Mayers looks to build new hospital

Mayers Memorial Hospital is about to take its first local step towards the hoped-for construction of a new, seismic-safe facility with grant funds acquired through membership in the Rural Healthcare Design Network (formerly called the Rural Healthcare Design Consortium).

Mayers CEO Jerry Fikes told his board of directors Nov. 19 that he plans to have public meetings this month to describe the process and find community volunteers interested in serving on a 20-member needs assessment committee.

"This is good news. It's exciting. It's our first step towards spending \$15 million of someone else's money and we'll have the opportunity to shape our future and to be an important part of that future," Fikes said.

The committee's work will be to put together a needs assessment of the area that, among other findings, will consider the "fractious issue" of where the hospital should be built.

Two families nearly lost their homes in two separate fires that broke out over the Thanksgiving holiday.

On Thursday, Fall River Mills resident Bob Barrett and his family returned from out of town at 9 p.m.

to find their two-story house filled with smoke.

They immediately called 911 and Soldier Mountain Fire Company No.13 was the first to arrive.

"Due to the extreme heat and heavy smoke, it took us about an hour to find the source, but we

were able to contain the fire to the kitchen and the upstairs bedroom," said Soldier Mountain Fire Chief Tom Coe.

He said the blaze started above the kitchen range and appeared to have been electrical.

"It destroyed the kitchen and the floor of the upstairs bedroom," he said.

Much of the damage was from heat, smoke and water.

"The water damage was from where a joint in a water pipe in the wall had melted and it emptied the pressure tank onto the fire. So it was actually a good thing," said Fire Capt. Greg Mayer.

Engines and crews from the Fall River Mills No. 15 and McArthur No. 16 volunteer fire departments also responded.

The Burney Fire Protection District provided its breathing support trailer to refill the firefighters' selfcontained breathing apparatus, Coe said.

The Barrett's two-story home overlooks the Pit River Canyon in Fall River Mills.

Damage was initially estimated at between \$75,000 and \$100,000.

The second fire broke out around 3:20 a.m. Friday at the George Collier residence at 20274 Grogan Street in Burney.

Collier reported that he woke up to find the tubing on his home oxygen tank in flames. He said he then yelled for his wife and teenage grandson to get out of the house.

Burney Fire Chief Bob May said the cause of the fire was an electrical short in a wall socket in the Collier's bedroom.

The Burney Fire Protection District responded with two engines and an ambulance. The Cassel and Hat Creek volunteer fire stations also assisted at the fire.

May said there were no reported injuries. Damage was estimated at \$50,000 to the property and \$5,000 to contents.

The American Red Cross assisted in providing temporary housing for the family at a local motel.

Board President Les Cufaude, who has represented the hospital at RHDN meetings, said the 13-hospital group wants to bring in hospitals from out of the state in a few months so that they can go after federal dollars, too.

Although states like Oregon and Nevada don't have to meet the stringent new earthquake standards that California does, Cufaude said RHDN "has moved away from that. The seismic standards are what got us together, but we've evolved."

Added Fikes, "Our reality is the same as others. Our infrastructure is crumbling around us. It's a 40- to 50-year-old facility that does not accommodate the new technology."



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CHP arrests 2 for alleged DUI

Two persons were arrested for allegedly driving under the influence in two separate vehicle crashes this past week.

On Nov. 26, about 8:28 p.m., Amy A. Plumhof, 31, of Burney was seen by Shasta County Sheriff's deputy Ken Koenen traveling west on Highway 299 through Burney at a high rate of speed, the California Highway Patrol reported.

Koenen pursued the vehicle from Tamarack Avenue with his vehicle's red lights and siren activated.

Plumhof reportedly turned her headlights off and attempted to make a left turn onto Elm Street.

Prior to Elm Street, she applied her brakes, went across the center line of the highway and across Elem Street, the CHP reported.

The vehicle continued off the west roadway edge and struck a fire hydrant.

The hydrant broke at the base as the vehicle continued off the roadway and struck a wooden fence.

The driver then backed up about 15 feet and accelerated forward south on Elm Street, the CHP said.

The vehicle continued down the street without headlights and failed to stop for stop signs while traveling on the wrong side of the roadway, the CHP said.

On the morning of Sept. manslaughter 21, 2003, the opening day in the shooting death of his of hunting season, Park and hunting companion, Michael Wood were in a wooded area Wood, 28, of Cassel, is set off the Old Dump Road, five miles southeast of Burney High School. Park reportedly fired his rifle across the dirt road and shot and killed Wood, who was about 150 to 200 feet away, according to the Shasta County Sheriff's Office.

Traveling north on Tamarack Avenue, Plumhof pulled to the right shoulder and stopped just south of Highway 299.

Plumhof, who was not injured, was arrested for DUI, evading arrest and hit and run driving.

In a second incident Friday, Jennifer L. Richards, 44, of Montgomery Creek was traveling east on Highway 299 about 3:55 p.m. and crossed the Montgomery Creek bridge.

She applied the brakes to her pickup and made a U-turn, the CHP said, now facing west on the highway's right shoulder.

She then accelerated to 40-45 miles per hour while still on the shoulder and launched the pickup into the creek.

The vehicle came to rest on all four tires in the center of the creek, the CHP reported.

A motorist traveling west saw the incident and stopped to assist Richards.

She sustained major inju-

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Death penalty won't be sought for 2 defendants in woman's death

The Shasta County District Attorney's office has decided not to seek the death penalty against two of the five defendants charged in the Sept. 11 killing in Round Mountain of Sandra Metz.

Deputy District Attorney Stewart Jankowitz said their office looked at several factors before deciding they would not seek the death penalty against Clifton Garrett Sherer, 21, of Shasta Lake, and Jack Thomas Morris, 18, of Igo.

"As egregious as the (killing was) you have to look at many factors," Jankowitz said on Tuesday.

Among those factors, he said, are whether more than one person was killed, the defendant's previous criminal records, and whether or not they believed a jury would be likely to sentence two young men to death.

"Based on several factors, we decided it was not appropriate to ask for the death penalty," Jankowitz said.

In addition to Sherer and Morris, others facing murder and other charges, including robbery, burglary and auto theft are Metz's daughter, Meghan Powell,

16, of Round Mountain and Danielle Rodriguez, 16, of Redding. Both girls are being tried as adults.

Calvin William Hodge Jr., 18, of Igo, is charged with conspiracy to commit murder.

The five defendants were in court Monday to enter pleas following a preliminary hearing earlier this month where they were ordered to stand trial. On Monday, all five pleaded not guilty to all charges.

With the decision by the D.A.'s office, all five now face a maximum penalty of life in prison without the possibility of parole.

Also on Monday, Jankowitz requested a trial date of April, 2004. But attorneys for the defendants objected saying they needed more time to prepare their defense.

Shasta County Superior Court Judge Wilson Curle granted the defense attorney's request, setting a trial date of June 22, 2004, but also scheduled a status conference for April 19 to make sure all attorneys were actively working on preparing their case.



Soldier Mountain awarded fire grant

Soldier Mountain Volunteer Fire Company has been awarded a \$200,000 grant to purchase a new Interface Fire Engine from the U.S Fire Administration, a division of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).

The federal share of the grant will be \$180,000 and Soldier Mountain Volunteer Fire Company will be responsible for matching 10 percent of the grant amount (\$20,000).

The matching funds will come from revenue generated from fundraisers and donations within the community that were earmarked for the purchase of a new fire engine.

The grant is part of the 2003 Assistance to Firefighters Program.

It was announced Friday that Soldier Mountain Volunteer Fire Company was one of 635 departments in the United States to receive a grant.

The grants given this week total \$71.6 million.

Ultimately about 7,000 awards worth \$750 million will be given to help firefighters. Assistant Fire Chief Scott Carnegie wrote this grant for the Soldier Mountain Volunteer Fire Company. Wildland-Urban The Interface is a common term used in the fire community to describe homes built within the wildland environment. These homes are a challenge to protect from fires originating in the wildland. Fire departments in the past relied on "brush or wildland engines" to fight these fires and have found themselves needing to save homes while fighting these fires. A new breed of fire engines has emerged that are capable of fighting wildland fires and at the same time protecting the homes within the fire area.

is more than 25 years old. This engine is still serviceable, but is showing signs of its age and is requiring more maintenance and becoming increasingly unreliable. "Engine 513 was never designed as a wildland

replace Engine 513, which

designed as a wildland engine, and has problems negotiating the non-paved roads in the area due to its low clearance and highway gearing," said Fire Chief Tom Coe.

"An interface type fire engine will work better to protect life, property, and resource values within the communities that we serve."

The new fire engine will be used as the primary response vehicle for vegetation fires, traffic collisions, strike team assignments, and structure protection.

It is anticipated that this engine will have four-wheeldrive, 4-door cab, mobile pumping capability, minimum of 500 gallon per minute pump, minimum of 500-gallon tank, and a high horse power diesel power plant.

The Wayside Garden Club also offers an annual \$500 scholarship to students majoring in gardening or horticulture.







A true robot is a mechanical creature that can gather information about the physical world. Based on the information it discovers, it can make its own decisions about what to do. And it can adapt to changing conditions. A true robot does not need a human








Robots in space

The Viking missions to Mars in 1975-1976 had the first true robots sent into space. The Viking landers each had a robotic arm, and they made decisions about what samples to scoop up.

It was not until 1997 that the much more advanced Sojourner robot rover

explored Mars. This winter, even more advanced robots are scheduled to explore the red planet.

The Mars Express spacecraft, launched by the European Space Agency, will arrive on Mars Dec. 24 this year. Its robot, Beagle 2, will not rove, but can dig in the ground.
