Local public health office to close

Six public health employees will be laid off and access to numerous local services will end when Shasta County Public Health closes the doors of the Burney Regional office on Feb. 20.

"We finally got more services up here and now they're going away," said Community Development Coordinator Shellisa Moore, who is among those about to lose her job.

The public cheered when Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger reversed

the state's Vehicle License Fee (VLF). But the money to make up the state's \$10.5 billion deficit had to come from somewhere and public health is one of several targets.

"Shasta County Public Health is losing about a third of its funding until the state finds another way to pay for local public health," Moore said.

Countywide about 60 public health employees are losing their jobs, Moore said.

Others from the Burney office

who have been notified about their jobs are Community Health Advocate Claudia Woods, Community Organizer Laura Thompson, Community Health Advocates Manuel Meza and Kenia Howard, and Medical Services Clerk Jennifer Cearley.

The department plans to retain Public Health Nurse David Moeschler and the Women, Infant and Children (WIC) program in Burney.

Moore said locally her office provided immunizations, TB tests, and flu clinics.

"Our staff traveled to nine communities to do the flu clinics," said Moore, adding that she doesn't know how many, if any, flu clinics the county will be able to provide locally.

"It's not looking good," she said.

The Burney staff worked with the schools to improve physical activity and nutrition and also worked closely with Tri-County Community Network, Acorn Community Enterprises, and Partnership for the Public's Health to provide local

programs and services.

The Burney regional office participated on the Intermountain Injury Prevention Coalition, the Physical Activity and Nutrition team (PANT), Intermountain Breastfeeding Coalition, Intermountain Area Domestic Violence Coordinating Council, and Intermountain Hispanic/Latino Coalition.

Community presentations and services were available at no cost to the community in Spanish, as

Search continues

Shasta County sheriff's deputies were continuing their search Tuesday afternoon for 15-year-old Austin Sparks, who was reported missing from the Montgomery Creek area Sunday afternoon. He was last seen outside the Acorn Cafe on Highway 299 in Montgomery Creek and thought to have been heading to the Redding Skate Park. About 35 search and rescue members have been checking with residents and searching the Round Mountain and Montgomery Creek areas. A sheriff's command post was set up Tuesday at the Round Mountain fire department. Austin is 5 feet, 115-120 pounds, brown hair, brown eyes and was wearing a black shirt, brown sweatpants, and possibly wearing Globe brand van-style, black and grey skate shoes.

Burney Falls park fees to rise, but less than other locations

Fees in the California State Parks system are going up on July 1.

It will cost \$6 to drive in to look at Burney Falls or swim at the lake this summer and \$20 to camp for a night at McArthur-Burney Falls Memorial State Park.

Boat launch fees at the park are going up from \$4 to \$8, in addition to the \$6 entry fee.

"We're lucky. Campsites at some campgrounds are going up to \$39 a night with day use fees of \$12," said Burney Falls Park Ranger Davis

The increases are a result of the state's continuing budget shortfall, according to State Parks Director Ruth Coleman.

"After repeated budget reductions, we have reached the point where there is no other choice.

"This is a reasonable solution to help get the State through hard budget times. This plan keeps the system open and operating, while also keeping it as affordable as possible for all Californians," Coleman said.

In some cases, fees were increased only slightly. But at the state's most popular campgrounds and at prime locations during high-demand, peak times of the year, parking or camping fees have been increased by a greater amount.

Statewide day use fees in the parks are increasing from \$3 to \$5 to from \$4 to \$14.

Family camping fees, set at \$8 to \$13 in 2003, are going up to from \$11 to \$25.

New laws affect way we behave in state

Bosses, landlords, truck drivers, pharmacists, principals, and even some parents will have to change the way they behave in 2004 under new laws that went into effect on Thursday.

Parents become liable for teen drinking and driving.

A teenager's parents or legal guardians could go to jail for a year and pay a \$1,000 fine if they knowingly allow children to drink or use drugs in their home and then drive, causing a traffic accident.

Under AB 1301, adults would be prosecuted if the teenage driver caused a traffic accident and was found to have a blood-alcohol level of .05 percent or higher or if the driver was found to be under the influence of a controlled substance.

MORE SLEEP FOR TRUCKERS

Truck drivers nationwide will have to get more rest under a new hours-of-service regulation that took effect Jan. 4.

Truckers are no longer allowed to drive after being on duty for 60 hours in seven-day-consecutive period or to drive 70 hours in an eight-consecutive-day period.

The new rules allow long haul drivers to drive 11 hours after 10 consecutive hours off duty, according to the U.S. Department of Transportation.

The on-duty cycle may be restarted only after a driver takes a "weekend" (34 consecutive hours) off.

CLEANER SCHOOL BATHROOMS

It's also time to clean and restock the school restrooms or lose state maintenance funding.

Under SB 892, every school restroom must be maintained and cleaned regularly and be fully operational and stocked at all times with toilet paper, soap, and paper towels or functional hand dryers.

Schools must keep all of their restrooms open during school hours when students are not in classes, and keep a sufficient number of restrooms open during school hours. A school that violates these provisions will be ineligible for State Deferred Maintenance funds.

STUDENT SODA BANS

The state also wants healthier students and as a result of SB 677, which goes into effect July 1, schools have several regulations to follow if beverages are sold on premises to students.

Elementary schools will be banned from selling "unhealthy" beverages from vending machines.

The law permits elementary schools to sell healthy beverages containing "only water, milk, 100 percent fruit juices, or fruit-based drinks with no less than 50% fruit juice and no added sweeteners."

During fundraisers, elementary school students can sell "unhealthy" beverages off school grounds or on school grounds if the drinks are sold at least 30 minutes after the end of the school day.

Group camping fees that were once from \$12 to \$270 per site will be from \$14 to \$450.

well as in English.

“We did the Nutrition Olympics at Burney Elementary School and a Walk to School Day at Fall River Elementary School,” Moore said.

Burney’s public health office offered smoking cessation classes, and bike safety programs with helmet giveaways.

Public health officers worked with the local schools and led community meetings to provide information and assuage fears when three area residents were hospitalized with Meningococcal disease.

Other services provided included no-cost HIV testing and counseling and home visits to pregnant and high risks infants.

VLF also funds the Sheriff’s office, county fire departments, social services and mental health services, but, said Moore, “they have other primary sources of funding. None depended on VLF as much as public health.”

The fee to enter museums and historical sites will cost from \$2 to \$8 per visitor.

Annual passes that cost \$67 last season have gone up to \$75 to \$125.

Annual boat passes are \$75, an increase of \$30.

A visit to the Hearst Castle used to cost from \$7 to \$12. Admission after July 1 will be from \$8 to \$25 and \$30 for evening tours.

Disabled, Veterans, Senior, and Golden Bear passes have not changed.

“The increases were structured in a way that allows for choices to be made through a sliding range of fees at parks throughout the system,” Coleman said.

The State Parks’ budget was reduced by \$4.8 million in 2001-2002 and another \$15 million in 2002-2003, to total nearly \$20 million.

To meet the requirements of those reductions, Coleman said State Parks reorganized its middle and upper management and consolidated 23 statewide park districts to 18.

The management reorganization and the ongoing hiring freeze reduced the State Parks’ work force by nearly 200.

As its share for the upcoming 2004-2005 budget, State Parks must reduce its operating budget by an additional \$15 million, a total reduction of \$35 million over four years.

Because most of the State Parks’ budget goes to wages and benefits, cuts alone would require the layoff of an additional 250 permanent and 800 seasonal employees, Coleman said.

New laws for new year

Similar rules apply to middle and junior high schools.

Their school vending machines are available to students from one-half hour before and after school.

Those vending machines can also contain "electrolyte replacement beverages with no more than 42 grams of added sweetener per 20-ounce serving."

Middle school students are allowed to sell less than healthy beverages in vending machines, school stores, and cafeterias for fundraising during and at an after-school event.

High school students can go ahead and have as many soft drinks as they like.

TEEN DRIVING REQUIREMENTS MODIFIED

Even teenagers who are learning to drive have a new restriction.

Under AB 1343, teens who are younger than 17-1/2 must have completed a driver's education course before receiving their instruction permit. Under the previous law, teenagers who were at least 15 could get a permit after enrolling in a driver's training program.

EMPLOYEE RIGHTS: PAID FAMILY LEAVE, LEAVE FOR CRIME VICTIMS, WHISTLEBLOWER LAWS

Starting July 1, workers who have SDI deductions on their paychecks are eligible to take up to six weeks of paid leave to care for a new baby, or foster child, or to care for sick family members.

Employees indirectly pay for the benefit through a .08 percent payroll SDI/FTDI tax deduction.

Under the new Paid Family Leave Law (SB 727), these employees are entitled to receive 55 percent of their salary up to \$728 a week.

Businesses with fewer than 50 employees are not required to hold a job for a worker who goes on paid family leave.

Work place leave is also provided under SB 478 for employees who are victims of crimes or who are relatives of crime victims so that they can attend court proceedings.

New labor codes increase penalties for employers who fail to pay a worker's wages on time or if employers pay less than the minimum wage.

The sue-your-boss law (SB 796) also makes it easier for workers to file claims about overtime pay and lunch break violations.

Work-place whistleblowers are getting added protection under SB 777 when they report what they believe to be illegal activities. Employers are required to post the telephone number of the Attorney General's hotline.

NEW LAWS FOR LANDLORDS

Landlords have new laws to follow, too.

Under current law, landlords are required to itemize any deductions from a tenant's security deposit within three weeks of a tenant's departure.

After Jan. 1, if the total charges exceed \$125, landlords are required to include copies of receipts for work (labor and materials) to clean the rental unit or repair and replace damaged items.

If the landlord or one of his employees did the work, the statement must include the time spent and the reason-

ably hourly rate charged.

PICK YOUR AUTO REPAIR SHOP

If your car is damaged in an accident, SB 551 prohibits an insurer from requiring that you have it repaired at a specific body shop.

The law also prohibits insurers from recommending a repair shop, unless you request that information.

MYSTERIOUS MEDICAL BILLS

Taking the mystery out of medical bills, hospitals will be required by July 1 to provide written or electronic copies of their charges, either by posting their charge description master on a Website or by making it available at their facility.

New laws are also going into effect for prescriptions of Schedule II controlled substances, including the phasing in of watermarked California Security Prescription forms and the phasing out of triplicate forms.

NEW LAWS FOR E-MAIL SPAM

A law that attempts to control e-mail spam also went into effect on Thursday.

The "Controlling the Assault of Non-Solicited Pornography and Marketing" (CAN-SPAM) Act of 2003 requires unsolicited commercial e-mail messages to be labeled (though not by a standard method) and to include opt-out instructions and the sender's physical address.

It prohibits the use of deceptive subject lines and false headers in such messages.

The Federal Trade Commission is authorized, but not required, to establish a "do-not-email" registry.

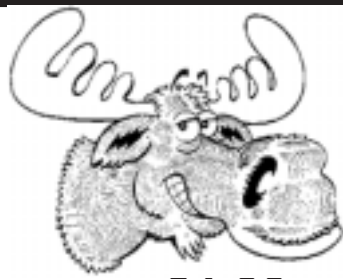

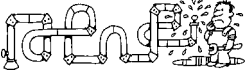

New curator for museum

When the Fort Crook Museum in Fall River Mills closed for the season on Oct. 31, Curator Bill Ingram stayed on for a while longer to train his replacement, Dorothy Mason, and to talk about his experiences since taking the job three years ago.

Ingram, born and raised in the Fall River Valley and a Fall River High School graduate, said he never really knew the history of the area until he started working at the museum.

The curator is responsible for everything in the museum – and there is a lot.

A curator accepts new donations, catalogues, and displays them, takes care of the museum's existing artifacts, documents, and photographs, and answers lots of questions from visitors.

How did you become curator?

I originally started coming in for Chuck McCulley's blacksmith workshops and then my cousin, Robert Ingram, now president of the museum's board of directors, got me involved in a project he was doing to bring a 1920's exciter from PG&E's Pit 3 to the museum.

PG&E was going to remove it and scrap it and Robert was concerned that it was the last of its kind and would be lost.

I started coming to board meetings and when (former curator) Suzie Knoch resigned, Chuck asked if I would replace her.

I thought I would just be a volunteer, but it's interesting and really sucks you in. It's been fascinating.

What does the museum accept?

We try to limit what we take to items that have some relevance to the area, or would have/could have, like a wagon wheel that we have that came from Colorado, but probably could have been found here.

We bend the rules a little and try not to turn people down.

Technically, this is an historical museum, but we have some fossils that Doc Slusher brought in that were dug out of the sandstone cliff where the swallows nest in Fall River Mills.

What's been the most rewarding?

I enjoyed doing the research. Finding out what something is, where it came from, and why it's significant and then writing up something about the item for visitors.

What's the tourist trade like?

Some people come in because they are trying to find out more about their families.

Some people come in, look and leave. Others stay for two hours.

People are surprised by how much is on display and by the quality of what is here.

They come from all over. We've had visitors from Jerusalem, England, France, and

someone from Tokyo was here last week.

The third graders from Burney Elementary School visit each year.

So do the first graders from Fall River Elementary, the fifth and sixth graders from Big Valley Intermediate School, and the students from the Columbia School in Redding.

Oldest item in the museum?

Aside from the fossils, one of the oldest man-made items is a black wedding dress from 1825. Wedding dresses were not a one-use dress. It was a good dress.

One visitor told me that only on the East Coast were dresses from that period white.

Maybe black was a Western tradition or maybe it was a laundry issue because black was easier to keep clean.

There is also a Bible in the James Showcase building that was a wedding gift to a couple who were married in 1815 and it has the family's births and deaths (written in it).

Most peculiar?

A turtle shell. Everyone asks where it came from.

It was at the door one day and we don't know who left it there.

We also get a lot of comments about the pressure cooker that was used to

make false teeth.

Museum's history?

The Fort Crook Historical Society was founded first, in 1934, to "collect, preserve and present the history of the Intermountain area."

Community members built the museum in 1962-65 and it's a replica of a round barn.

In addition to the main building, the old Pittville Schoolhouse, built in 1884 and occupied until 1945, is on the grounds.

There is a log cabin that was built in 1869 of squared logs and fitted corners, the Fall River Mills jail, a machinery barn and the James Showcase.

Other museum highlights?

Upstairs there is an Indian canoe, a camera collection, medical equipment, furniture, art, and a spinning wheel.

The main floor has a little bit of everything from the Native Americans and the early settlers and pioneers.

There are genealogical files, photographs, military items from World War I, clothing. A lot of odds and ends.

When can we come look around?

New curator Dorothy Mason, who moved to the Intermountain Area from Contra Costa County and is interested in history, will open the museum for the season on May 1.

Haz-mat supplies used to clean spill

A Burney teenager pumped more gas than he intended to on New Year's Day when he drove away from the Staub Energy cardlock station in Burney with the gas nozzle still in his vehicle.

About 186 gallons of Pacific Pride supreme gasoline were pumped. Some of it presumably went into the customer's gas tank, but the majority spilled onto the ground.

Most, if not all, of the fuel was absorbed by a large pile of snow at the pump.

The teenager reportedly realized fairly quickly what had happened and telephoned the two emergency numbers listed at the self-service station, but because

of the holiday no one answered.

He then called an emergency number at 12:47 p.m., reported the incident to the Burney Fire Department, and left the scene, according to Burney Fire Chief Bob May.

The fuel pump was left in the on position.

The Burney Fire Protection District responded with two engines and provided leak and containment control, using its hazardous materials clean up equipment.

May said Tuesday that Staub Energy is determining if a separator at the station held all of the petroleum back.

"It was quite a bit for it to handle. We didn't see any-

thing transitioning across the street, but water quality control has to confirm that fuel did not enter the waterway," May said.

There is a storm drain on site where water is separated to flow into Cornaz Creek and eventually Burney Creek.

An environmental agency is taking dirt samples from beneath the asphalt at the station.

Staub Energy was not available Monday or Tuesday to comment or to report on total damages and losses and whether or not the teenager and his family would be held liable.

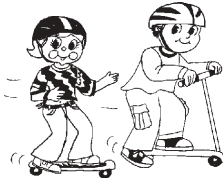

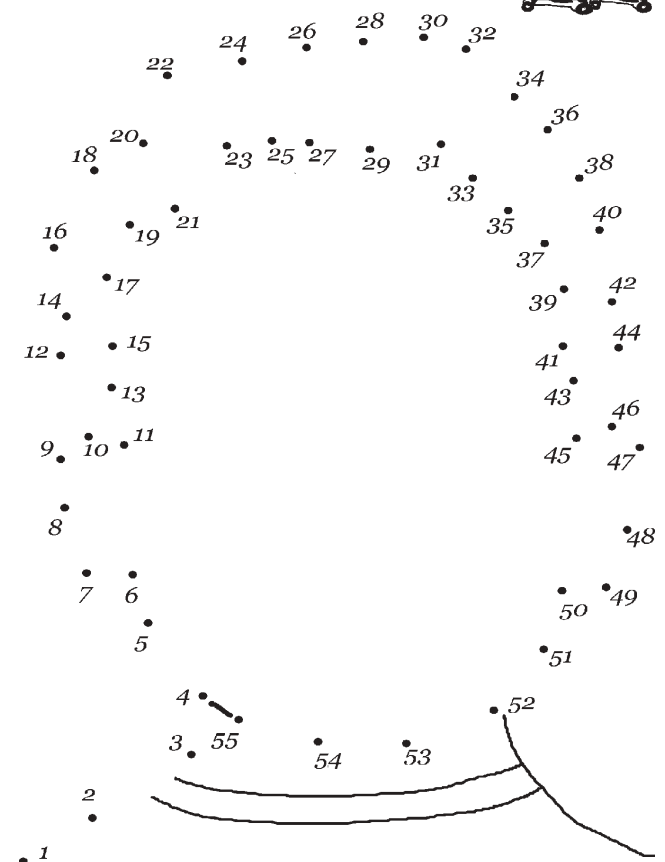

Palmer is bright and open

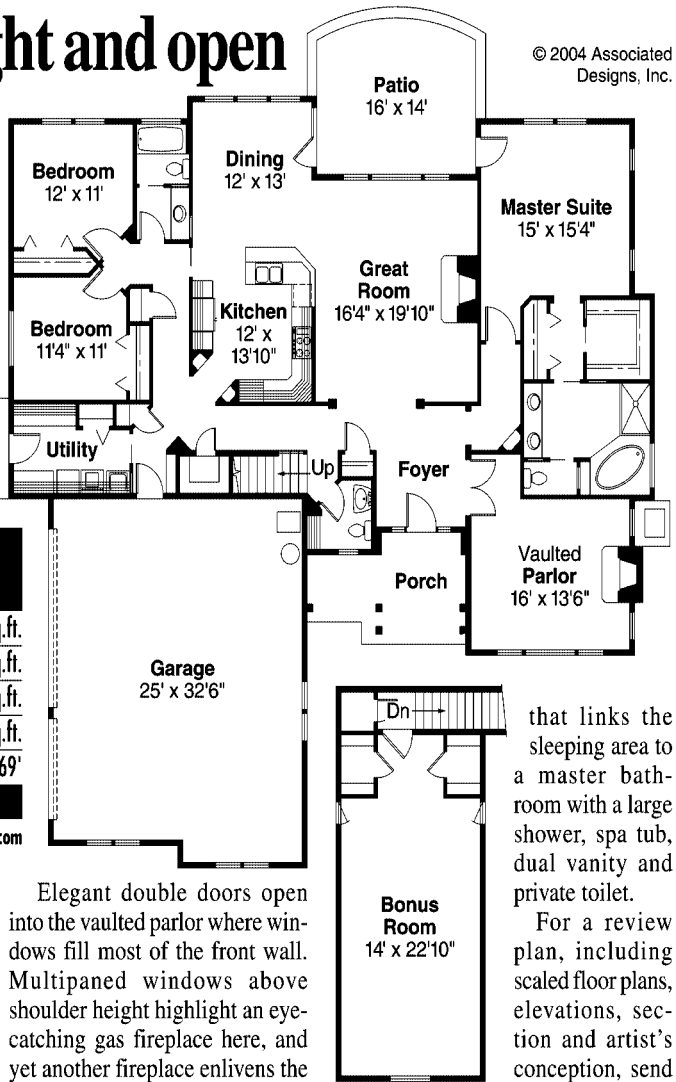

Four gables and an abundance of sparkling windows give the Palmer an inviting look, and there's plenty more to intrigue the eye. Stone veneer wainscoting combines with shake and lap siding to provide textural variety, while decorative corbels underscore the gable peaks.

This mid-size home is all on one level, except for the deep bonus room over the garage.

A naturally bright, wide open great room is at its core. Elegant double doors open into the vaulted parlor where windows fill most of the front wall. Multipaned windows above shoulder height highlight an eye-catching gas fireplace here, and yet another fireplace enlivens the great room.

A display nook nestles into a hallway corner just outside the Palmer's luxurious master suite. The sleeping area offers direct access to the patio, plus plenty of storage space. Two large closets, one of them a walk-in, flank the hallway

that links the sleeping area to a master bathroom with a large shower, spa tub, dual vanity and private toilet.
