Hospital health is better, but still deficits

When it rains it pours, though in the case of Mayers Memorial Hospital, last month's increase in patients and promises of government dollars headed their way are drops in the bucket.

Still, it was a change for the hospital board to hear mostly good news at their meeting Nov. 19.

The hospital's gross and net revenues for October were over budget and net income was less in the red than usual.

"Our gross revenue (of \$1.8 million) was impressive," said CEO Jerry Fikes.

And, though the hospital's net income was about a \$40,000 deficit for October and almost \$333,000 in the red year-to-date, Fikes said, "I still feel we're headed in the right direction. I'm just disappointed that I can't show you numbers that reflect that."

Fikes said that the hospital is due to receive a \$140,000 share of the \$150 million in federal matching funds owed California from the Medi-Cal patient lawsuit.

He said that, in his opinion, the fact that hospitals don't already

Water district budget of \$759,000 OK'd

Directors for the Burney Water District approved the proposed 2003/2004 budgets for the water and sewer departments when they met Nov. 19.

The water district has a proposed \$429,500 budget for the water department and a separate \$329,300 budget for the sewer department.

The water budget does not include the recent sale of the district's six remaining lots in the Burney Heights subdivision on Hudson Street as the properties are still in escrow, District Manager Bill Suppa said.

In 2002/2003, revenues were \$64,000 less than anticipated as a result of increased insurance costs and because the district's biggest customer, Burney Forest Power, was down for several weeks this year, Suppa said.

The water department's actual revenues were \$392,434 instead of the \$455,400 budgeted.

is owed us from last year."

In another matter, Fikes reported that the hospital's improved, had marks between one and 10 percent, in 16 areas, as recorded on a second Employee Satisfaction Survey

Among the areas where employees saw improvement were job training, benefits, working relationships, communications, management style, and productivity.

No change was noted in the areas of job satisfaction, creativity, career development, and compensation, although Fikes said employ-

ees received a 2 percent raise after the surveys were completed.

"We deferred (the raises) until I could see if there was enough money coming it to justify and pay for it," Fikes said.

The performance evaluation category declined by seven percent. Fikes said this could have been because at the time of the survey, the hospital was late in finishing evaluations.

A total of 194 employees did the survey in October, compared to 187 who responded to the first survey taken in November 2002.




Norman Rockwell

Norman Rockwell (1894-1978) was an ordinary man with an extraordinary art talent and way of seeing things. He painted ordinary people doing everyday things to express heartwarming feelings or serious ideas.

While most of his painting is meant to be entertaining, he could also be serious about his subject.

When he was growing up, he was not good at sports, but he was very good at art. He left high school to go to art school. By the age of 19, he became the art director for the Boy Scout magazine, Boys' Life.

Norman Rockwell became very successful. He is best known for his 321 cover illustrations for The Saturday Evening Post, a magazine that your grandparents will probably remember.







The Region 9 office of the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is requesting public comment on the proposed extension and modification of an Authority to Construct (ATC) permit, issued in accordance with 40 CFR 52.21 to Covanta Energy, Three Mountain power, LLC. This permit was issued for the construction and operation of a 500 megawatt natural gas-fired power plant, to be located in Burney, California. Three Mountain Power's ATC permit is set to expire December 31, 2003. If approved, this action will grant an 18-month extension of the ATC permit, and update the existing BACT (Best-Available-Control-Technology) requirements. This action would also revise several permit conditions to allow a higher sulfur content of the supplied natural gas; to increase the SO2 emission limits (from 1.24 lb/hr to 2.10 lb/hr); and to make other minor modifications and corrections.

If this proposed extension and modification becomes final, and if there is no appeal, construction of Three Mountain Power in Burney, California may continue subject to the conditions of the permit and other applicable permit and legal requirements.

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The Administrative Record for the draft permit modification, which consists of the draft permit modification and all data submitted by the applicant in support of the modification, is available for public inspection Monday through Friday from 9:00 A.M. until 4:00 P.M. in the Air Division of EPA, Region 9, 75 Hawthorne Street, 17th Floor, San Francisco, California. All documents that are available in electronic form may be requested via email.

All comments and objections to the draft permit extension/modification, and requests for a Public Hearing, must be delivered within 30 days of the date of this notice. An extension of the 30-day comment period may be granted if the request for an extension adequately explains why more time is required to prepare comments. Comments must be sent or delivered in writing to Katie Stewart at the postal or email address shown above. If comments are submitted as an attachment to an email, please include contact information in the text of the email in case technical problems arise. Attachments may be submitted in either Word Perfect or Microsoft Word formats. All comments should address the proposed changes and their effect on the following:

- 1. The Best Available Control Technology (BACT) determination;
- 2. The PSD increments allocated to the proposed facility;
- 3. The effects, if any, on Class I areas;
- 4. The effect of the proposed facility on ambient air quality; and
- 5. The attainment and maintenance of National Ambient Air Quality Standards (NAAQS).

Pursuant to 40 CFR 124.12, EPA shall hold a Public Hearing if the Regional Administrator finds, on the basis of requests, a significant amount of public interest in the draft permit extension and modification. Requests for a Public Hearing must state the nature of the issues proposed to be raised in the hearing. If a Public Hearing is to be held, a public notice stating the date, time and place of the hearing will be made at least 30 days prior to the hearing. Reasonable attempt will be made to notify directly any person who has commented on this proposal of any pending Public Hearing, provided contact information has been given to the EPA staff person listed above.

A final decision to set the conditions of and issue a final permit extension and modification, or to deny the application for the permit extension and modification, shall be made <u>after</u> all comments have been considered. Notice of the final decision shall be sent to each person who has submitted written comments or requested notice of the final permit decision. The decision will become effective 30 days from the date of issuance unless:

- 1. a later effective date is specified in the decision; or
- 2. the decision is appealed to the Environmental Appeals Board pursuant to 40 CFR 124.19 (any person who submits written comments on the draft permit extension and modification or who participates in the Public Hearing may petition the Environmental Appeals Board to review any part of the permit decision within 30 days after the decision has been issued. Any person who failed to file comments <u>and</u> failed to participate in the Public Hearing on the draft permit extension and modification may petition for review by the Environmental Appeals Board <u>only</u> those parts of the final permit decision which are different than the draft permit modification); or
- 3. there are no comments requesting a change to the draft permit modification, in which case the final decision shall become effective immediately upon issuance.
