviction on Aug. 4, 2001; and misdemeanor driving with a .08 percent or higher BAC on May 9, 1999.

Water budget approved

Sewer department revenues were \$10,871 over budget for 2002/2003.

The 2003/2004 pool budget was approved in September with anticipated revenues of \$48,000 and expenses of \$70,000.

Last year, the pool was \$17,000 over budget.

Suppa said he expects it to be about \$22,000 over budget next year.

The directors were disappointed when voters in the water district turned down Measure B at the polls this month.

They had asked water users in the district for a one dollar monthly pool fee increase, from \$2 to \$3 a month.

Suppa said he and his directors aren't sure what the community swimming pool's future might be.

"We have the option to try (to pass a measure) again in another year. We'll try whatever we can. Maybe increase the gate fees and cut back on hours.

"We have \$75,000 in the pool reserve fund and once that's depleted, the pool will have to close.

"In our agreement with the school district, if the pool closes, it reverts back to their

ownership and then it will be their problem," Suppa said.

In other business, the three directors present (Aileen Hovis, Randy Stevens, Jackie Young, and John Meeker) heard that employee insurance rates are increasing 22 percent next year and, as a result, the district will be paying \$1,222.86 per month for its employees.

Suppa said he checked into other insurance carriers and learned that the district's coverage through the Association of California Water Agencies (ACWA) was "the best game in town."

At Suppa's recommendation, the directors agreed to change workers compensation carriers in order to save \$7,766 per year.

"This is a no-brainer but I need your approval," Suppa said.

The district is currently paying \$20,016 a year through the state fund and by switching to ACWA's Joint Powers Association the cost would be \$12,250 annually.

Suppa also plans to look into ACWA's liability and property insurance rates.

When the pool was built in 1969, ACWA would not cover it, he said, but the agency is now covering some parks and recreation districts and

may reconsider.

The board changed its meeting date next month to Dec. 10.

A president's speech

Before the United States entered World War II, much of the world was at war. President Franklin Roosevelt gave a speech to Congress in January 1941, making it clear where the United States stood. He wanted to prepare our citizens for the conflict we were likely to enter.

This is known as the Four Freedoms speech. Roosevelt said that in the future, we look forward to a life for everyone in the world based on these freedoms:

- freedom of speech.
- freedom of every person to worship God in his or her own way.
- freedom from want so that people would feel secure.
- freedom from fear so that no nation would go to war.

The United States entered World War II months later, on Dec. 7, 1941. Many men and women went off to war. Life on the home front demanded that all people make sacrifices.

Norman Rockwell

Artist and illustrator Norman Rockwell wanted to do something for the war effort during World War II.

He created four paintings that help remind us of our four freedoms. One painting was about Thanksgiving. Norman Rockwell was able to

illustrate big ideas in a way that we can understand. His art was for everyone to enjoy.

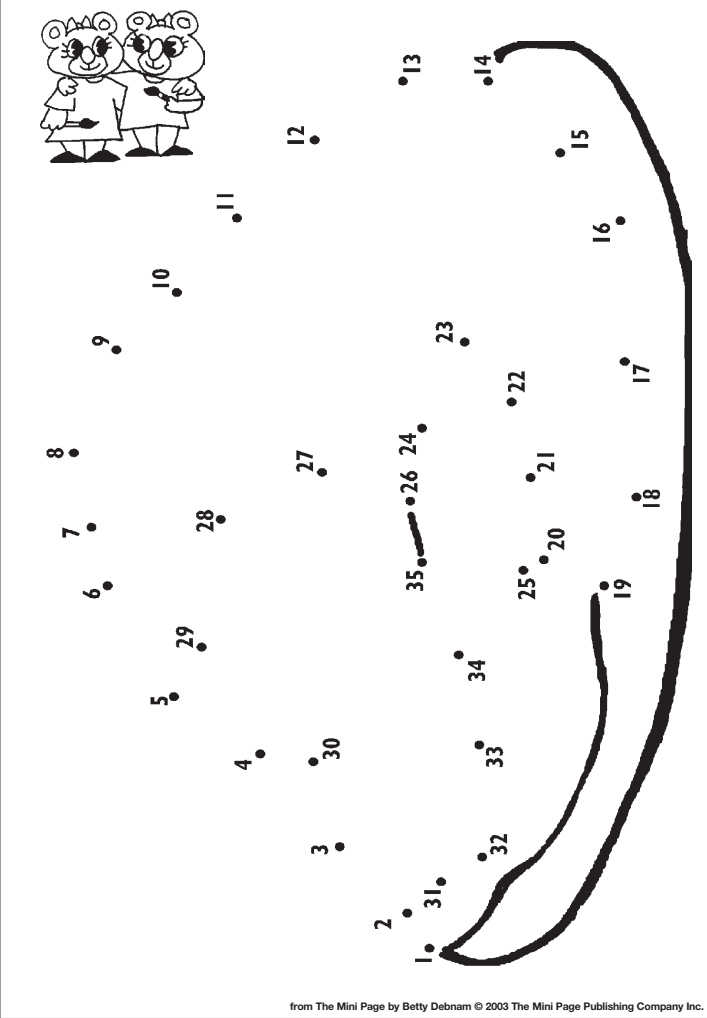
This painting shows the warmth and happiness of a family gathered for a Thanksgiving dinner.

Rockwell's Other Freedoms

More about the freedoms

Norman Rockwell painted the Four Freedoms from 1942 to 1943. He had planned to complete them in three months, but it took him seven months, and he worked so hard, he lost 15 pounds. They first appeared in a popular magazine, The Saturday Evening Post. Thousands of people wanted copies. The paintings were put on a tour of 16 cities and raised more than \$130 million for the war effort through sales of war bonds and posters.

"Freedom of Worship"

shows worshippers of many religions and ages as they worship in their own way. The somber colors give the viewer a feeling of reverence.

"Freedom From Fear"

pictures parents saying goodnight to their children. The father holds a newspaper with headlines telling of bombings in Europe. The scene gives a feeling of security.

"Freedom of Speech"

features a man standing up and speaking out against something that everyone else is in favor of. The other people disagree but they still listen with respect.

Norman Rockwell

Norman Rockwell (1894-1978) was an ordinary man with an extraordinary art talent and way of seeing things. He painted ordinary people doing everyday things to express heart-warming feelings or serious ideas.

While most of his painting is meant to be entertaining, he could also be serious about his subject.

When he was growing up, he was not good at sports, but he was very good at art. He left high school to go to art school. By the age of 19, he became the art director for the Boy Scout magazine, Boys' Life.

Norman Rockwell became very successful. He is best known for his 321 cover illustrations for The Saturday Evening Post, a magazine that your grandparents will probably remember.

"Triple Self-Portrait" (1960) shows Rockwell at the easel drawing himself while posing before a mirror. He also included portraits of other favorite artists.

Rockwell often painted women and girls as strong characters. In "The Marbles Champion (1939)," the girl is winning the marbles. Note that her bag is already full.

The candidates have 45 minutes to meet and mingle with the 650 delegates from California, who then vote for their six state officers.

“It's a process,” said Rose.

Next year, Prestininzi returns as a sophomore to California State University, Chico, and Rose begins her freshman year at Cal Poly, San Luis Obispo.

While visiting McArthur FFA, Prestininzi and Rose stayed with McArthur FFA Secretary Jackie McArthur and her parents, Craig and Marlene McArthur.

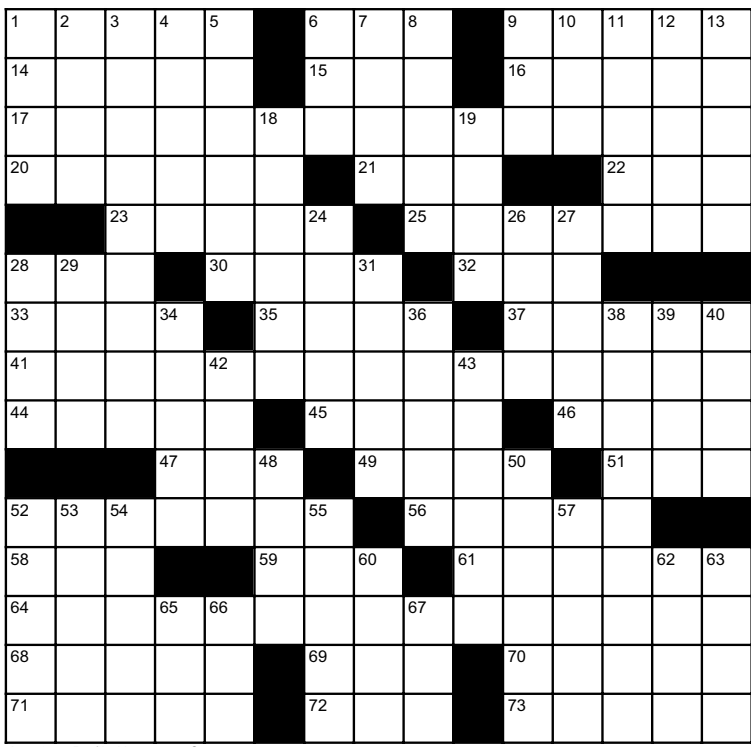

The Region 9 office of the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is requesting public comment on the proposed extension and modification of an Authority to Construct (ATC) permit, issued in accordance with 40 CFR 52.21 to Covanta Energy, Three Mountain power, LLC. This permit was issued for the construction and operation of a 500 megawatt natural gas-fired power plant, to be located in Burney, California. Three Mountain Power's ATC permit is set to expire December 31, 2003. If approved, this action will grant an 18-month extension of the ATC permit, and update the existing BACT (Best-Available-Control-Technology) requirements. This action would also revise several permit conditions to allow a higher sulfur content of the supplied natural gas; to increase the SO2 emission limits (from 1.24 lb/hr to 2.10 lb/hr); and to make other minor modifications and corrections.

If this proposed extension and modification becomes final, and if there is no appeal, construction of Three Mountain Power in Burney, California may continue subject to the conditions of the permit and other applicable permit and legal requirements.

Attachments may be submitted in either Word Perfect or Microsoft Word formats. All comments should address the proposed changes and their effect on the following:

1. The Best Available Control Technology (BACT) determination;
2. The PSD increments allocated to the proposed facility;
3. The effects, if any, on Class I areas;
4. The effect of the proposed facility on ambient air quality; and
5. The attainment and maintenance of National Ambient Air Quality Standards (NAAQS).

Pursuant to 40 CFR 124.12, EPA shall hold a Public Hearing if the Regional Administrator finds, on the basis of requests, a significant amount of public interest in the draft permit extension and modification. Requests for a Public Hearing must state the nature of the issues proposed to be raised in the hearing. If a Public Hearing is to be held, a public notice stating the date, time and place of the hearing will be made at least 30 days prior to the hearing. Reasonable attempt will be made to notify directly any person who has commented on this proposal of any pending Public Hearing, provided contact information has been given to the EPA staff person listed above.

A final decision to set the conditions of and issue a final permit extension and modification, or to deny the application for the permit extension and modification, shall be made after all comments have been considered. Notice of the final decision shall be sent to each person who has submitted written comments or requested notice of the final permit decision. The decision will become effective 30 days from the date of issuance unless:

1. a later effective date is specified in the decision; or
2. the decision is appealed to the Environmental Appeals Board pursuant to 40 CFR 124.19 (any person who submits written comments on the draft permit extension and modification or who participates in the Public Hearing may petition the Environmental Appeals Board to review any part of the permit decision within 30 days after the decision has been issued. Any person who failed to file comments and failed to participate in the Public Hearing on the draft permit extension and modification may petition for review by the Environmental Appeals Board only those parts of the final permit decision which are different than the draft permit modification); or
3. there are no comments requesting a change to the draft permit modification, in which case the final decision shall become effective immediately upon issuance.

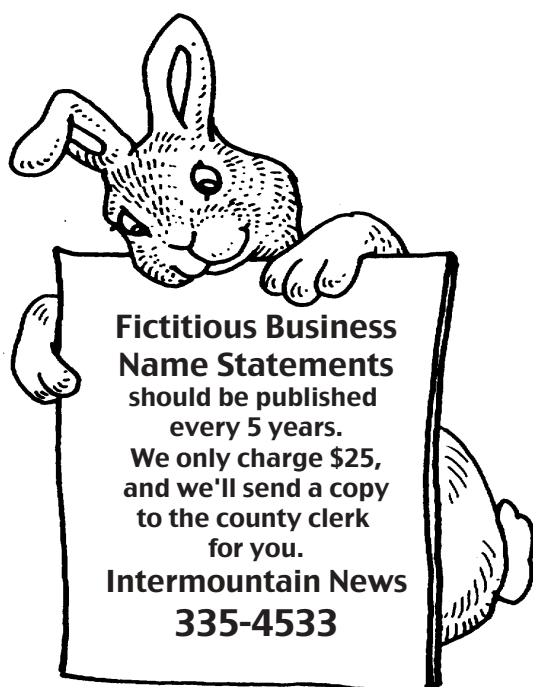
